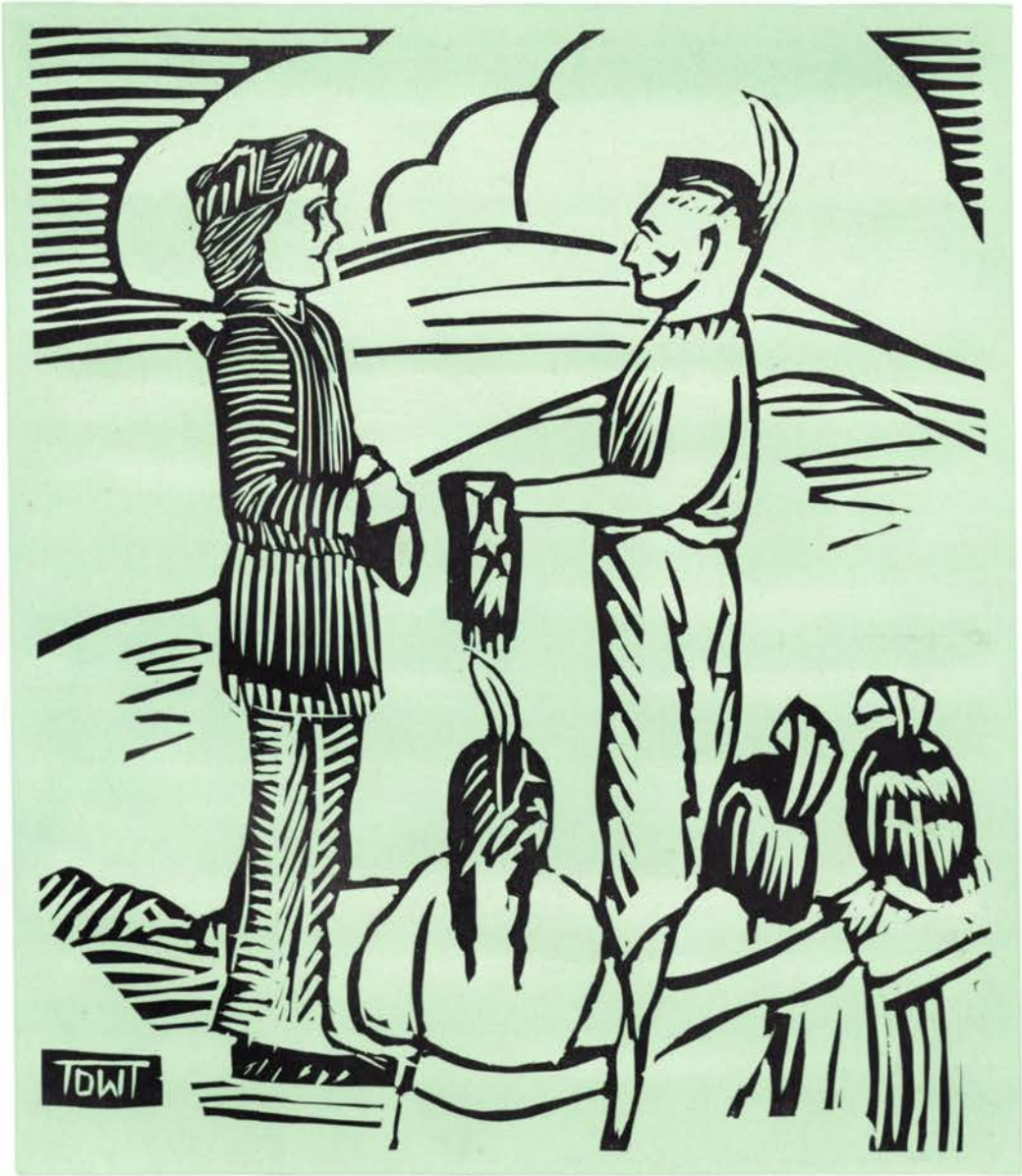

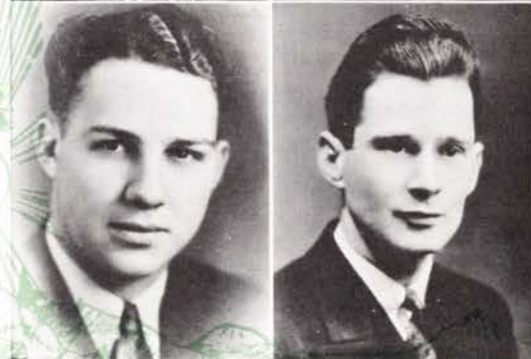

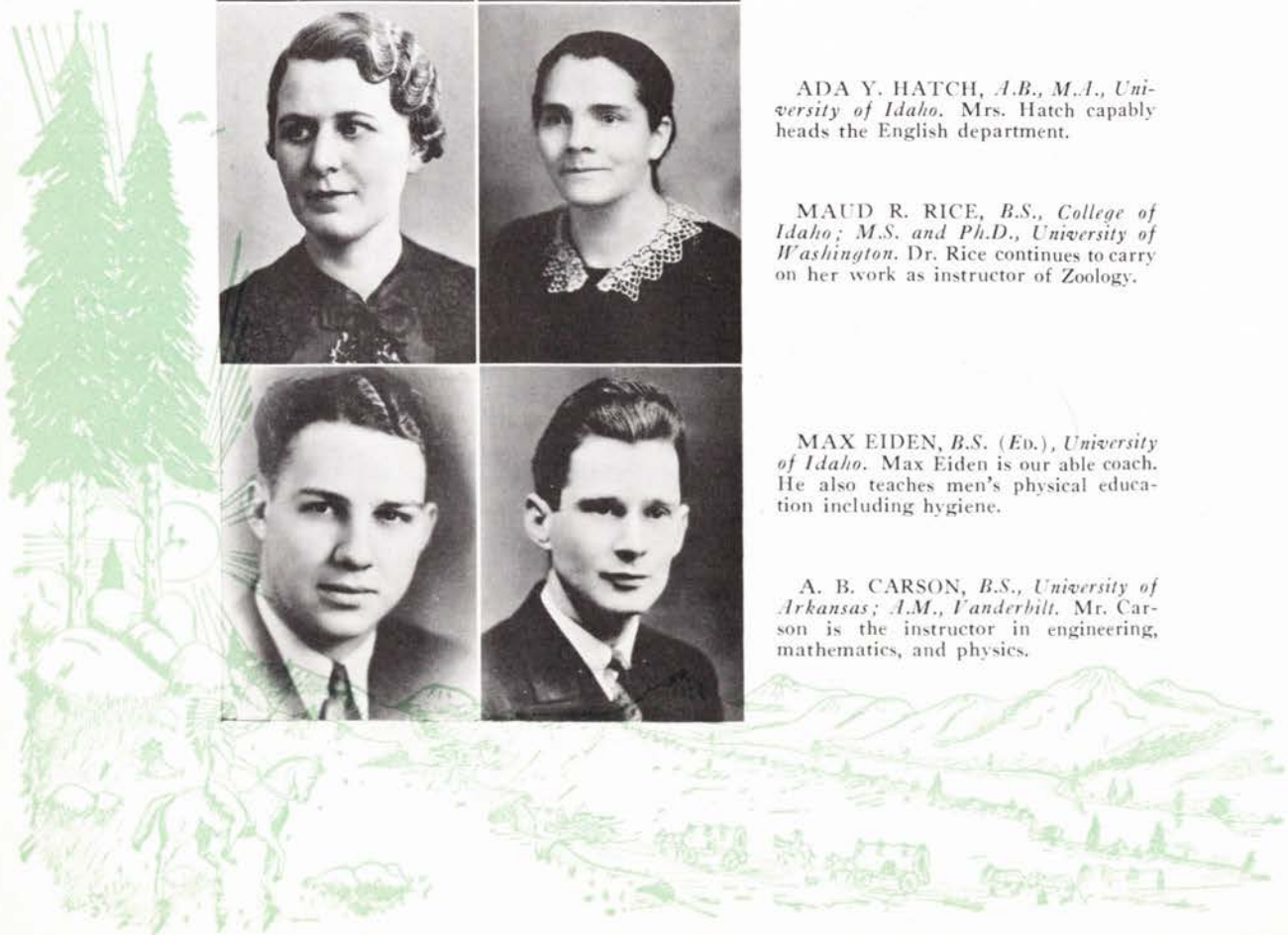
ADA Y. HATCH, *A.B.*, *M.A.*, *University of Idaho*. Mrs. Hatch capably heads the English department.

