





THE UNIVERSITY OF MAINE



The University of Maine is the largest of the seven campuses that comprise the University of Maine System. It is the Land Grand University and Sea Grant College of the state. The Orono campus, located on 1,200 acres in the center of the state, is made up of seven colleges and four schools. The philosophy of teaching and research at UM provides its students with the diversity and challenge of a large university and the atmosphere and attention of a small college. Faculty and staff are encouraged to work closely with the student body, a UM tradition that goes back to the earliest years of the Orono campus.

The University of Maine encourages students to enroll from throughout New England and beyond. As a result, the University has a diverse student body. Last year, over 45 states and 25 countries were represented on campus. More than 20 percent of the total enrollment of over 11,000 students is admitted from outside the state.

The philosophy of the University encourages the complete development of each student, both in and out of the classroom. In addition to the many challenging academic programs that lead to bachelor's degrees, UM also has a large variety of social, recreational and professional activities. To develop the body as well as the mind, UM offers a large variety of intramural and recreational sports in addition to its NCAA Division One varisity athletic program. Maine is a member of the Yankee Conference in football, the ECAC North Atlantic Conference

ence in men's basketball, the Seaboard Conference in women's basketball, the HOCKEY EAST in hockey and the ECAC North Baseball Conference.

UM has seven scholastic honor societies, four non-scholastic honor societies, 22 departmental and professional honor societies, 56 associations, clubs, and organizations, and six religious groups. There are a total of 29 fraternities and sororities that maintain chapters at Maine. Many of the fraternities offer an alternative to dorm living at their chapter houses.

The University is located about one mile from the center of Orono, a town in a classic New England setting. With a population of about 10,000 and its location of 10 miles north of Bangor, the state's third largest city, Orono is in the center of Maine's year-round outdoor recreation area, with ski slopes, numerous ponds, lakes, streams and the beautiful and scenic Maine coast within easy driving distance.

Despite being away from a large urban area, the University has access to a number of transportation modes. Interstate Route 95, the major highway that stretches from Florida to Maine, passes within a mile of the campus. Air travelers are served by Bangor International Airport, which is located about 15 minutes from the campus. Two major and one regional airlines schedule numerous flights in and out of the state at BIA.

The University of Maine maintains a strong commitment to its students. Throughout the 121-year history, the University has continually added and changed its offerings to meet the needs of its student body. Back in 1871, the University consisted of a College of Arts and Sciences and a College of Agriculture (now Life Sciences and Agriculture). In 1923, a Graduate School was added. The College of Education and School of Nursing were established in 1958 followed by the College of Business Administration in 1965. In 1974, the University of Maine at Bangor was merged with the main campus to form Bangor Community College. BCC provided continuing education and other community support services until 1985 when it was reorganized. The College of Engineering and Science and School of Performing Arts became part of the Orono family in 1975, while the College of Forest Resources was created in 1982. UM's newest college is University College, created this past summer. Formed to replace Bangor Community College, University College will offer all of the old BCC services and many new ones. University College will be located at both Orono and Bangor, thus fully integrating the Bangor campus with Orono.

After over a century of service to the state, the University of Maine has established and maintained a tradition of excellence and high values as it pursues the goal of developing its students' minds, bodies and spirits. As a dynamic institution, ready to respond to the needs of its students and faculty, the University will continue to strive for excellence long into the 21st century.



DR. DALE W. LICK

Dr. Dale W. Lick, 48, has been named the 16th president of the University of Maine, effective Sept. 1, 1986. Dr. Lick comes to the University of Maine after serving for eight years as president of Georgia Southern College in Statesboro, Ga., where he was also a professor of mathematics and computer science. During his tenure at Georgia Southern, he was a guiding force in moving the school's athletic programs into Division One and this past year the Georgia Southern football team won the Division 1-AA national championship.

A graduate of Michigan State University where he obtained his baccalaureate and master's degrees in mathematics, Dr. Lick earned his doctorate at the University of California in Riverside.

Prior to taking the presidency of Georgia Southern, he was dean of the School of Sciences and Health Professions at Old Dominion University, vice president for academic affairs at Russell Sage College and chairman of the math department at Drexel University.

He is married and he and his wife, Marilyn, have three children.



STU HASKELL, JR.

UM's Director of Physical Education and Athletics is Stuart Haskell, Jr. Stu, who is the first UM graduate and Maine native (Lincoln) to hold the Director's position, succeeded Harold Westerman on June 1, 1982. Stu has been a member of the university's staff for nearly 29 years, serving as Assistant Director of Publicity between 1957 and 1965 and as Business Manager of Athletics between 1966 and 1983. He served as Director of Informational Services for the public schools of Evanston, Ill. in 1965 and early 1966. Stu is a journalism graduate of Maine and was employed for three years as a sportswriter for the Bangor Daily News and one year as Editor of The Republican Journal in Belfast in the mid-1950's. He and his wife, Gloria, are the parents of four children.

