FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

To graduates of the College and other good friends:

This is the issue of the College Bulletin whose emphasis is upon financial support to the College, and it is here that we express our whole-hearted appreciation for the tremendous assistance that your help represents. Elsewhere in these pages you will see the names of thousands of persons who have approved of our standards and values and who have helped us to realize our goals. Each name we see as a loyal friend volunteering a vote of reliance upon Ursinus College as well as faith in its future. It is gratifying.

The world of donors includes at least two groups: those who support immediate and tangible projects and those who favor endowments, the gifts that keep on giving, where the principal is retained perpetually and the interest is directed to a specific need such as scholarships for students who would find it impossible to meet the increasing costs of education without help from sources outside family and from personal means.

We are commending the latter alternative to you and suggesting that you consider establishing a fund in your name, or in the name of a friend, or a member of your family whom you would like to honor. You may create a scholarship fund immediately through a gift of \$1,000 or more and you may add to it throughout your lifetime and ultimately through a bequest.

Let us examine a typical fund that could be within the reach of many of us. More than a half-century ago a few former students of the Pennsylvania Female College, the Glenwood Association, established The Pennsylvania Female College Memorial Scholarship with a gift of \$3,000. In the past fifty years Ursinus students have received about \$7,000 in scholarship aid as a result, yet the fund managed by the College is still intact.

Many of our friends who know of this possibility and who do not feel able initially to provide \$1,000 for creating the fund start with a smaller gift, and then continue with a succession of others to be held by the College until the total equals \$1,000, at which time the fund is launched, and its existence is published in the annual "Reports of Officers".

Have you thought of endowing such a fund in perpetuity? It will take its place beside the historic funds that have honored friends of the College and have brought bright and worthy students to Ursinus.

If the idea appeals to you, drop a note to your Loyalty Fund Chairman, your Class Agent, the Alumni Secretary or to your President.

I invite you to consider these suggestions.

THE TWIN MEET

"Oh, East is East, and West is West . . ." but the twain did meet this summer with significant results.

They came to study and survey American life, and in five weeks they examined carefully the non-Western Literature course offered in our summer school by Dr. Phil Williams, Adjunct Professor (English at Ursinus and long-time professor of English in Japan). They

There was that bit of trouble about our name, to begin with. So many people have their own way of saying 'Ursinus', that when our Japanese guests came on campus they had to suppress a few smiles, since in their own language our pronunciation of the College name came out as "extremely bothersome," "ridiculous eggplant," "banzai to the nose," or "tomorrow, nothing." It's a tough situation, really!

stayed in American homes, camped our forests, visited our museums and parks and shopped our malls. They fondled the Liberty Bell, heard the heartening crack of Phillies' bats, toured transcendental Concord, Mass., and gawked at Plymouth Rock.

And always they queried new friends during lunch and free afternoons and late-night bull sessions. Phil and Tinker Williams kept the lights burning well into the night at 777 Main Street, parental home of the students whose own dorms were Wilkinson and Shreiner Halls.

The Japanese conducted a farewell buffet and party in Wismer Hall, demonstrating the time-honored arts of calligraphy, floral arrangements, the tea ceremony, dancing and singing in their native *yukattas*, and serving specially-prepared native foods.

And always they left behind gifts. Gifts brought from our sister institution, Tohoku Gakuin University in Sendai, Japan. More, they left us the gifts of gentle goodness, kind friendships, penetrating thoughts, and a desire among many campus people to see this sort of program happen again.

The thirteen students and two professors from Sendai left Ursinus on August 8 bound for a month's tour across America before returning home with Ursinus sweatshirts and jewelry and neckties — along with ties of another sort that may serve to strengthen understanding among the world's peoples. As Jun Kawashima, TGU English professor and group leader, expressed it:

"Each of us was given many happy memories . . . a delightful change to our life. We hope the friendship between your college and ours will grow more and more deeply."