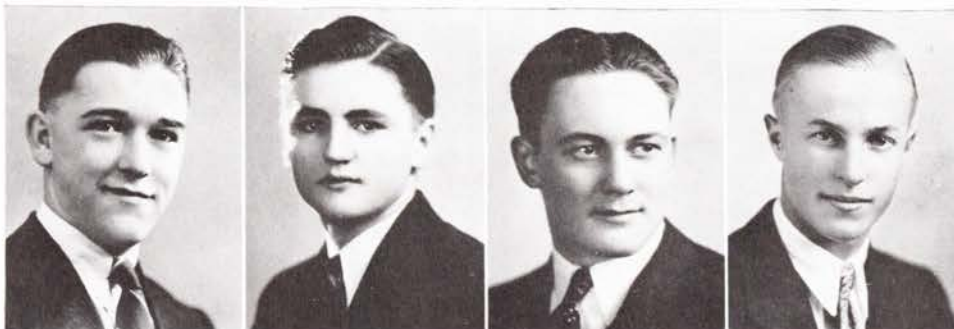

Executive Board

Tribunal

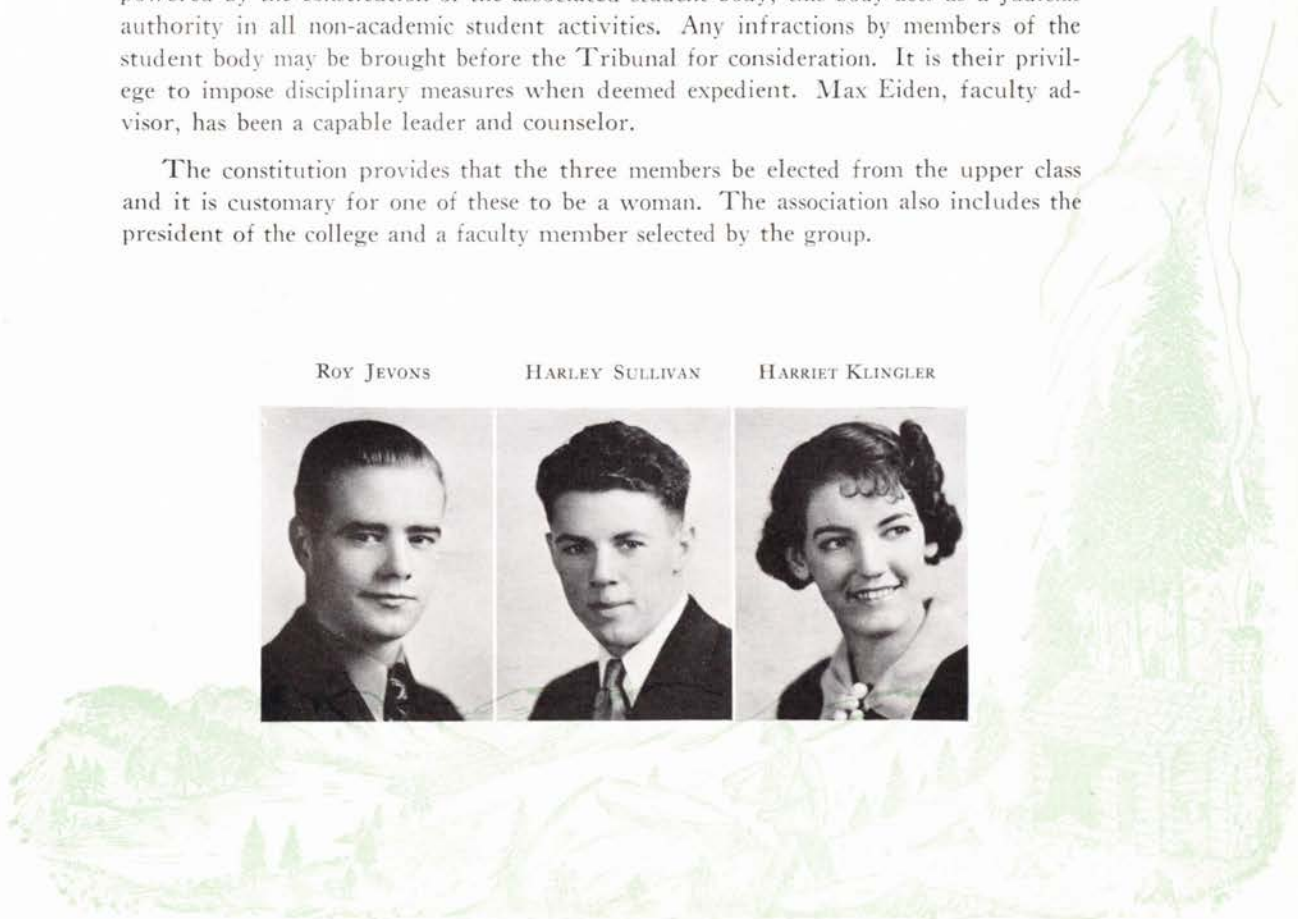

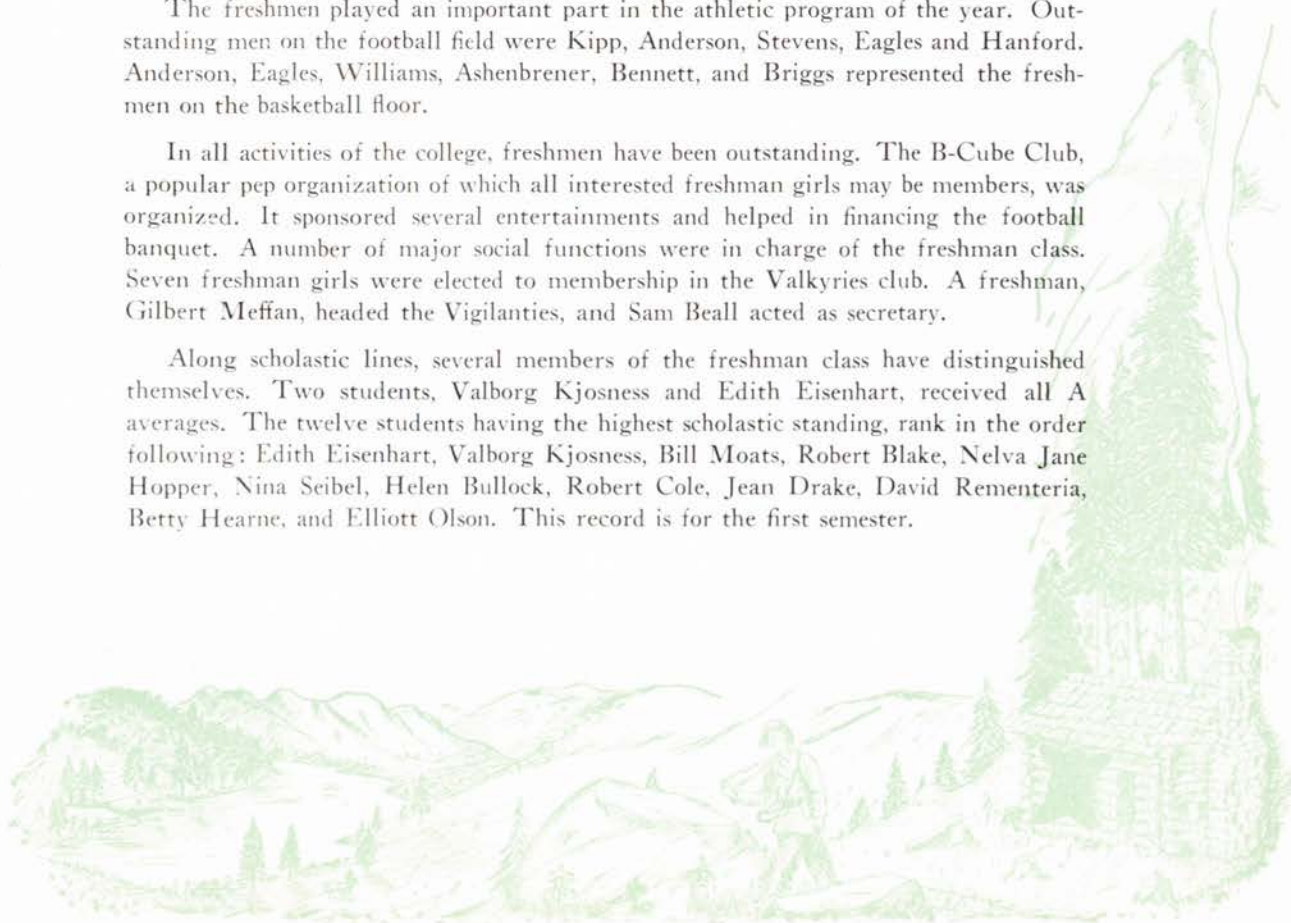
Freshman Class

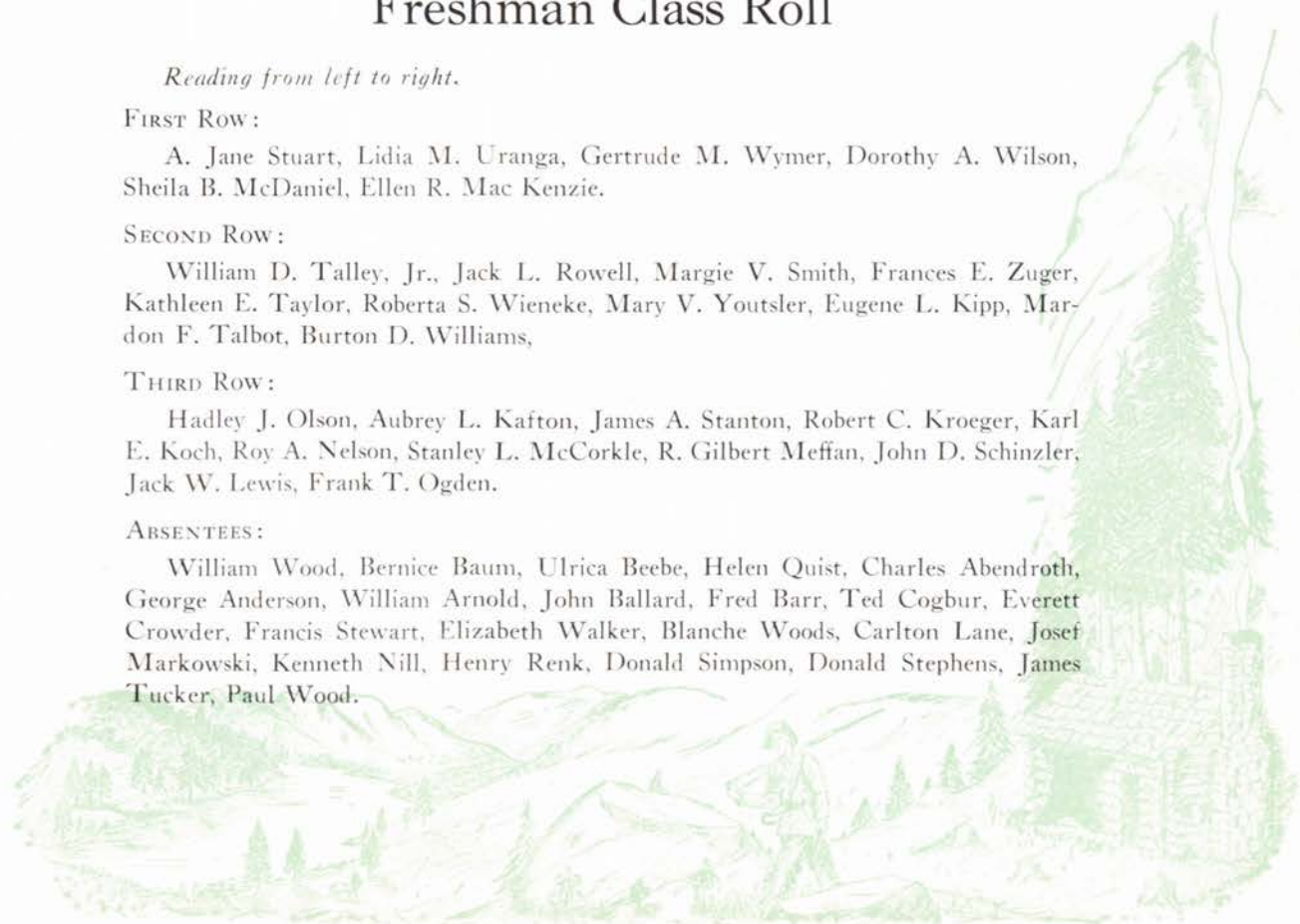

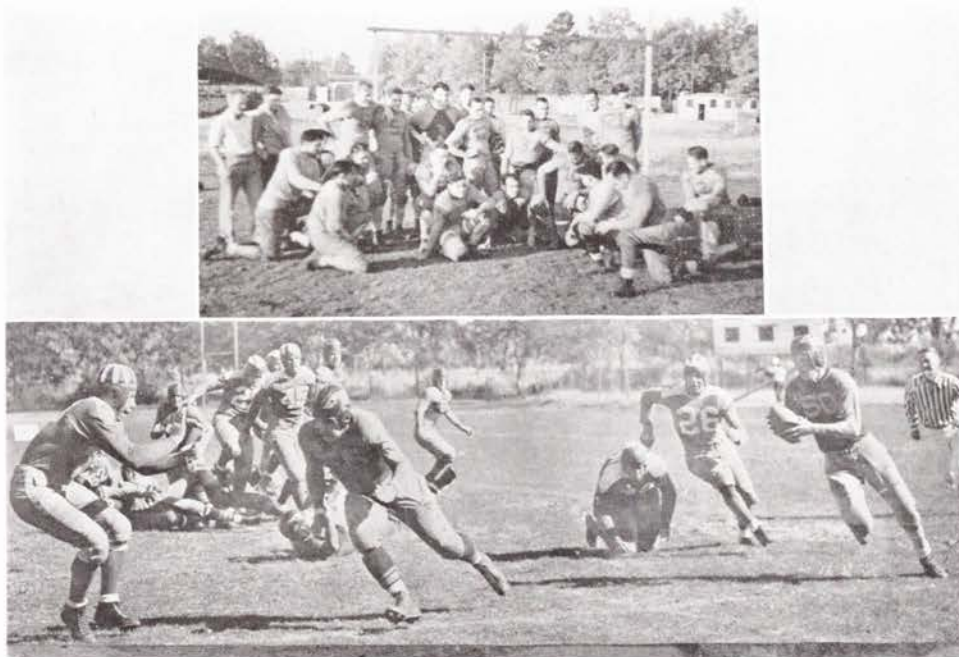

Football

Challenged with an exceedingly hard schedule, Coach Max Eiden led the 1936 Broncos through another successful season. Playing against schools several times its own size, Boise Junior College upheld its reputation as a very formidable opponent on the gridiron.

The following men received their letters: Anderson, Ashenbrenner, Ballard, Belsher, Carpenter, Eagles, Guisasola, Hanford, Kipp, Morgan, Nally, Nill, O'Neill, Piedmont, Stephens, Tucker, Weber, Urresti, and Aker, manager.

The Broncos played a spectacular game against the Ricks College Vikings. The Vikings, with a series of long passes, scored 13 points while the Broncos, using line plays, plunged across for three touchdowns, which netted 19 points and victory.

In a hard fought night game at Boise, the Broncos gained their second victory of the season. The Gooding College Bob Cats scored upon the Broncos for the first time in four years. B. J. C., however, crossed the Bob Cat's goal line four times for a total of 26 points.

Lewiston State Normal School, intercepting a number of Bronco passes, won the game played at Lewiston, October 9th. Following this game, the B. J. C. squad was invited to attend the University of Idaho homecoming game.

The Broncos, playing a brilliant game of football, scored the greatest upset of the season when they defeated the University of Idaho's freshman team 2-0. The alert B. J. C. men scored the safety early in the second quarter.



The Broncos played the Eastern Oregon Normal School at their homecoming. Leading 3-0 at the end of the first quarter, the Broncos were driven back by a hard fought rush of Oregon's line, yielding four touchdowns.

