WELCOME TO THE 2023-2024 THEATRE AND PERFORMANCE STUDIES SEASON.

Welcome to our 2023-2024 season. We're so glad you're here!

In the Department of Theatre and Performance Studies, we train our students through a unique BA curriculum, grounded in the professional practice of theatre, which we explore through our production season. We aim to provide spaces for both our student artists and our audiences to connect in a meaningful way through our productions and projects, as extensions of the wonderful work happening in our classrooms.

Our wonderful season presents a theme of duality. Each of our mainstage shows has themes that demonstrate a division between two people, two groups, two ideologies, or two worlds. Each show has a plot point that demonstrates the age old "Us vs. Them" conflict. "You're either with us or you're not." Each show also explores how the people involved must learn to find the space between, from the residents of Reading, Pennsylvania in Sweat to the island villagers in *Once on this Island*. There are two sides to every story, two sides to every coin, two elements in each situation to create balance. Dark vs. Light, good vs. evil, David vs. Goliath. What happens to those caught in the middle? How do we find the middle ground?

Our students are learning how to create art and tell stories in a world full of polarity – political, social, and personal. They are plugged into a world of technology and social media that drives this separation; when they come into our spaces, we nudge them to cross that space between. Speak from a place of personal responsibility. Assume good intentions. Listen to the perspectives of others. The characters in our plays must work together to find common ground and survive the ills that surround them. Our students must come together and collaborate to bring these stories to life. We prioritize their process and learning experience while doing so. And this season, our students will get the wonderful opportunities to work with Presenting Series guests from the Broken Box Mime Theater, based out of New York City, when they visit in September to perform A BKBX Frankenstein. In addition, they'll be interfacing with a diverse slate of storytellers coming to perform Stories for a Winters Night in January 2024.

Our season will culminate in a fantastic New Works and Ideas Festival in April where our students, faculty, and guest artists will create original work and share it with all of you. Come take your pick of offerings from staged readings to showcases over a ten-day period in April. We cultivate scholar-artists who think deeply about the art that they are creating and engaging with. We proudly boast a department of smart, kind, inquisitive, creative, goofy, loving students. Thank you for coming to see their work and thank you for supporting live theatre.

ABOUT THE SHOW

Welcome to an evening of performance like no other. A variety show, if you will, of acts ranging from puppetry to drag and, of course, storytelling. In our Department of Theatre and Performance Studies, we teach students about many different modes of performance, including those outside of traditional theatre which is often scripted and requires actors to take on a persona that is not their own.

Performance studies examines and interrogates both conspicuously staged artistic performances and everyday cultural performances. Artistic performances are performances marked and understood as art: solo performance, performance art, performances of literature, theatrical storytelling, plays, and performance poetry are all examples of this sort of performance. This category considers performance as an art form.

Performance Studies embraces the creative process of making art as well as the critical process of analyzing performances. Performance Studies first emerged as its own field of study in the last decades of the twentieth century informed by insights from anthropology, sociology, theatre, oral interpretation, communication studies, literary criticism, cultural studies, ethnography, folkloristics, mythological studies, and psychology. Today, performance scholars contribute to these diverse fields of study. The program in Theatre and Performance Studies here at KSU features performance as an art form, as a field of study, and as a method of inquiry (or a way of knowing) in classes throughout the major. The entire program embraces the idea of performance praxis, embodying theory through performance.

The performers you see in this production are all alumni of our wonderful program. They studied the areas of theatre and performance studies, and are pursuing careers that involve their training today. They are here interacting with our current students and teaching them about these careers and opportunities. We welcome them back with open arms and hope you enjoy this ecclectic performance of their work.
