# **Dr. Thomas C. Barker Appointed Director** of School of Hospital Administration

Dr. Thomas C. Barker, project director of the Michigan Health and Social Security Research Institute, Inc., has been named director of MCV's school of hospital administration and Arthur Graham Glasgow professor of hospital administration.

Announcement of his appointment, effective July 1, was made by Charles P. Cardwell, vice president, hospitals and community relations, and acting director of the school of hospital administration. Doctor Barker succeeds the late Robert S. Hudgens, who died June 10, 1966.

A native of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, he attended Loras College and Coe College before entering the State University of Iowa where he received his B.S., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees.

Prior to joining the Michigan



Health and Social Security Research Institute, Inc., in 1965, Doctor Barker had served as assistant professor of hospital and health administration at the College of Medicine, State University of Iowa and as U. S. Public Health Service doctoral fellow at the State University's Graduate College and College of Medicine.

In addition, he has held consultative positions at Wayne State University, Brandeis University, State University of Iowa, and Mercy Hospital in Iowa City. Doctor Barker's major research activities and publications have centered in the medical and health fields.

A veteran of two years' service with the Navy, he holds the rank of Lieutenant Commander in the Naval Reserve.

Doctor Barker is a member of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, American College of Hospital Administrators, American Hospital Association, American Public Health Association, the medical sociology section of the American Sociological Association, and Catholic Hospital Association. He is group vice-chairman of the Michigan Medical Care Discussion Group.

Doctor Barker is married and has four children.

# MCV RECEIVES GRANTS FOR MEB ADDITIONS

The Medical College of Virginia has received \$863,757 in Federal grants toward the construction of additional floors atop the Medical Education Building.

The Public Health Service awarded a grant of \$385,757, and the National Institutes of Health awarded one for \$478,000. The State has appropriated \$864,110 for the additions.

Two stories will be added to the 10story wing that parallels North Eleventh Street, and three stories will be added to the nine-story wing that parallels East Marshall Street. Construction is expected to begin in the late summer.

# MCV Organizes New Disaster Plan

As many of our personnel know, MCV has had a disaster plan for a number of years—a plan to mobilize all available personnel and services to aid victims in the event of a major disaster in our area.

A new plan, under study for several months, was explained to the housestaff in February. The plan can be put into effect at any time and is oriented around the housestaff.

MCV officials envision a cooperative arrangement with other local hospitals for the future.

His first lecture on Use of Placebos and Meaning of Controls will be given at 2:00 p.m. on March 30; the second on Pharmacology of Sudden Death will be delivered at 2:00 p.m. on March 31.

## MCV Receives Federal Grants for 15 Pre-Doctoral Fellowships

The Medical College of Virginia has been awarded 15 Federal grants totaling more than \$84,000 in predoctoral fellowships for use by students in the school of graduate studies in the coming school year.

The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare's Office of Education awarded seven of the grants under Title IV of the National Defense Education Act. The National Science Foundation gave four of the grants and the National Institutes of Health, the other four. MCV faculty members on the program will be: Dr. William Regelson, Dr. David W. Richardson, and Dr. Albert J. Wasserman.

Attendance at the symposium is applicable for 11 hours of accreditation by the American Academy of General Practice. All lectures will be held in Baruch Auditorium in the Egyptian Building. Although there will be no charge for the two Stoneburner Lectures, there will be a \$25.00 charge for the series, except for members of the faculty, members of the University of Virginia faculty, physicians at McGuire VA Hospital, members of any housestaff, and medical students.

Complete programs are available from the office of the director of continuing education, MEB-131.

All of these grants provide a stipend of from \$2,400 to \$2,800 for the student, depending on how many years he has been working toward his degree, plus a \$2,500 educational allowance for tuition and supplies.

Dr. Daniel T. Watts, dean of the school of graduate studies, has announced that all of the grants will be used by students working in the area of the basic medical sciences, medicinal chemistry, or biology and genetics.

Doctor Watts also said that, in addition to the increased number of Federal grants, MCV will double the number of its own grants from the A. D. Williams Foundation for research and advanced education from five to 10.

Gifts and grants to the Medical College of Virginia totaled \$580,850.64 for January and February.

Gifts and grants to MCV for the eight-month period, July, 1966-February, 1967, were \$3,548,434.61, over a million dollars ahead of the same period last year.

Mrs. Frances J. More specifically, this means that the institute will strive to develop new chaplaincy positions in hospitals, new professionally supervised and accredited pastoral counseling centers, new industrial and other creative forms of chaplaincy, and research projects in the areas of medical-religious and cultural problems.