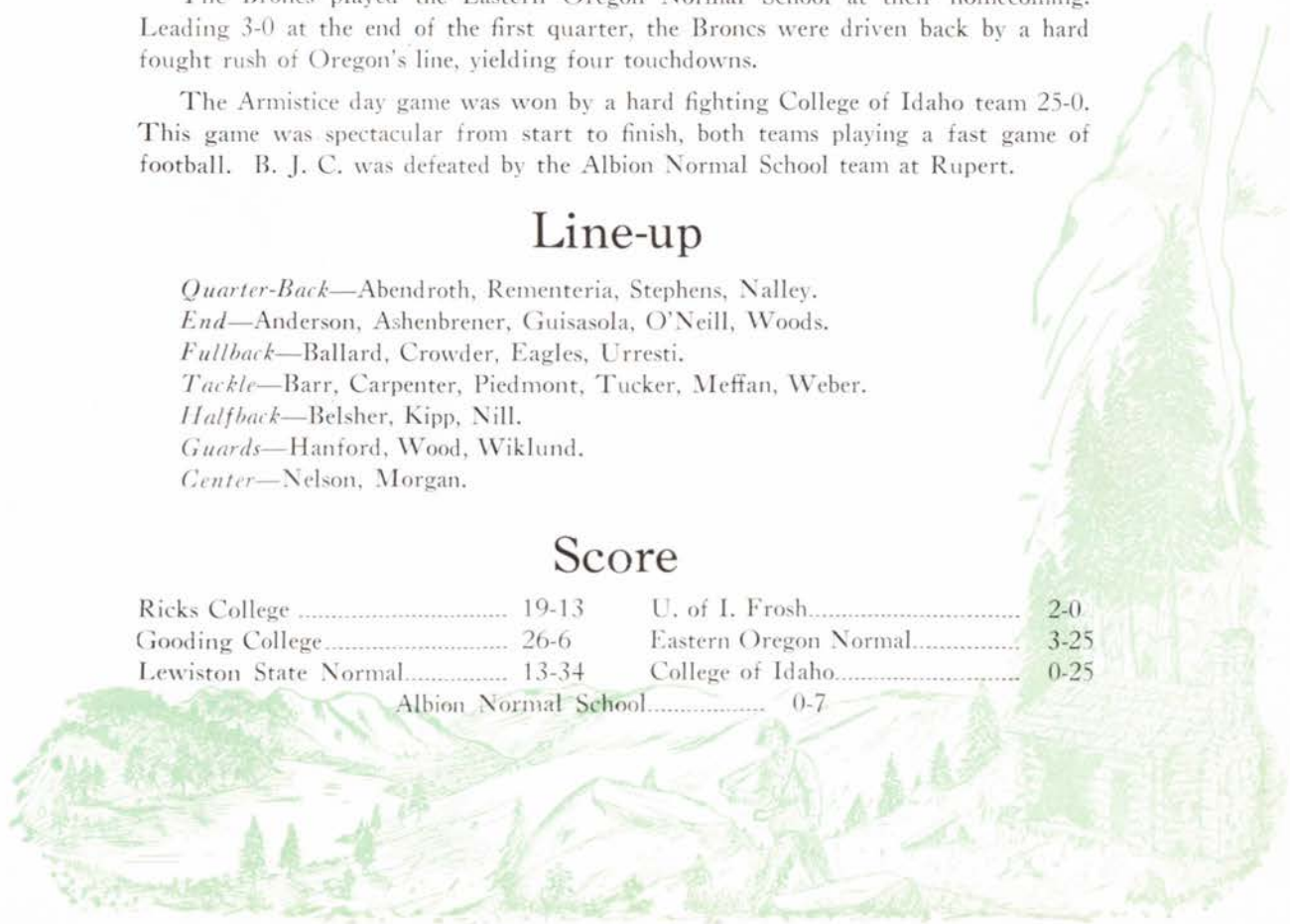

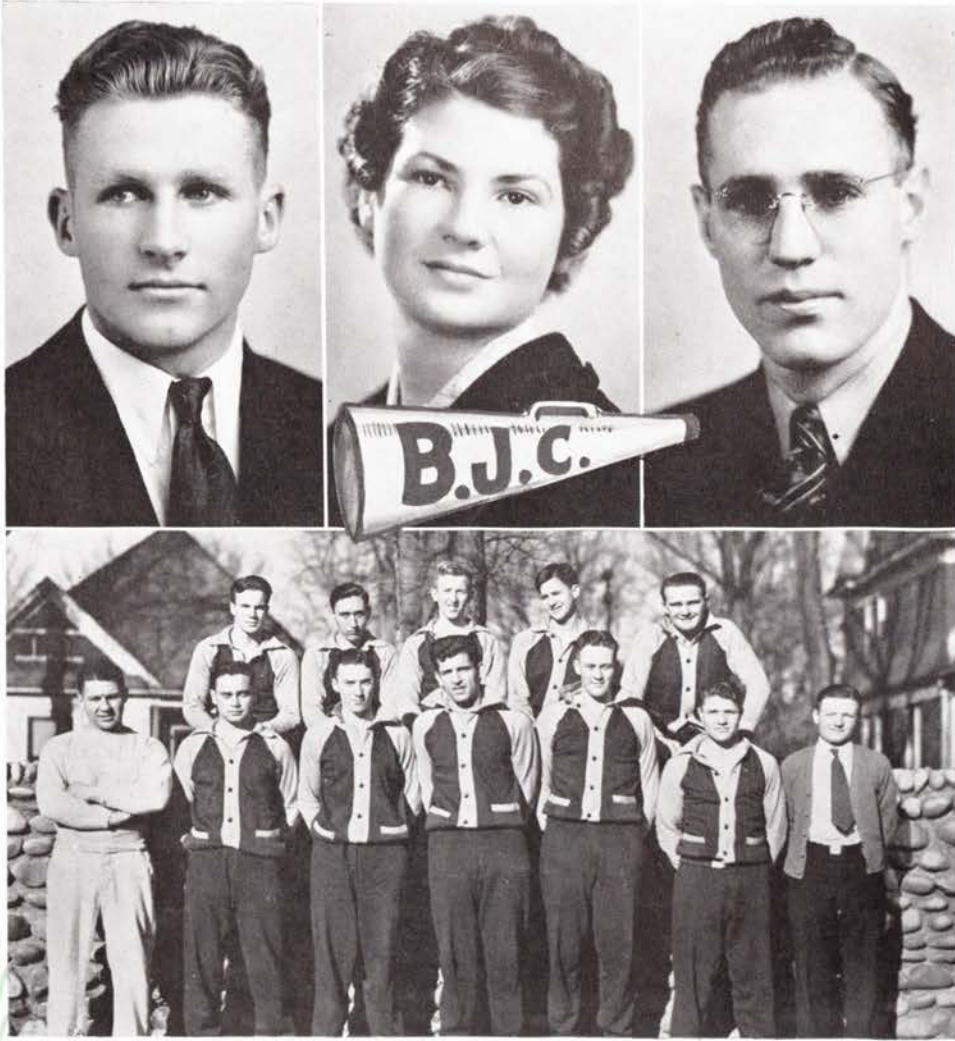

Yell Leaders

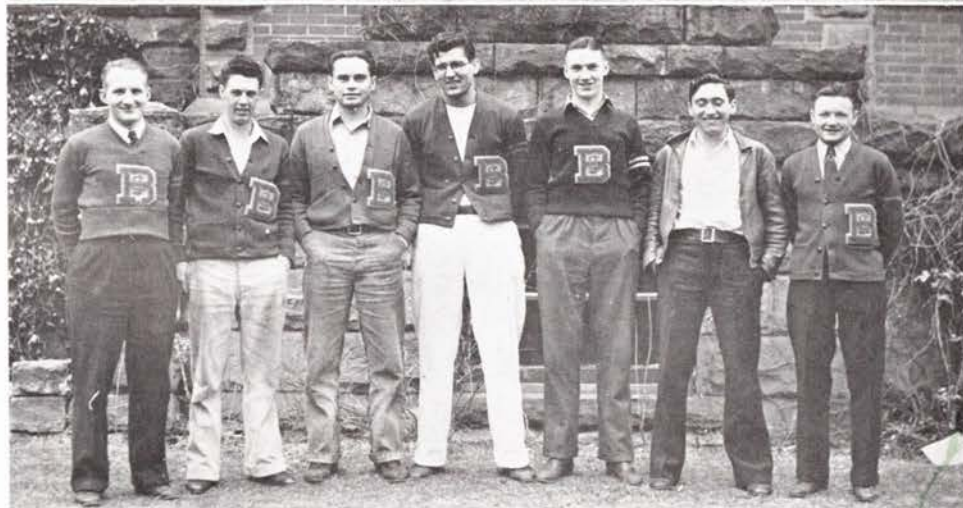

Badminton

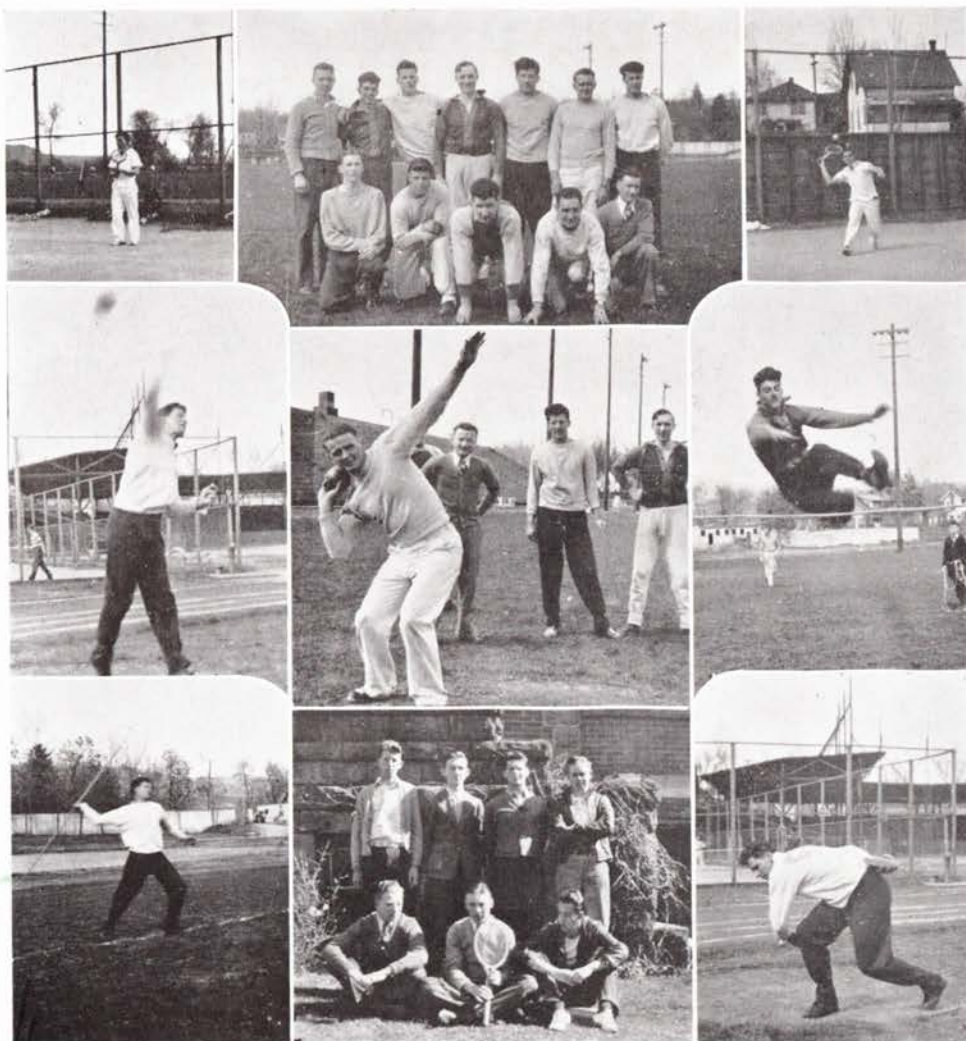
Badminton, suitable for indoor diversion, played an important part in the college winter sports program.