BASKETBALL AT MAINE

omen's basketball, as an intercollegiate activity, had its beginning in the 1971-72 season, along with a number of other women's sports. Unfortunately there is no statistical compilation of the early days of women's basketball until the 1975-76 season. In that season, Eilene Fox was named head coach and she continued in that post until the 1983-84 season when Peter Gavett assumed the reins.

In her eight years at the helm of the Black Bears, Eilene compiled a record of 118 wins and 50 defeats and won six Maine Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (MAIAW) championships. During those years Maine posted a 79-6 record against in-state opponents but were only 19-33 against other Division I schools.

An upgrading of the schedule which started


in the '80s has continued in the past few years and the Bears' record against other Division I clubs has gradually improved. In the 1983-84 year Maine was 6-8 against other Division I schools on its schedule but in 1984-85 the Bears won 14 and lost nine against schools in its own division.


Maine went on to finish with a 21-9 record and at the time posted the most wins in the team's history. The Black Bears finished second in the first Seaboard Conference tournament, dropping the championship, 73-59, to Northeastern. The improvement came primarily from the high-scoring combination of Emily Ellis, the Black Bears' all-time leading scorer, and All-American freshman Liz Coffin. For his efforts, head coach Peter Gavett was named New England Division I Coach of the Year.

The 1985-86 Bears got off to the team's best start ever, reeling off 18 straight wins before dropping a 71-55 decision to Northeastern, the last club to defeat the team. Injury problems plagued the Black Bears down the stretch, and Maine finished 22-7. Maine won the consolation game at the Seaboard tourney, 53-50, over New Hampshire to close out the season after losing to Boston University by one point in the semi-finals.

With the loss of only two letter winners from last year's team, Maine appears to be one of the early favorites in the Seaboard this season. The Maine program is on the upswing under fourth-year head coach Gavett, with the Black Bears earning the respect of teams throughout the Northeast.








1986-87 MAINE OUTLOOK





What do you do for an encore when your team has completed the season with a 22-7 record and established a new New England Division I record with 18 straight wins to open the campaign? That's the question facing University of Maine Black Bear coach Peter Gavett as he prepares his team for the 1986-87 season. And Gavett expects his Bears will be even better this year. The reason is that everyone except two players returns and in the wings are two outstanding prospects who were redshirted or ineligible to play last season. Gavett also obtained two top recruits, adding some height and speed to the club. You can see why the Bear camp is optimistic.

Leading the returnees is junior co-captain Liz Coffin who last season was named a Kodak All-District I member and who was also named to the Seaboard Conference All-Star team. Last year she averaged 20.3 points a game and 10.8 rebounds. Liz led the club in 13 offensive and defensive categories in 1985-86 and has scored a total of 1,043 points in two years of play. Also returning is co-captain, Lauree Gott, a 5-9 senior forward who was second in scoring behind Liz with a 14.9 points per game average. She was also the second leading rebounder, averaging 7.3 per game.

The only starters missing will be 5-4 guard Mary "Kissy" Walker, who graduated, and injured forward Kelly Nobert. Kissy was a key in running the offense and averaged 5.7 points a game. However, two guards with experience, Kathy Shorey and Sonya Wedge, do return and will be bolstered by two players who sat out all of last season along with an incoming freshman. Those who sat out the year include 5-10 guard Sue Howard, a Converse All-American while playing at Morse High School



in Bath, but was redshirted last season because of a stress fracture in her leg; and 6-0 guard Victoria Watras, who becomes eligible to play after transferring from East Carolina University. The incoming freshman who will add speed to the lineup is 5-2 guard Cathy laconeta of Portland. Both Howard and Watras give the Bears great flexibility because with their height they can play at either the guard or forward positions. Both also have excellent outside shots to complement the inside game of Coffin and Gott

Another newcomer who is expected to see considerable action is 6-2 freshman center Diane Nagle, who starred for the Maine State Champion Houlton High School club.

Debbie Duff, a 5-9 junior forward, averaged 8.1 points per game and will be a key player. Other forwards who saw considerable action last season and are returning include 6-0 junior Crystal Cummings who averaged 2.4 points and 2.6 rebounds a game and 5-10 senior Lynne McGouldrick, who averaged 2.3 points a contest.

Other members of the team include 5-1 senior Joanna Hamilton, 5-7 frosh Tammie Tozier, 5-11 forward Elizabeth Sullivan, and 5-10 forward Jill MacGregor. In keeping with his original theme, Gavett still will field a team made up entirely of players from the State of Maine.

Last season the Bears were ranked as high as 30th in the nation before injuries to starting guards Walker and Wedge contributed to several losses at the end of the season. In the Seaboard Conference playoffs the Bears were edged by Boston University, 52-51, but came back to defeat New Hampshire in the consolation game, 53-50.

