

The Alaska Victimization Survey

The Alaska Victimization Survey (AVS) is funded by the Council on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault and conducted by the University of Alaska Anchorage Justice Center. A total of 2,100 English-speaking women in Alaska aged 18 or older participated by telephone in the AVS between July 2020 and November 2020. The 2020 AVS asked respondents about their mental health history to determine if they may be an Alaska Mental Health Trust beneficiary, identifying Alaskans with mental illness, developmental disabilities, chronic alcohol or drug addiction, Alzheimer's disease and related dementia, and traumatic brain injuries.