The following is an example of the teaching process during the Ursinus-Tohoku Gakuin summer program, as we present excerpts from Dr. Phil Williams' published article:

ABSURDITY and KOB0 ABE'S ART

Absurdity & Kobo Abe's Art

Philip Williams

The popularity of translations of Kobo Abe in the English-speaking world, and the strength of his high critical reputation as well, are important signs of the times. The situation may be not unlike Japan's early appreciation of William Faulkner when he was little recognized in his own country. Americans today are absorbed in Japan as never before, and they are finding in Abe's works thus far translated a body of writing that is absolutely contemporary, presenting brilliant metaphors for the predicament of modern man, and as

timely in subject matter as the morning newspaper.

Naturally and perhaps inevitably, Western critics make passing references frequently linking Abe with Kafka and Camus and the contemporary "artists of absurdity" now in great vogue in the West. These references satisfy a penchant for defining authors by classifications, but they also obscure distinctive elements of Abe's achievement and may lead to over-simplifications and misunderstanding.

We will find, I think, that the references linking them may have some relevance in relation to the novels *The Woman in the Dunes*, *The Face of Another*, *The Ruined Map*, and *Inter Ice Age 4*, and to the play, *Friends*. The latter seems particularly close to the so-called "theater of the absurd."

Abe is a morally directed writer, and for him there is no escape from responsibility to work for a better world or at least choose the

lesser "evil," a word he clings to. His chief message seems to be that science is not our savior and all his work makes the point. The proudest, most self-assured protagonists are scholar-scientists who bring their own self-destruction while humbler figures adjust in some sense and at least survive; endure if not prevail. History, then, has these tangents of meaning and purpose for Abe, and in this he is most like the great writers of the Western tradition — Dante and Shakespeare, Goethe and Dostoyevsky. Faulkner and Eliot have represented this tradition in our time, and — if foreign comparisons find any place — it is with these symbolists that Abe stands, rather than the apostles of meaninglessness associated with Absurdity in the West. Both life and literature at the deepest levels have essential elements of order in the best traditions of both East and West, and Abe is saying so with the strongest symbolic power of our time.

TURTLES TO HURDLES

"I never knew in the morning what I would find in there . . . one morning I came in and a turtle was hanging from the ceiling over the organ."

Since 1954, Philip Harvey has opened Bomberger Hall to each new day, and provided its custodial care. And, since the student mind creates pranks for relaxation, Bomberger Hall has had its share of daily surprises for the 78-year-old Welshman.

"Mr. Harvey", as he respectfully and affectionately is known around the campus, recently sat in the coffee room in the basement of the Administration Building and reached back in his mind to recollections of his years in 'old Bomberger'.

It's a new Bomberger now, since the refurbishing of the oldest structure on campus has been virtually completed at a cost exceeding \$600,000. Completion and dedication is slated for Founder's Day on November 18, but Mr. Harvey's tales are of a memorable past:

"Another morning coming in the front door, I see these nice pullets sitting up on the rail, another on the lectern. Then when Dr. Philip came in to open up the piano — why—he had pullets in the piano!"

"Once it was a bunch of pigeons flying around inside, and another time they had track hurdles all the way from the front door up to the platform. You never knew what was going on! One day they had a big Sunoco sign—like they hang over the stations — a big standing one propped up there . . . there must've been more than one student carrying that in; they must've come in through the win-

dow and then opened the doors and brought it in. I thought to myself, 'Well, I can't get that out before Chapel starts; I'll leave it there and get the men to come in for it afterward . . . but before Chapel began they had that thing right up on the platform!'"

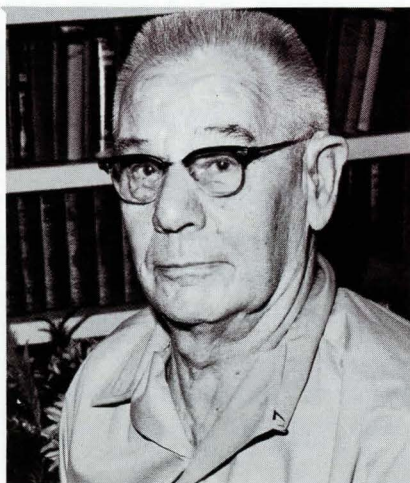
From his downstairs office, Harvey has catered to the needs of Bomberger Hall and the Alumni Memorial Library for about 15 years. He doesn't condemn the student pranks, because Mr. Harvey realizes, "it was never malicious things — just fun things they did. Like hanging hymn books up in the chapel, and one time they got the robes out of the closet and hung them all around, or hid the hymn books so you couldn't find them anywhere.