THE COACHING AND SUPPORT STAFF



PETER GAVETT Head Coach

Now in his fourth year as head coach of the Black Bears, Peter Gavett has compiled a 59-27 record while building one of the strongest teams in New England. Last year, Gavett led Maine to a 22-7 record and the most wins in the program's 11-year history. The season included an 18-game winning streak to start the year, which led to Maine being ranked as high as 30th in the nation at one point. Despite this success, the Black Bears were forced to settle for the consolation championship in the Seaboard Conference after several key injuries hampered the team.

In 1984-85, Gavett's team was 21-9 and went to the Seaboard finals before losing to Northeastern. For his efforts, Gavett was named New England Coach of the Year by the American Women's Sports Federation, which also named him to their All-American Coaching Staff. He was awarded a similar honor from the Division I coaches in New England as their choice for District I-New England Coach of the Year.

Gavett's first season as head coach saw him lead UM to a 16-11 mark, and the Maine State championship. In that year, Maine set five NCAA Division I national records, 18 team records and 21 individual records.

Prior to accepting his appointment as women's head coach in 1983, Peter was a freshman coach and assistant varsity coach with the Black Bears men's program for 10 years. Gavett is a 1973 graduate of Maine who remained at the school to work with the freshman and jayvee teams until 1978, compiling a 48-11 record. As an assistant with the men's program, Peter was responsible for recruiting the top players who have competed for Maine in the past decade. Seven of his recruits went on to be drafted by NBA teams.

While an undergraduate at Maine, Peter captained the freshman team to an undefeated season, and also captained the varsity his senior year. In his three varsity seasons, he scored 1,294 points, shooting 50 percent from the floor and 78 percent from the foul line. Gavett was the leading scorer in the Yankee Conference in both his junior and senior years, as well as

being named to the All-Yankee Conference Academic team both seasons. He concluded his collegiate career by being named All-Maine, All-Yankee Conference, All-New England and a District I All-Star. He was later drafted by the Boston Celtics in the 1973 NBA Draft.

Since 1976 he has been the director of the popular University of Maine Summer Basketball Clinics for girls. He is also a much soughtafter speaker at numerous banquets and clinics throughout the state. He is married to the former Shelley Hutchins. The Gavetts have a daughter, Gretchen, and a son, Peter, and reside in Orange.



PAUL BESSEY Assistant Coach

Paul Bessey is in his second year as a parttime assistant coach with the Black Bears women's program. Paul's roles with the team include individual instruction of players at practice sessions, recruiting and coaching during games.

Paul, 36, is a 1972 graduate of the University of Maine who played basketball for the Black Bears from 1969-1972. He was a guard on teams coached by Gib Philbrick and Skip Chappelle. Bessey scored 753 career points, and was the co-captain of the team in his junior and senior years.

He has coached the boys' basketball programs at Belfast High, 1973-74; Stearns High in Millinocket, 1974-78; and Orono High, 1978-85. His 1981 Orono team won the Maine State Class "B" championship.

A native of Buckfield, ME, Paul is single and resides in Bangor. He currently teaches in the Orono school system.

KELLY ROBSON

Trainer

Kelly Robson is in her third year as a student trainer with the women's basketball program. The 22-year-old native of Montreal, Quebec, is responsible for looking after the physical well-being of the players in conjunction with the University's medical personnel. Kelly is presently a graduate student in Physical Education, and she would eventually like to become a certified athletic trainer and work in either



collegiate or professional sport.

Kelly was a fine athlete herself, competing provincially in figure skating at the Quebec Winter Games.

She is the past president of Kappa Delta Pi, the University of Maine's national honor society for education. Kelly enjoys figure skating, water skiing and working with people.




ANDREW "WILLIE" GAVETT Strength and Conditioning Coach

Willie begins his third year as part-time assistant coach supervising the strength and conditioning of the players. He also has served as the strength coach for the Maine football team.

The older brother of head coach Peter Gavett, he is a 1973 graduate of Maine where he participated in basketball for three years. He has taught in the Old Town school system for the last 14 years, and resides in Orono with his wife, Wendy, and son, Aaron.

AT MAINE: After only two season of collegiate basketball, Liz has already established herself as one of the greatest players in Maine history selected as a first team District I Kodak All-American, and also named All-New England and All-Seaboard Conference in 1985-86 ... named an AWSF second team All-American, as well ... led the Black Bears in scoring (589 points), rebounding (312), blocks (29), steals (89) and minutes played (998) last season . . . her 87 steals, 29 blocks and 145 free throws made, all set school single-season records . . . led Maine in scoring in 20 of 29 games last season . . . tied career high of 34 points versus UMass last year . . . 




from the point guard position . . . played in 14 games.

Now in its third year of existence, the Seaboard Conference has expanded to eight schools and has increased its championship events to include women's tennis as well as basketball.