Women's Athletics

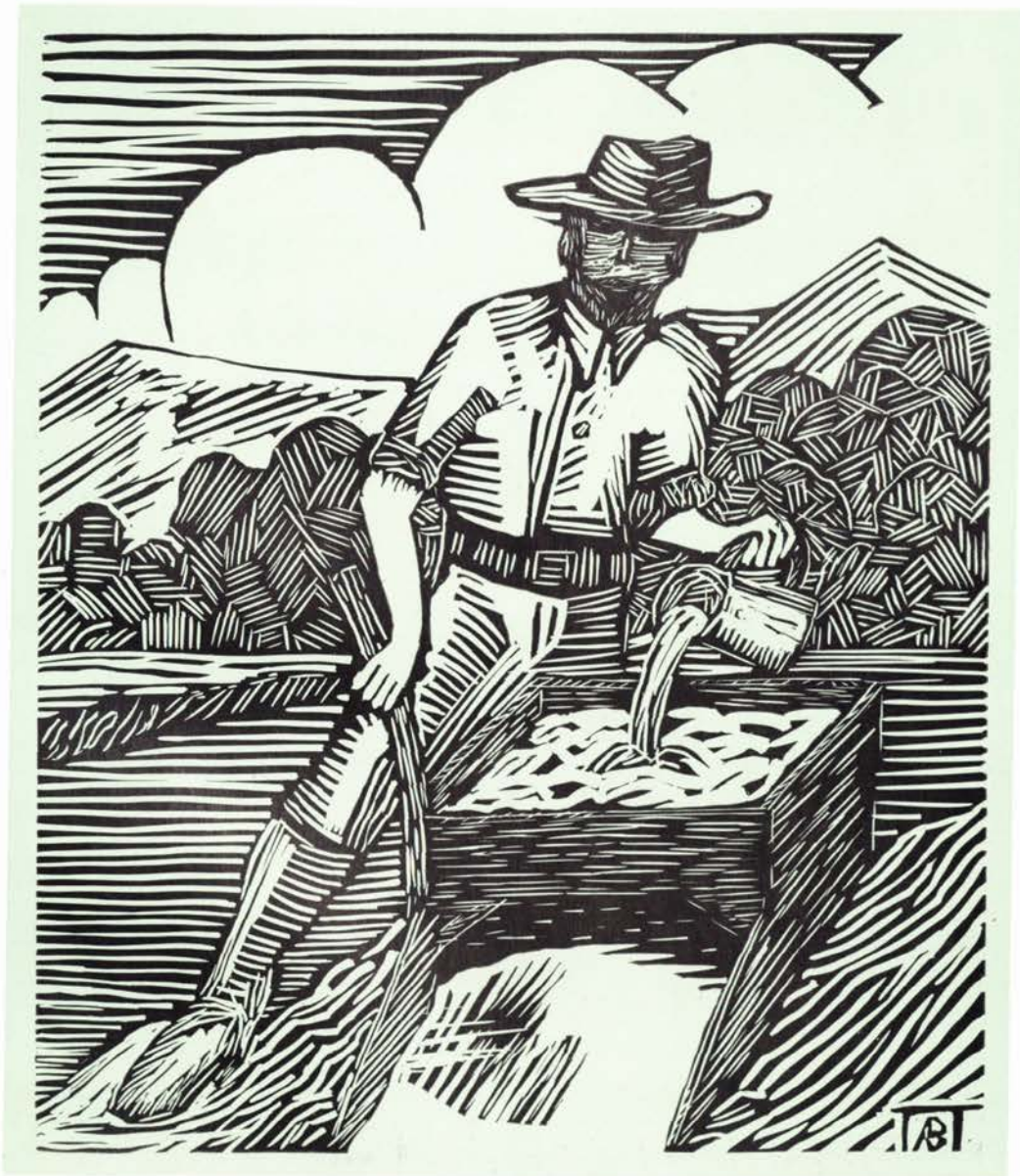

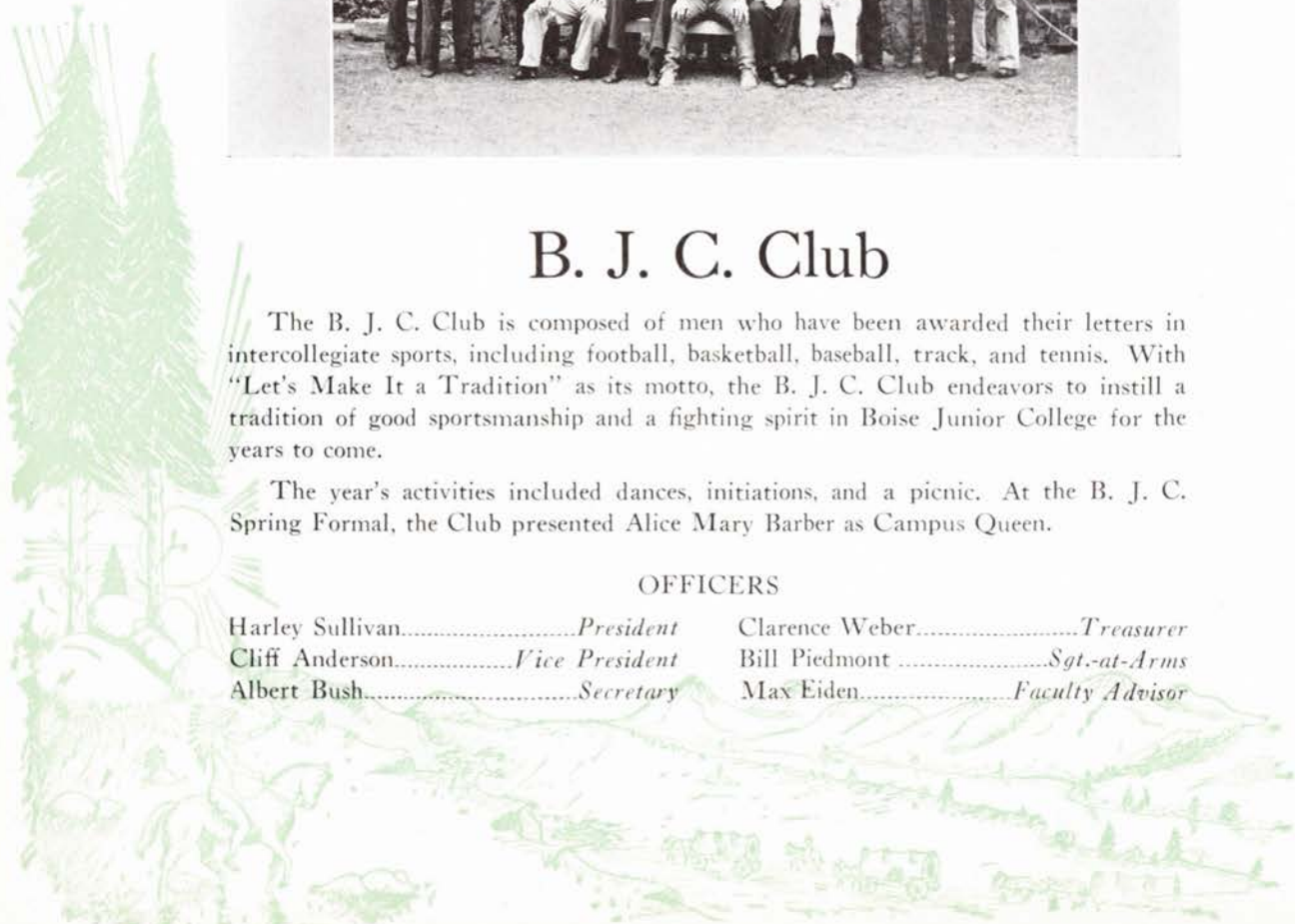
B. J. C. Club

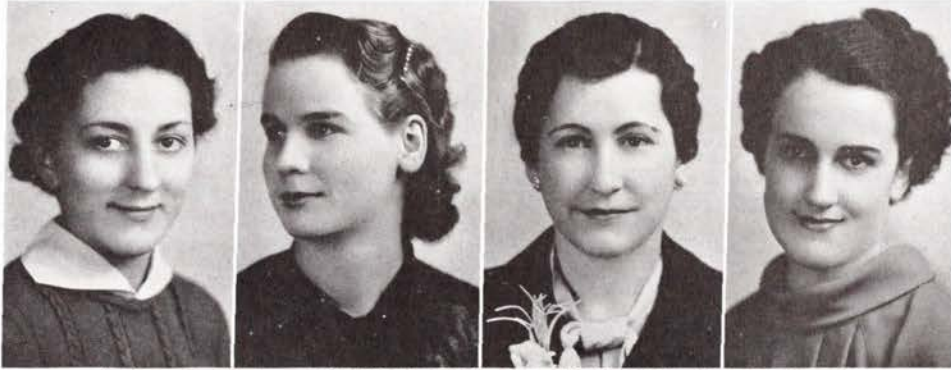

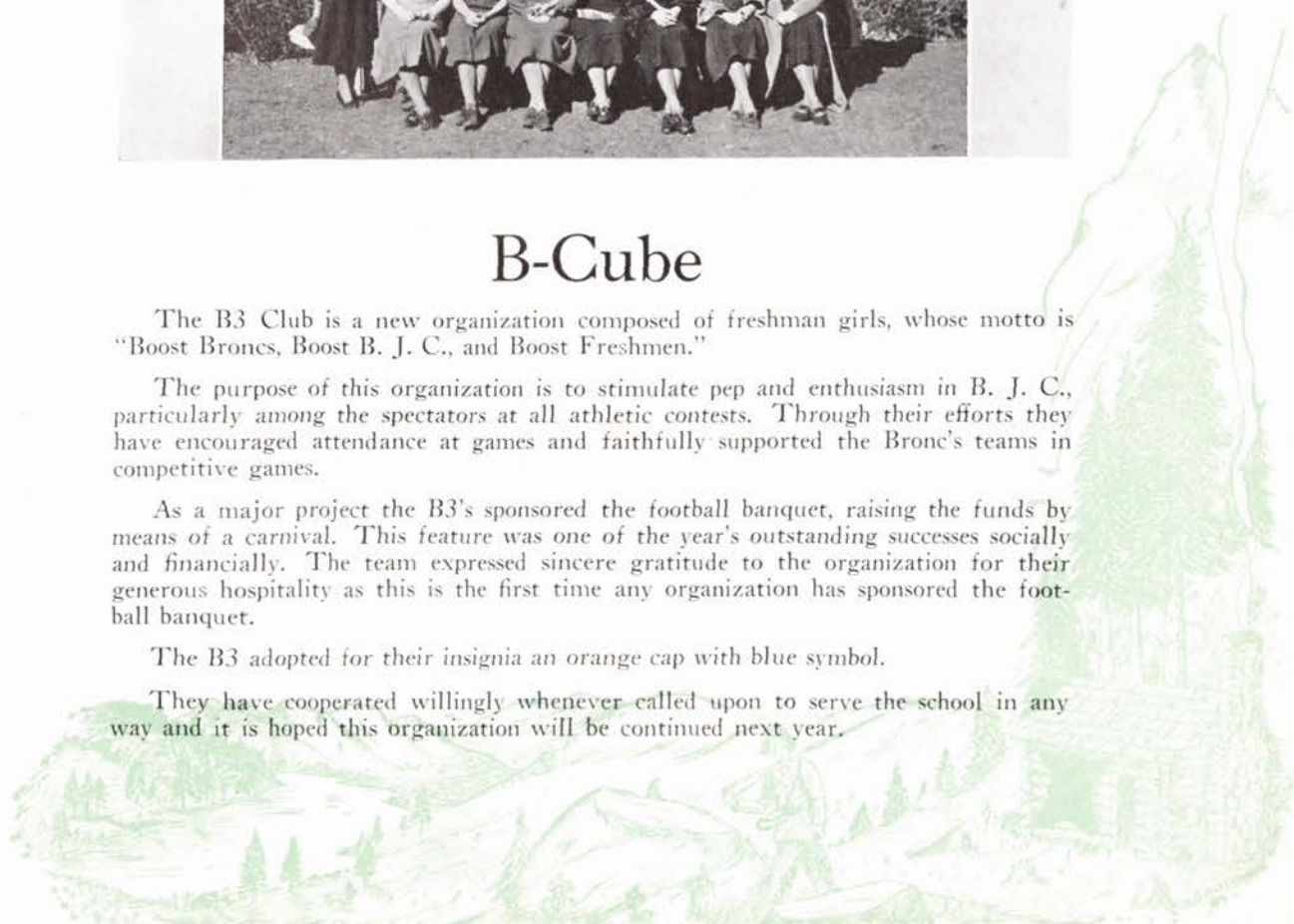
The B3 Club is a new organization composed of freshman girls, whose motto is "Boost Broncs, Boost B. J. C., and Boost Freshmen."

They have cooperated willingly whenever called upon to serve the school in any way and it is hoped this organization will be continued next year.



