Church to Contribute To Goldsboro Today

A visit from Ray D. Fullerton, Jr., evangelist working in Gorldsboro, N. C., under the oversight of our elders, and a special collection for the Goldsboro church's building fund are in store for the College Church today.

Brother Fullerton is to be away from Goldsboro several weeks—at least through May—securing financial help for the building that the Goldsboro church needs so urgently. The College Church elders have arranged appointments for him with several churches. Approximately \$25,000 is needed for the Goldsboro building,

The church in Goldsboro is eight months old. It serves a city of 30,000. A number of its members are stationed at nearby Seymour Johnson Air Force Base. The nearest congregation is 30 miles away; the nearest building owned by a congregation of the church of Christ is 55 miles away.

Membership grew from 11 to 32 in the first five months. Five (See Church Contributes, p. 2)

GATEWOOD HOLDS SUCCESSFUL MEETING

The gospel meeting concluded last Sunday with Otis Gatewood of Abilene was one of the finest meetings ever held with the College Church, according to George Bailey.

Final visible results of the series were 197 responses, including 25 baptisms.

Gatewood, one of the better known evangelists among churches of Christ throughout the world, placed his and his family's membership with the College Church at the last service Sunday night. He spends most of his time holding evangelistic meetings, but his family lives in Abilene.

Five Preachers To Go to Russia This Summer

Three evangelists closely associated with the College Church will tour Poland and Russia in August, it was announced last Sunday night.

Otis Gatewood, an Abilene Christian College ex-student of 1936, who closed the gospel meeting Sunday night, will be the leader of the group. He will be joined by George W. Bailey, regular evangelist here, and E. W. McMillan of Santa Ana, Calif., who recently resigned as professor of Bible and religious education at Abilene Christian College.

Two college members of the congregation, Danny Anders and Jerry Tindell, will accompany the three evangelists.

Gatewood is a member of the College Church but spends most of his time in evangelistic meetings throughout the United States. McMillan is a former minister of the College Church and besides his work with ACC has been a president of two other Christian colleges. The Gatewoods placed their membership here last Sunday night.

The men have been issued their passports and the proper visas are in process, according to Bailey. The trip is the third to be conducted by members of the church

Obedience Shows Faith

If we do what the Savior commands us to do, we give evidence to the world that we believe what He said.

If we fail or refuse to do what he commands us to do, we give evidence to the world that we do not believe what He says.

If we add to what he has told us to do or leave off some of his commands as not necessary, we take the position that we know more about what God wants us to do than His Son and Our Savior did.

If there is anything clearly taught in the Bible, it is that God will not allow his subjects here on earth to substitute their ideas for his commands.

Cain did that by offering the product of his own labor, instead of something God had created, as he was commanded to do. His offering was rejected; it made him mad and he killed his brother Abel, and he was banished to the land of Nod. Gen. 4:3-5.

Aaron's sons used a different fire in the sacrifice of the burnt offering instead of the kind God had commanded them to use; and they lost their lives for their arrogance. Lev. 10:1.

King Saul substituted his ideas for what God had told him to do to the Amalekites. He lost his kingdom and died of remorse by his own hands, for his disobedience. I Samuel 15 (Read whole chapter).

Even Moses, after leading the Israelites through the wilderness, as God's spokesman and lawgiver, only added a little to what God had told him to do when he brought water from the rock the second time and was not allowed to enter the promised land for his thoughtlessness. Num. 20:8-12.

If these men who had no example to guide them were pun-

ished for their disobedience, how can we hope to escape punishment if we undertake to substitute our ideas for God's commands as they did?

Gene Clifton Dies Sunday

The body of Gene Paul Clifton, member of the College Church of Christ, was returned to Detroit, Mich., last week. The 18-year-old ACC student had drowned last Sunday in Fort Phantom Lake while swimming with fellow students.

Clifton was a freshman agriculture major and lived in Mabee Dormitory. He had gone with his roommate and friends to the lake for an afternoon swim.

His companions missed him early in the afternoon, but assumed that he had returned to the campus with someone else. Because of this confusion, it was after 6 p.m. before dragging operations recovered the body.

were baptized during that period. But growth has been hindered, especially of late, by the lack of a suitable building to meet in.

When the College Church sent Brother Fullerton and his family to Goldsboro last summer, no building was available. Services were held first in a home. Then the second floor of a rented building, poorly located and inadequate, became available. This was used until condemned by the City Building Inspector.

The next move was to an old building abandoned by the Christian church. The church met there until March 24 when word came that the building was to be torn down.

The church now meets in the American Legion building. The Legion conducts a weekly dance there each Friday night. Beer is sold at the dances. In his last letter to the College Church elders, Brother Fullerton wrote:

"Right now the beer cooler is working to get ready for the dance here tonight."

In spite of a weekly radio program, regular newspaper advertising and extensive direct mail advertising, the church is hard to find because of its frequent moves and its present unlikely meeting place. Lack of a building has forced the church to turn down two recent offers. 1) a group of Christians from Houston offered to conduct a Vacation Bible School at its own expense; and 2) Max T. Neel, Temple evangelist, offered to conduct a meeting.

"The need for the building," Brother Fullerton says, "cannot be overemphasized."

Our elders fully agree, and hope that today's special contribution to the Goldsboro building fund reflects the interest the congregation really has in Goldsboro. The College Church has already arranged for the lots.

The Goldsboro church is raising as much money for the building as it can. Because the congregation is young and small, it will need extensive help in its building program.

of Christ in recent years.

Bailey and McMillan plan to meet Gatewood in Frankfurt, Germany, the first week in August. Gatewood at that time will have completed a summer of evangelistic tent meetings in Europe. The group will leave by air from Berlin about August 9 and fly to Warsaw, Poland.

They will spend about five days—the biggest portion of their planned three weeks—in Poland. The touring evangelists will then go to the Ukraine area of the Soviet Union. Other cities the group hopes to visit include Leningrad, Moscow, Rostow and Odessa. They plan to leave the Soviet Union about August 30.

This will be the third trip to Russia taken by church of Christ evangelists. The first was in the summer of 1956 by Otis Gatewood and R. J. Smith. The second was by four evangelists in the summer of 1957, including Carl Spain, a member of the Abilene Christian College Bible faculty.

Bailey says, "Those who have gone before think we should send men into Poland and Russia every year to continue our contacts with the Christians in those countries." Bailey says that the biggest portion of the tour will be taken up in Poland because there are much better possibilities for contacts with Christians there.
