It's been a busy year for the team, here are a few highlights of the things we've been getting up to:

South Tees Health Determinants Research Collaboration

We are very pleased to share, that after a very busy development year, the South Tees Health Determents Research Collaboration (HDRC) was awarded full status in October 2023. The HDRC is a collaboration between Teesside University and South Tees Local Authorities, which aims to create an evidence-based culture within local government.



Research within the HDRC will look at addressing impacts on health and health inequalities within the local area and will enable local authorities to increase their research capacity and evidence-based decision making.

Team Teesside Star Awards 2022-2023

In May of this year, the team attended the 2022-2023 Team Teesside Star Awards at Teesside University's Student Union. Team ALPHA was presented with the award for "Research Excellence."

Student Spotlight - Sean Harris

PhD Title: It's not all about money: Understanding place-based poverty through co-production with children in primary phase education

What motivated you to research this area?

As a leader serving in schools in challenging contexts, I became frustrated with my inability to diagnose and tackle the pain-points of communities that I served. I wanted to understand the complexity of poverty but to also ensure that the voices of children and young people were central to any research dialogue about poverty and disadvantage. I was further motivated to do this research because of my own lived-experience from a low-income background. I had the



opportunity to work with Professor Newbury-Birch and team as part of a schools-based research project. This further challenged and energised me to take seriously the impact that doing a PhD could have for the schools that I serve.

The last 12 months have consisted of...

A cost-of-living crisis! This is causing significant hardship for many communities, especially a growing number of families in the Tees Valley. In my experience, it appears to have created some robust opportunities to open up a dialogue about poverty and in-work poverty in the schools and communities that I have served. As a result, I am not short of reading or thinking material on the topic of tackling poverty and disadvantage! In recent months, I also implemented the next phase of my PhD research. This involved working with children in two primary academies in Middlesbrough and exploring what children think about poverty and how it might be further researched in their classrooms and communities.

Research highlight of the year

Getting to work with groups of children in the Tees Valley and finding out what they understand and think about poverty has been rewarding and challenging. Any policy maker or researcher that thinks children do not have a voice or opinion on the topic of tackling poverty needs to think again – children have so much that they want to say! Children are acutely aware of the current fiscal climate and are actively looking for a means to further understand it and do something about it.

Personal highlight of the year

I was asked by the Church of England to support them in understanding and disseminating some research statistics about poverty from the North East. This was prepared for use in a speech by the former Bishop of Durham and read in the House of Lords. It was great to be able to help give the North East and poverty agenda some airtime in parliament. A holiday visit to Lego HQ in Denmark during the summer was also a massive highlight.

In the next 6 months

I will be continuing to complete my results analysis and write-up from the recent phase of my research with children in the Tees Valley. This will then inform the design and implementation of the next wave of my research. I will also be working on some much-needed systematic review edits too!

Advice I'd give to fellow students

I'm a big Back to the Future fan. If I could go back in time to give my PhD induction year self some advice, this is what I would tell them:

- 1. **The learning is in the journey, not just the output:** Enjoy and reflect on the insights that you gleam as you go. Don't stress too much about turning it all into a written chapter.
- 2. Have a lazor focus: your topic will be broad and you can go down too many rabbit holes with it. Keep going back to your intent and research question. Consider how your ideas and reflections link back to this.
- 3. Set the agenda: nobody else is here to manage you, it requires discipline and habit. So, take ownership of your schedule and be realistic with your goals. But, set regular and challenging milestones for yourself to keep the pace and working rhythm.
- **4. Watch Back to the Future:** because it really is a great film.
