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Exploring the Occupation of Adaptive Skateboarding

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BACKGROUND

Advocates for adaptive skateboarding, strive to bring inclusivity to skateboarding through adaptative strategies that support participation for individuals with varied abilities. By exploring the contexts of occupation, occupational therapists can identify supporting and limiting factors of performance and shape interventions around client-centered values that promote participation (AOTA, 2020).

PROBLEM

There is a gap in the literature and knowledge of the occupation of adaptive skateboarding and the role of occupational therapy (OT) for promoting participation.

PURPOSE

To explore the occupation of adaptive skateboarding to increase the occupational knowledge and to inform occupational therapy's role.

Outcome objectives

- (a) Identify the supports and barriers for participation of adaptive skateboarding.
- (b) Develop a resource that supports individuals who desire to participate or who aim to support participation in adaptive skateboarding.

METHODS

Research Experience

Question What are the supports and barriers for participation in adaptive skateboarding?

- Individuals ages 18-65 who participate in adaptive skateboarding and/or WCMX
- Recruitment: Personal connections and snowball sampling

Survey (n = 41) & Interview (n = 6)

- 1. Background & Performance
- 2. Social & Cultural
- 3. Environment
- 4. Concept of Risk
- 5. Identity
- 6. Resource and Barriers

Videos (n = 11) Displayed participation in adaptive skateboarding to gather observable variables of the occupation.

Data Analysis Thematic Analysis (Braun & Clark, 2006). Visual-Verbal Video Analysis Method (Fazeli et al., 2023)

Community-Based Experience


Questions

- Volunteered with adaptive sports programs

	Catalyst for identity formation	Intersection of unique abilities and freedom to individualize occupational form encourages creativity/self-expression in <i>becoming</i> a "skater". Shared sense of respect and <i>belonging</i> with <i>being</i> a skater.	"I kind of look at it like as an art form [] I'm just totally expressing myself completely and honestly." -004
	Strength of community	Social environment embraces encouragement, collaboration, inclusion.	"I have never felt so welcomed in a space, especially as a trans, intersex, disabled person." -survey
	Supports of skill transference	Strength; balance; adaptive strategies; confidence in ability; emotional regulation; perseverance; mental health support.	"Whether we're gonna call it skateboarding, WCMX, or a life skill." -001


