








Dr. Steven E. Brown

"Aloha, it was with great sadness and heavy heart to hear of the death of Dr. Steven Brown. Steve served for many years as a professor of Disability Studies at the Center on Disability Studies, University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. He was lead investigator on numerous projects working to improve the quality-of-life experience for persons with disabilities across the globe. Further, Steve was respected internationally as an activist and advocate for the rights of all persons with disabilities. He was one of the original advocates for applying the social



model of disability and establishing disability culture as a way of supporting disability pride. Steve was considered the father of Disability Culture and published widely in this field of study. He also was one of the leaders in defining disability studies, as well as



originating and teaching several courses in the Center on Disabilities Studies certificate program.



BUILDING A CULTURE OF BELONGING

Intentional Onboarding to Establish a Sense of Place and Leadership Pathways in Hawai'i's UCEDD

Background

Onboarding is the first opportunity to build meaningful connections with new employees and establish an

Organizations may not adequately prioritize comprehensive new employee onboarding due to insufficient resources, time constraints, inconsistent practices, minimizing the importance of such processes and systems, or having unclear goals and objectives.

Despite these challenges, purposeful onboarding is essential for acclimating, engaging, and retaining employees. It is especially critical to develop a sense of belonging, place, and to inform team members on the various pathways to leadership.

At the Hawai'i UCEDD Center on Disability Studies (CDS), we designed an asynchronous online course using accessible and inclusive design principles in alignment with the organization's respective goals and vision.

Our Approach

An asynchronous online course with these priorities:



Establish organizational clarity, situating CDS as a UCEDD within the university's College of Education (COE).




Support employee engagement where each person feels welcomed and connected to CDS.




Emphasize the unique sense of place for CDS within a Native Hawaiian Place of Learning.



Collect post-course feedback from new and existing employees for an interactive approach.





Methods

New employees and a sample of existing employees (n=22) completed the online course and a post-course survey.

The post-course survey collected qualitative feedback and asked employees to rate contribution to knowledge, contribution to onboarding, and course quality.

"The resources about leave, policies, and general onboarding information was very helpful. I also found the graphics for person-first language and identity-first language very helpful and made me introspective to my own language regarding disabilities."

Findings

Paired t-tests showed that post-course ratings of knowledge and skill were significantly higher than pre-course ratings (Fig. 1).

Ratings of contribution to onboarding and of the organization, accuracy, and appropriateness of content were all high (>4/5).

No significant differences were found between new and existing employees in relation to ratings of contribution to skills/knowledge, contribution to onboarding, or course content.

Qualitative employee feedback was very positive and emphasized a sense of belonging.

"I found the content to be very motivating in that it is a wonderful reminder of how important this work we do is, and it builds a **sense of belonging** to a larger historical and national movement. After completing the course I felt and still feel a sense of **renewed excitement** about the work we do at CDS."

Conclusions

UCEDDs can leverage asynchronous online courses to provide onboarding support for new employees.

Onboarding courses should prioritize content that speaks to the unique culture and values of each UCEDD university setting to promote a sense of belonging.

Promoting Quality Employment Outcomes for People with Disabilities: Building and Implementing Culturally Responsive Vocational Rehabilitation Programs

The Vocational Rehabilitation Technical Assistance Center for Quality Employment (VRTAC-QE; www.tacqe.com), funded by the Rehabilitation Services Administration (RSA: H264K200003). works closely with state vocational rehabilitation agencies (SVRA) to build capacity for improved collaboration, VR service delivery, and quality employment outcomes for individuals with disabilities.

Through this workshop, participants sites (i.e., SVRAs) will collaborate on addressing employment challenges and barriers unique to states and territories in the Pacific Rim using culturally responsive strategies. With support from course facilitators, each site will identify key issues, develop an action plan, short-term and long-term goals, and leave with meaningful tools

to promote quality employment outcomes within their program (i.e., policy development, accompanying procedural elements including training, forms, etc.). Ongoing implementation supports will be available for participating SVRAs beyond the event.

At the end of this event, participant sites will be able to:

- 1. Define 'quality employment' and identify key policies and evidence-based practices that promote quality employment outcomes in vocational rehabilitation.
- 2. Describe the administrative and programmatic supports needed to implement policy and practice focused on improving quality employment outcomes.
- 3.Introduce this concept and practice into local and state VR service delivery.
- Develop a repository of resources, goals, and action plan for implementation of quality employment within their own agency.
