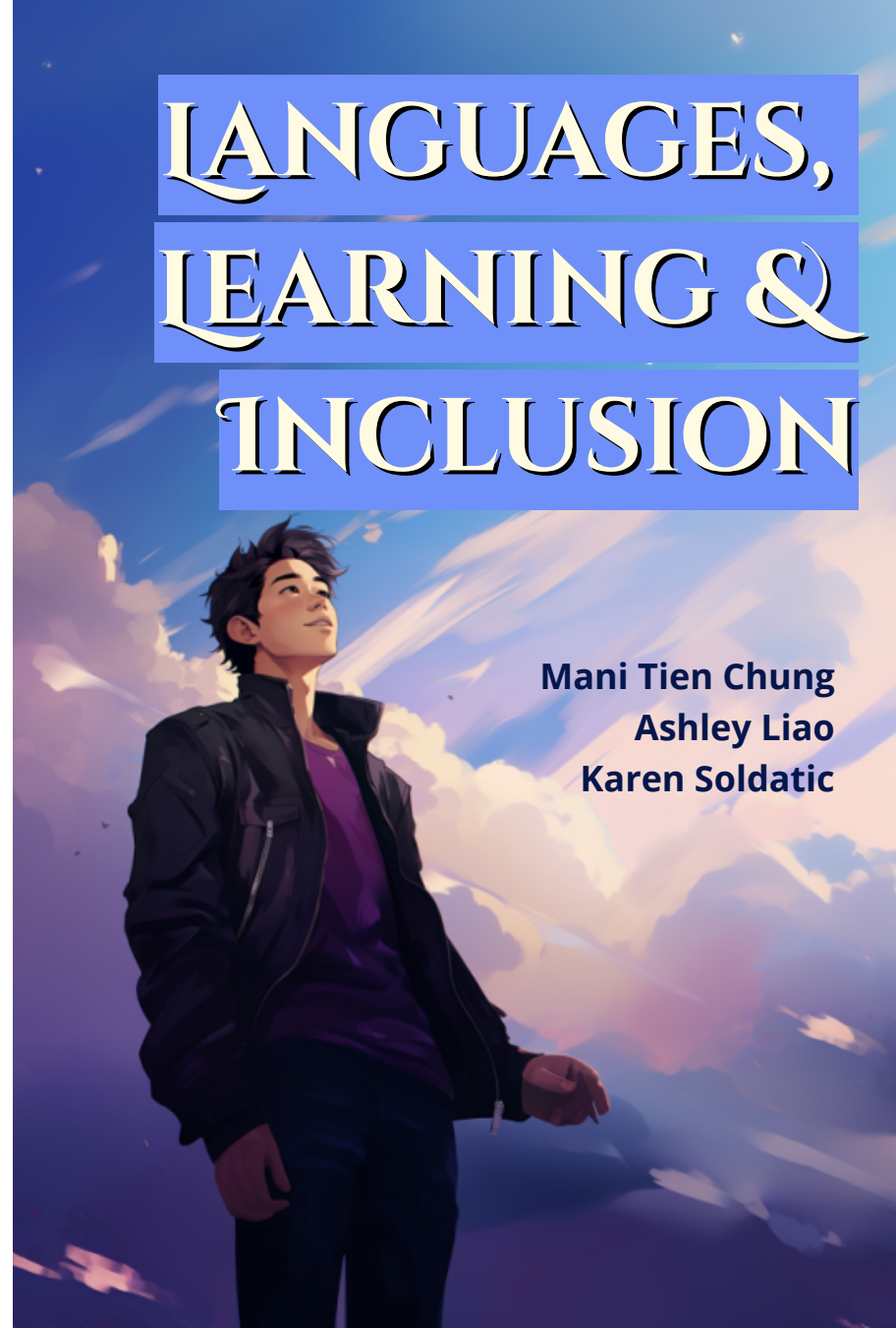


LANGUAGES, LEARNING & INCLUSION

This book was created as part of the ADDEPT - Autonomy, Diversity & Disability: Everyday Practices of Technology funded by ARC Linkage Project LP190100099.

The digital narratives were co-created with participants across a set of online, face-to-face workshops in addition to focus groups and follow-up one-to-one interviews. Each of the participants with the project team to examine, explore and create visual digital accessible books of their personal experiences with everyday technologies and share the impact upon their lives.

The impact is mostly positive, particularly with appropriate support. But also, at times, negative with significant challenges due to the biases with technology design. This is especially so for people with disabilities who are from minority diverse backgrounds. Few have access to the necessary resources to fund comprehensive assistive technologies.

Over a period of two years of working, research participants were able to critically engage with AI technologies and create these books to publicly disseminate their diverse experiences to enable others to learn from them. The stories are developed from the narratives of the participants, using AI technologies such as Mid Journey.

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
