Language Revitalization

Saving a language is possible with time and dedication. Five important steps for successful revitalization efforts are listed below:



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Linguists predict that half of all world languages will disappear by the next century.

Factors of language vitality:

- #1: Intergenerational language transmission
- #2: Absolute number of speakers
- #3: Proportion of speakers within the total population
- #4: Trends in existing language domains
- #5: Response to new media and domains
- #6: Materials for language education and literacy
- #7: Governmental and institutional language policies
- #8: Community members' attitudes towards their own language
- #9: Amount and quality of documentation

The United Nations has declared 2022-2032 the "International Decade of Indigenous Languages" to raise awareness for language revitalization efforts.

Navajo Language Revitalization

Using the Graded Intergenerational **Disruption Scale developed by linguist** Joshua Fishman, an analysis of the Navajo language revealed that:

Fewer children are learning Navajo as a native language

English is overtaking Navajo in many language domains

With "critical linkages... breaking down," greater community awareness and investment is needed to preserve the language