"It was balloons one time, must've been 50 of them, all colors of the rainbow, just floating nice up in the air. And I remember the rabbits . . . rabbits running all over the place . . . some poor kid had lost all his rabbits to the chapel.

"They had alarm clocks too; they had them hidden all around and when the preacher started, one would go off here and then another would go off somewhere else . . . they had them all set for Chapel time.

Philip Harvey always has enjoyed his relationship with the College. On any given day you still can see him picking up litter on the greensward, not because it's his job—it isn't—but simply because he wants to do that. "They've been good to me since I have come to this country," Phil says sincerely, "I appreciate what Ursinus College has meant to me."

Philip Harvey is prepared for the unexpected, because as he reflects, "I guess if they had elephants, they would have them in there too."

When the 1973 summer football camp opened on August 31, Coach Richard J. Whatley welcomed 68 prospects to one of the largest pre-season sessions ever held at Ursinus. Twelve seniors, seven juniors, sixteen sophomores and 33 freshmen hopefuls reported for the annual drill work-out.

After posting a 5-3 mark in the MAC (Middle Atlantic Conference) log books in 1972, the 14-year veteran coach expects to re-strengthen the key positions currently retained by seniors and juniors.

Soccer, one of America's fastest growing sports, has also grown in popularity at Ursinus. In 1972, home attendance marked a noticeable increase over previous years. During the winter the debut of a soccer intra-mural program held on the spacious floors of Helfferich Hall, generated much enthusiasm among the fraternities competing for the championship title. Coach Walter Manning established the first Ursinus College Indoor Soccer Invitational Tourney designed for high school students representing school teams throughout the tri-state area.

As a direct result of the spiraling upswing in popularity of soccer, 20 additional men will supplement this year's Ursinus team.

Cross Country Coach Raymond V. Gurzynski began his 27th season as head coach and 35th year in the teaching profession when the official season opened in September.

Gurzynski, considered almost a legend in the annals of Ursinus cross country and track history, has accumulated an official win record of 78-11 (87.6%) over a seven-year period. His teams have carried two unblemished seasons, going 30 straight without defeat in 1968 and 1969. The team managed to finish second in 1967 and 1971, and were the MAC's third-place contenders in 1970 and 1972.

PROFESSOR'S BOOK PUBLISHED BY OHIO FIRM

The Reverend Dr. William B. Williamson, professor of philosophy at Ursinus College is author of "Oneness: Ephesians on Church Unity", published this month by CSS (Clergymen's Services and Supplies) Publishing Co., Lima, Ohio.

He also is head of the department of religion and philosophy at Ursinus.

Other books Dr. Williamson has written are "A Handbook for Episcopalians," (1960) "Personal Devotions for Pastors", (1960) and "Language and Concepts in Christian Education" (1970).

Last year he received the Lindback Award for distinguished teaching at Ursinus.

Another book by Dr. Williamson, "Jesus' Farewell Discourses: The Upper Room Meditations", is scheduled for publication in early 1974 by CSS Publishing Co.

He and his wife live at 118 Laurel Lane, Broomall, and they are the parents of a son and a daughter.

Dr. Williamson joined the Ursinus faculty in 1968. He earned his doctoral degree at Temple University.

PSYCHOLOGIST COMPLETES ROSTER OF SEVEN NEW FACULTY MEMBERS

Dr. Charles T. Sullivan, active in psychological research and consultation since 1967, was named assistant professor of psychology at Ursinus College, according to Dr. William S. Pettit, President.

Dr. Sullivan received his doctorate this year at New York University after conducting psychiatric research at Hunterdon Medical Center, Flemington, New Jersey.