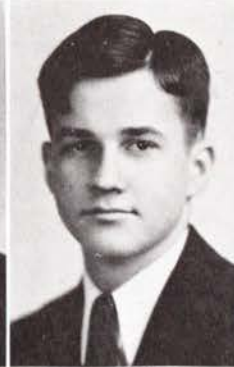

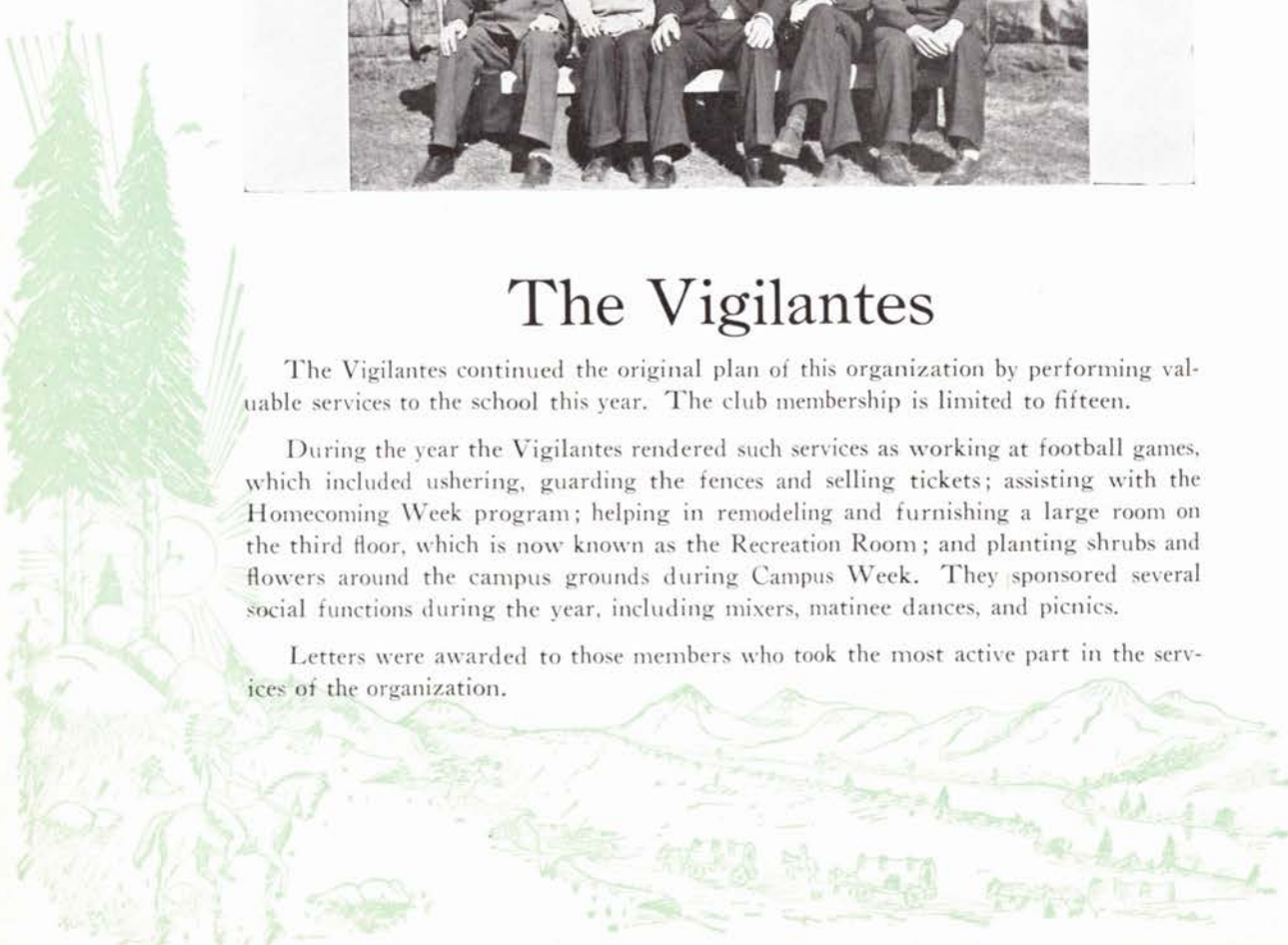


The Vigilantes

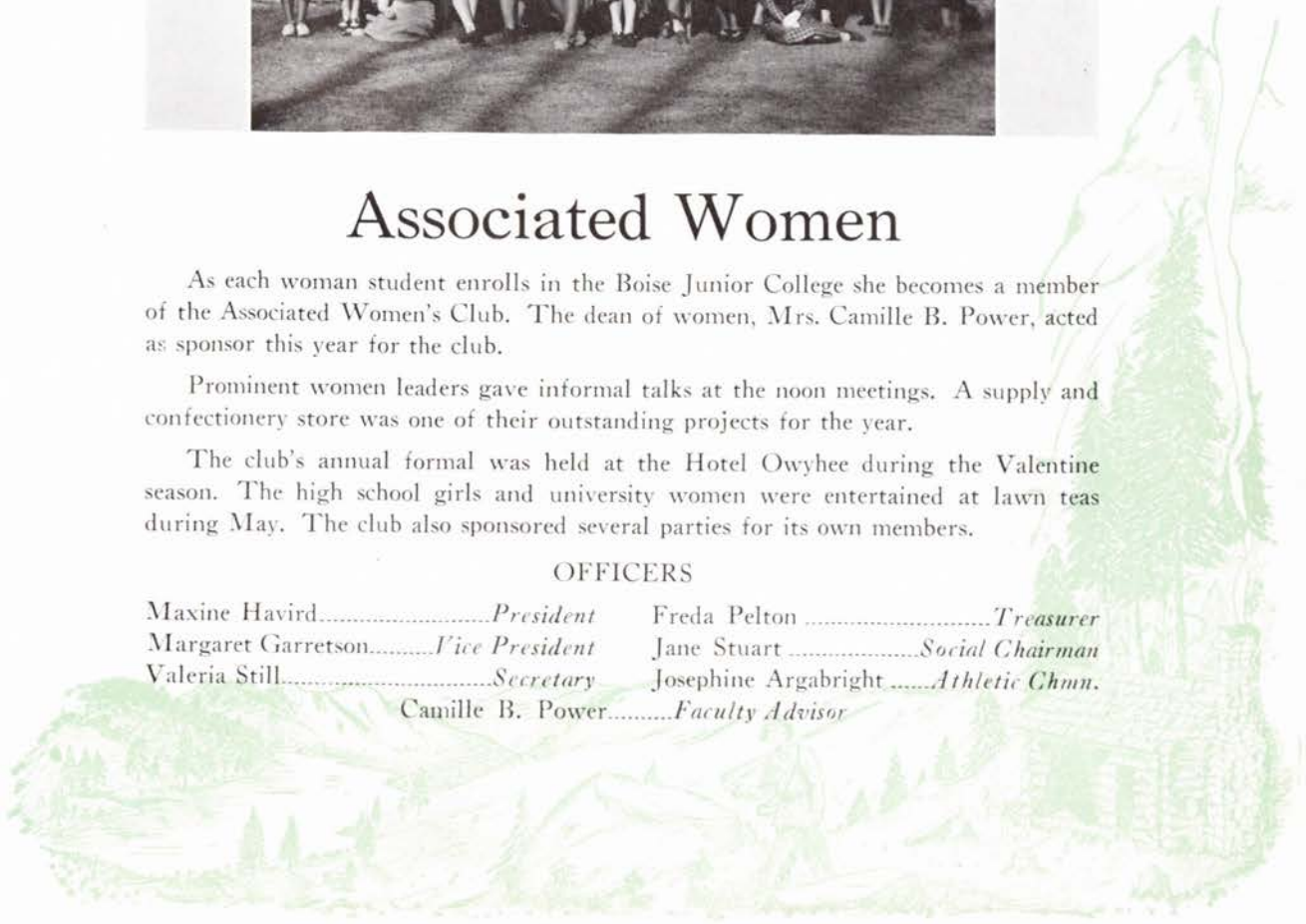

May 10 to 15 was set aside for Campus Week. It was climaxed with an informal dance on Friday.

