

Abstract

According to The Governor's Office of Student Achievement, in August 2013 and January 2014, education stakeholders from the public and private sectors met to develop a strategic plan that charts the expansion of PBIS in Georgia.

Of the five strategic goals, administrators, coaches, and teachers are required to increase awareness and visibility of PBIS while expanding data infrastructure to lead and support PBIS implementation. The data should be used to support evidence-based behavioral practices for improving school climate. Each school must find their own way to adhere to state-wide PBIS expectations, and unify the mission and vision of the district with their individual school matrix and discipline flow charts.

Schools are also tasked with creating their own incentive programs to reward students for desired behaviors. Information obtained from numerical (points) and anecdotal submissions can be used to identify areas of concern, as well as to increase focus on students that are meeting and exceeding expectations.

Validity of the data is dependent upon staff participation, and it is important for schools to develop a universal system that is centralized and easy for staff to use. Educator-driven data collection also supports PBIS Tier I, Tier II, and Tier III processes when implemented with consistency.