His appointment brings the rapidly - growing psychology depart-

ment at Ursinus to four full-time faculty members for the first time, each holding a doctorate.

He resides in Point Pleasant, Bucks County.

Dr. Sullivan's appointment completes the roster of seven new faculty members to join Ursinus this fall. Others are:

Dr. Peter F. Perreten, assistant professor of English, formerly taught at the University of Delaware;

Dr. Peter G. Jessup, assistant professor of mathematics, formerly taught at Clarkson College of Technology, Potsdam, New York;

Theodore A. Xaras, instructor of art, formerly taught at Philadelphia College of Art;

Dr. Robert W. Manweiler, part-time instructor in physics, formerly worked for the Atomic Energy Commission at Oak Ridge (Tenn.) National Laboratories;

Mrs. Mary Anne Holmgren Clausen, a 1966 Ursinus graduate, teaching fellow in the German department,

And, Mrs. Faye F. Shaw, part-

time instructor of chemistry, formerly taught at West Chester State College.

NEW SEMESTER OPENS TO 1,150 STUDENTS

Ursinus College began its 104th academic year on September 19, with 1,150 day students, seven new faculty members, and an estimated 750 Evening School students.

More than a dozen new courses will be added to the curriculum, strengthening the offerings, especially in the sciences, music, the fine arts and psychology.

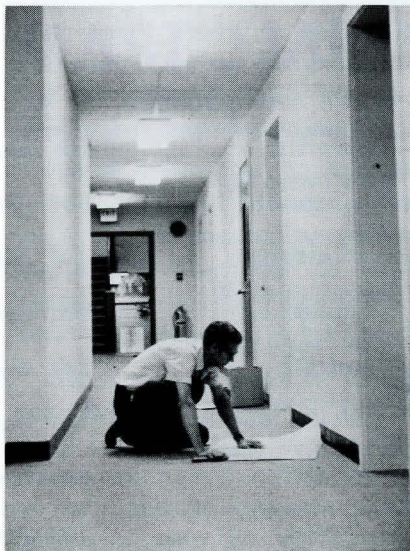
Enrollment is up slightly over a year ago, which prompted Dean Richard G. Bozorth to call the coming year a period of consolidation, when compared to other small colleges, particularly in the cities, that are struggling for survival.

The incoming freshman class of 325 students is one of the largest since the end of World War II, while 35 students are transferring to Ursinus, slightly fewer than the year before.

Fifty-seven of the freshmen received "honors upon entrance" from President William S. Pettit in recognition of outstanding personal and academic achievement in high school. Six of them were winners of National Merit Scholarships.

More than 90 per cent of incoming freshmen are from the top two-fifths of their classes, a higher proportion than last year, according to Geoffrey Dolman, Dean of Admissions.

After three years of the five-year Century II Program for Academic Advancement \$3,560,700 have been credited toward the \$5.45 million goal, to be reached by June 30, 1975. Funds came from 4,504 donors, according to William F. Heefner, '42 Chairman.

The Century II Fund will receive a boost when the South Central Region Alumni Association of Ursinus College presents the internationally known artist, photographer and lecturer, Donald Sultner-Welles, in a photo concert entitled "European Extravaganza" at the Yorktowne Motor Inn at York, Pennsylvania, on Saturday evening, November 24, 1973.

Dinner preceding the photo concert will feature an international cuisine of favorite dishes from the European countries to be represented in the photographic program. The artist is contributing his services so that all of the net proceeds may enrich the Century II Fund.

Mr. Sultner - Welles has pioneered in successfully combining the photographic art with a background of modern and classical

music and explanatory lecture material. He is a native Yorker and a graduate of the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. After a brief foray into Wall Street following graduation, he turned his considerable talents to the field of art and quickly found a niche with his superb camera artistry.

After World War II Mr. Sultner-Welles made several trips to Europe under the auspices of the U. S. State Department to interpret America through the camera lens to European peoples and to gather pictorial materials for showing to American audiences. He also represented the State Department on a nine months' world tour.

