Report of Health Officer

To the Citizens of the Town of Avon:

I hereby submit my report as Health Officer and School Physician of the town of Avon for the term April 1, 1945 to March 1, 1946.

There was no serious outbreak of any epidemic in the town this year.

Physical examination of the pupils was done and free vaccination and immunization was offered. I am pleased to report that the pupils of this town in the Valley School are almost 100% in vaccination and immunization. (Only one pupil not vaccinated.) However it is hoped that when these are offered this spring we can have a 100% school.

Examination of the eyes and ears was done by the teacher and defects of any nature included in the school examination record and the parents notified.

I wish to thank the parents of these school children for their cooperation in making our hygienic measures a success.

Report of Public Health Nurse

ANNUAL REPORT AVON, 1945

As another year draws to a close we pause to look back over our goals, those accomplished and those not yet completed. While our nursing service to your community is still in its infancy, we are very happy to report progress.

Visits to your school are planned for every other month and, on occasions, it has been possible to make monthly visits. At this time children with health problems are referred by the teacher for home visits and solutions are worked out with the parents. Did you know that the immunization record for your school is nearly 100%?

By working in close cooperation with the doctors your nurse has been able to contact the young expectant mothers and to confer with them on the care of their babies. As we all know, the foundation for good health begins long before the cradle. In many instances it has seemed advisable to continue home visiting after the youngster has passed his infant days.

Assisting in communicable disease control is another very important part of your public health nurse's work. Early recognition and treatment is vitally important in the control of all diseases. Tuberculin testing and x-ray are our best instruments in finding and preventing tuberculosis. This service is available during their high school years, the years during which they are most susceptible. Syphilis and gonorrhea are other diseases, the eradication of which is vital to the entire community. The recent outbreaks of diphtheria have brought to our minds the importance of immunization againt this disease for ALL children.

Services for Crippled Children have been offered to all children known to have crippling defects.

Your public health nurse wishes to take this opportunity to thank you for your cooperation and interest in the individual and community health.

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting of Avon, Maine, March 18, 1946

To Fred K. Toothaker, a Constable of the Town of Avon, in the County of Franklin,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Avon, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Avon Town House, in said town, on Monday, the 18th day of March, A. D. 1946, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To hear and act on the reports of the Town Officers.
- Art. 3. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the various Town Officers for the ensuing year, what compensation for labor on public roads.
- Art. 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00, more or less, for repairing Roads and Bridges, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Third Class Maintenance for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the

- provisions of Section 3, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00, more or less, for Winter and Spring Snow Removal for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for all School Expenses, both High and Common, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for the relief of Poor, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money for Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00, more or less, for Miscellaneous Town Charges, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cutting Bushes, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$619.60 for State Patrol, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Health Officer, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00 for County Nurse, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of property acquired by the town by tax process, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute municipal Quit Claim Deeds for such property.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan, or loans, in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such loan or loans to be paid

during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current year by taxes.

- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on notes issued by the Selectmen.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30.00 to pay the School Board for their services the ensuing year.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00, more or less, for Abatements, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to bond the necessary Town Officers, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum necessary to pay for Collection of Taxes, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to take care of overdraft on Support of Schools.
- Art. 25. To instruct the Selectmen just what roads of the town (other than State accepted roads) shall be plowed for winter use by autos and trucks, and to raise and appropriate sufficient money to put such road, if any, in shape so they can be plowed.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to instruct the School Board to have conveyance of scholars conveyed by the lowest responsible bidder.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to put School Bus down cross road from Mile Square to river road when such road is suitable.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to carry High School scholars on school bus.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$400.00, more or less, for new Snow Fence.

- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be used with Federal money for Pine Blister Rust work.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00, more or less, for Maine Publicity.
- Art. 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the above named Town House on Monday, March 18, the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters: from 9 o'clock in the forenoon until the close of said meeting.

Exhibits and schedules incorporated in this report impartially present the financial position of the town and the result of its operations for the period designated. Recommendations are also made which, we believe, are worthy of your consideration.

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of the Town of Avon March 7, 1945 to February 28, 1946

CASH

Cash receipts were checked in detail and found to be correctly recorded.

All expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants.

The Treasurer's cash balance of \$2,172.26 was reconciled with the bank balance.

ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

The amount of \$306.75, outstanding February 28, 1946, was received March 5, 1946.

TAXES RECEIVABLE

The 1945 tax commitment book was added and an adjustment of \$6.25 made. Approximately 89% of the current commitment was collected, abated, or transferred to the Tax Acquired Property account. The Tax Collector's final settlement of \$302.25 on all taxes, which had not been paid to the Treasurer as of the close of the municipal year, was set up as an account receivable and paid March 5, 1946. All outstanding taxes were checked and listed.

The excise tax receipts were added and with the exception of \$1.15 which was turned over to the Treasurer March 5, 1946, all collections were accounted for.

TAX LIENS

All transactions in this account were checked in detail and the outstanding liens listed.

TAX ACQUIRED PROPERTY

All transactions in this account were checked.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE

The accounts payable amount to \$2,444.45 and represent tuition due the towns of Phillips and Strong, and \$27.20 due Fred K. Toothaker as commission for collecting 1945 taxes.

NOTES PAYABLE

\$1,000 is still due on the original tractor loan and this was verified with the bank.

SURPLUS

At the beginning of the municipal year, there was a net deficit of \$115.81. During the year the net deficit decreased \$3,439.25, which resulted in a net surplus of \$3,323.44 at the end of the year. The major contributing factors to this change were the gain on sale of tax acquired property of \$1,521.40, and the payment of \$2,000 on notes by appropriation. Complete detail of the change may be found on Exhibit E of this report.

TRUST FUNDS

The cemetery perpetual care funds are invested in savings accounts and no expenditures were made from income during the year under examination.

GENERAL

The Tax Collector and Treasurer furnished corporate surety bonds. The records of the Selectmen and Treasurer were found to be in a satisfactory condition, but the records of the Tax Collector were in such

condition that more than the usual time was required in checking his accounts.

A test check was made of vouchers and payrolls and as far as could be determined from this examination, all appeared to be proper charges and correctly recorded.

Mail verifications were sent on outstanding taxes, tax liens and deeds.

Withholding tax and teachers' pension deductions were checked and it is suggested that instead of the method currently followed, a check be drawn on each warrant for such deductions and a Treasurer's receipt made to cover the check. By so doing, the tax and pension liabilities would be established on the town records.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended

THAT, the Tax Collector use triplicate receipts for all tax collections, and that he record them on the Tax Collector's Cash Sheet in consecutive order with each year's tax being shown.

THAT, all cash sheets be numbered.