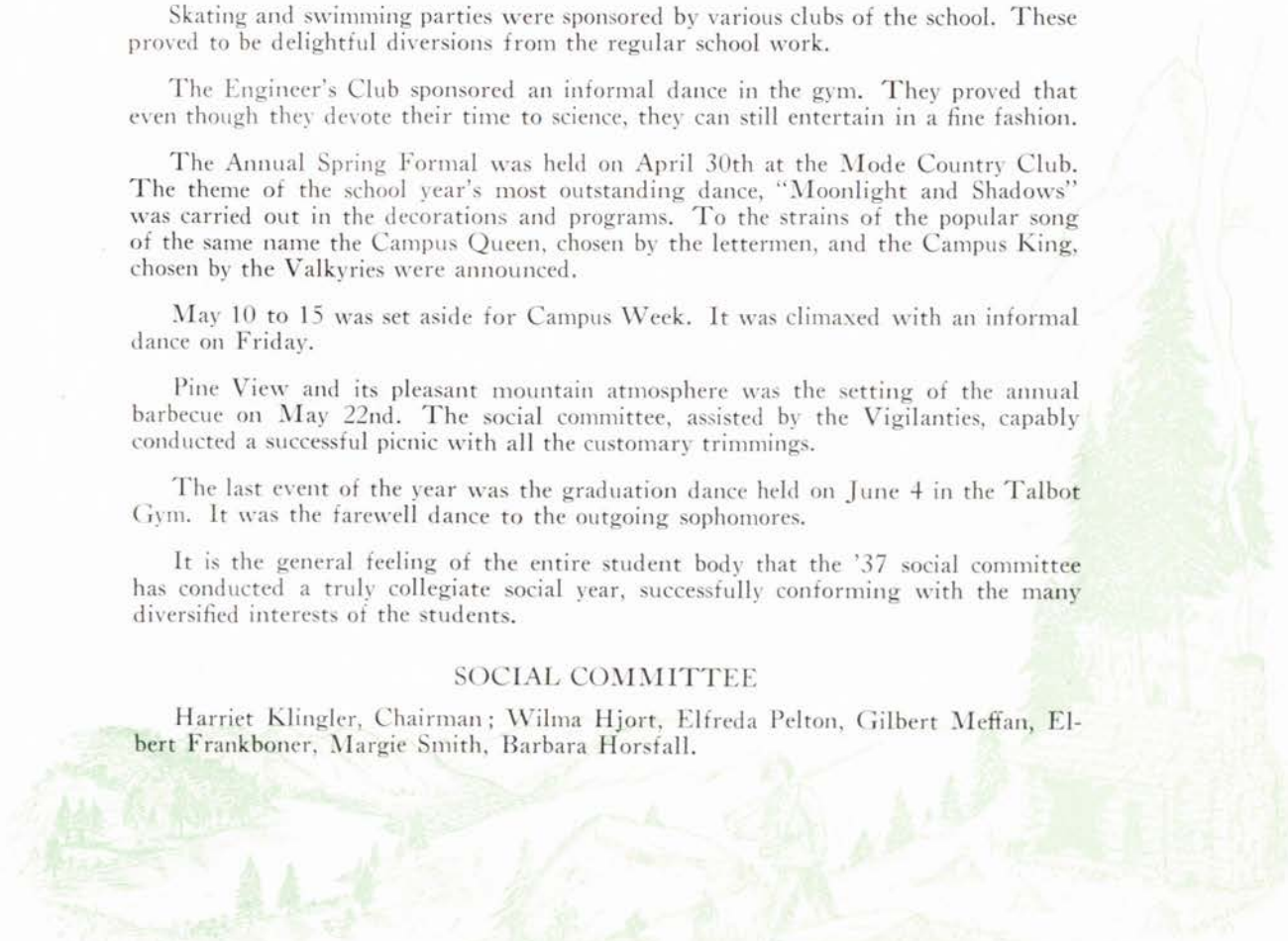

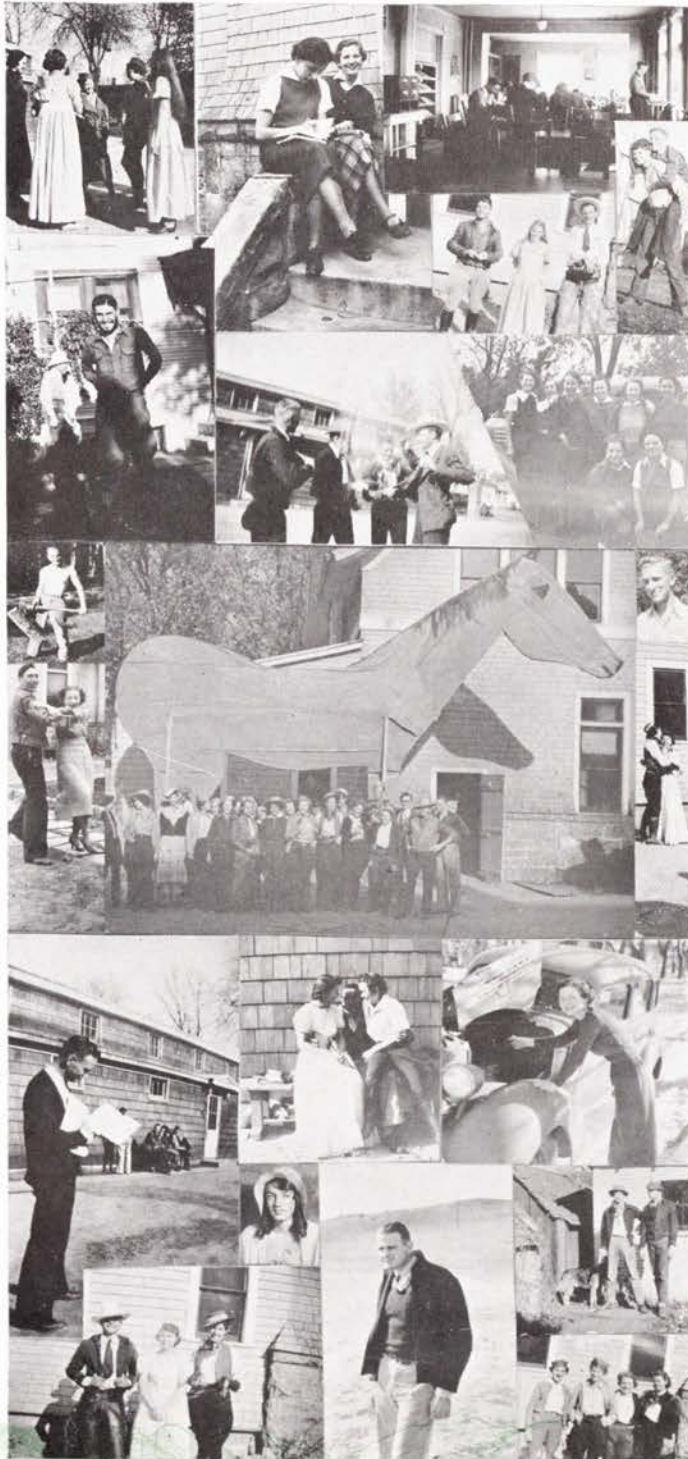
ALICE MARY BARBER, *Campus Queen*

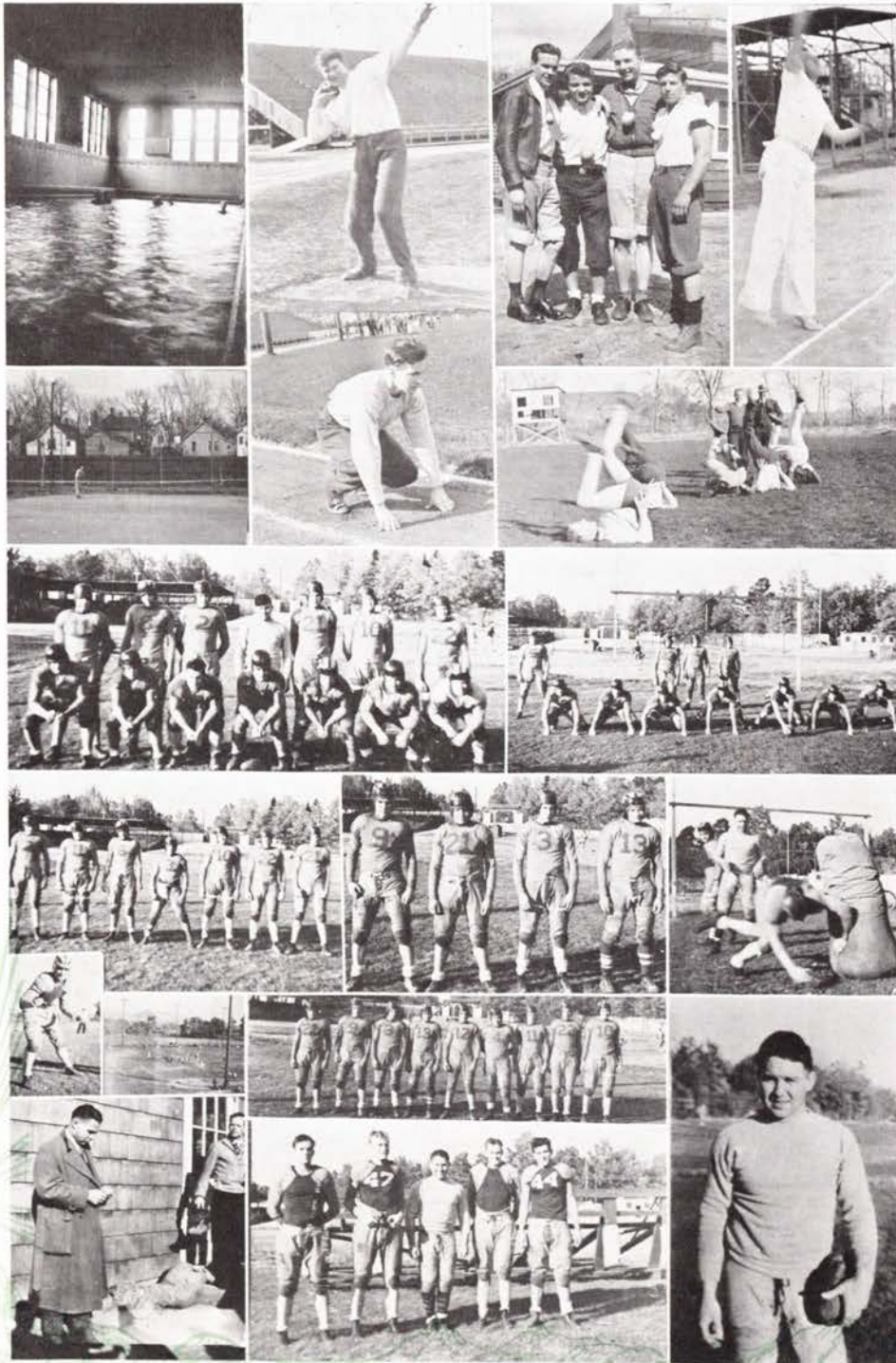

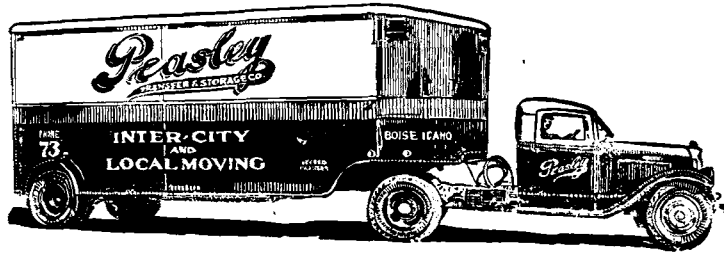