Among the many places Mr. Sultner-Welles has appeared in this country are the Philadelphia

Museum of Art, Smithsonian Institution, Richmond Museum of Art, Battelle Institute of Columbus, University of California at Berkeley, Williamsburg Garden Seminars and Antiques Forums, Colony Club of New York, and before dozens of college audiences and women's and garden clubs throughout the United States. He has also appeared in joint concert with the Chautauqua, N. Y., and Brantford, Ontario, Symphony Orchestras. This past summer he was a lecturer on two North Cape and Scandinavian cruises aboard the S. S. Vollendam, and in previous years has sailed regularly with the S. S. Statendam, S. S. Rotterdam and S. S. Nieuw Amsterdam of the Holland America Line on Mediterranean and Caribbean cruises.

Critics have acclaimed his photographs for their light and texture and have especially praised his perceptive eye in studies of Baroque architecture in Europe, the architecture of Palladio in Italy and England, and of famous gardens all over Europe and America.

A Navy study has pointed the way to the possibility of manipulating body temperature up or down. Recent experiments have shown that the normal temperature of animals can be shifted as much as 5.5 C higher or lower than the usual norm.

The work is underway at Purdue University under the direction of DR. ROBERT D. MYERS under an Office of Naval Research contract, with additional funds provided by the National Science Foundation. Dr. Myers has been engaged in long term research on the hypothalamus, a structure at the base of the brain containing the thermostat that regulates body temperature.

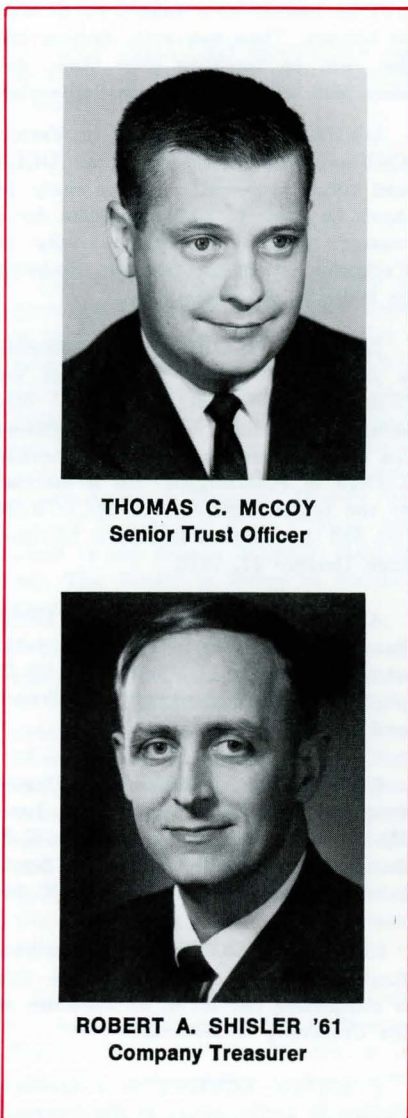

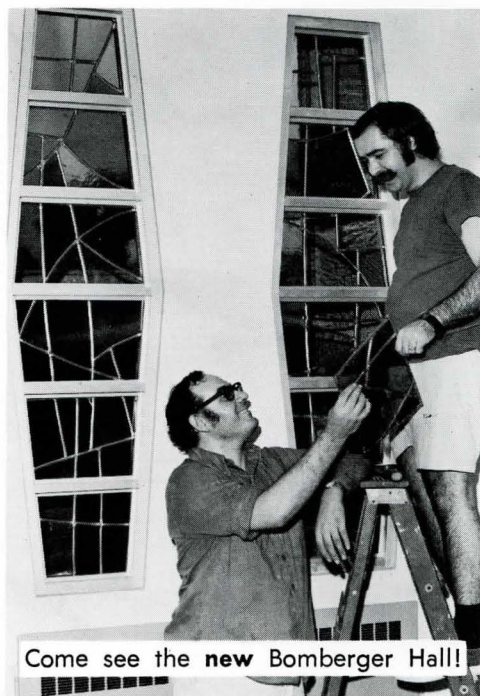
