#### WHAT IS A FALSE CONFESSION?

# When a person confesses to a crime they didn't commit

#### STATISTICS

- 28% of convictions overturned through DNA involved a false confession (Lackey, 2020)
- 81% of those false confessions were given in murder cases (Lackey, 2020)

- Elements of Oral and Written Statements

## **REID INTERROGATION METHOD**

#### CAUSES- PHYSICAL FACTORS

- Sleep deprivation
- Isolation
- Lack of food or water

### CAUSES- MINIMIZING

- Presenting the Alternative Question
- Reduce moral judgement
- Implicit vs explicit promises

### CAUSES- MISREPRESENTING EVIDENCE

- Lying about what evidence was found
- Falsifying the results of a polygraph test
- Upheld by the Supreme Court
- Primary cause of coerced-internalized confessions

## PREVENTION- REDUCE FREQUENCY

- Change how interrogations are conducted
- PEACE method
  - Created in England, implemented across several countries
  - Interview only, no interrogation
- Instate time limits
- Allow breaks for sleeping, eating, etc.

### **PREVENTION- REDUCE IMPACT**

- Record interrogations
  - Allows for disputes over coercion to be settled faster
  - Allows judge to review confession
  - Allows jury to determine whether a confession was coerced
