## And still more challenges to higher education

Studies conducted by government agencies and well. respected foundations are com respected foundations are com-
ing to the conclusion that many ing to the conclusion that many
disgrunted students have been disgranted students have bee
expressing for a long time: America's sytem of higher education is failing.

The interpretations and recommendations of these various studies may conflict, but the general conclusions about college concur: The hallowed institution is crumbling.

That attitude has now reached into the government itself. The Office of Education (under the Department of Health. Educa tion and Welfare,) came out with a policy statement on career education which reflects the criticism currently leveled against American education. The crux of that office's The crux of that office's
conclusions is that American education is failing to prepare students for' the "world of work."

The policy statement concludes that:

- Tho many people leaving the American educational system are deficient in the baste skills required for a modern, rapidly changing society.
$\therefore T(x)$ many students fail to sec the meaningful relationship the meaningful relationship
between what they are being between what they are being
asked to learn in schos! and what they will do when they leave the çducational system.
- American education, as prea ently structured, meets the

Etheathonal need of that monorite of perpte who sreatu ally graduate from ollage it Gals to give attention to the bas majority of students whe will never graduste from college.

American edesemon has no hept pace with the rapidtey of change in our "post-industrial "coupational sextety." is a result, when wurker qualifica tions ate compared with jot requirements. there are tre mendous numbers of orefed wated and under-educated workers. The boredom of the workers. The boredom of the
wereducated worker and frus over eduated worker and frus
tration of the under educated tration of the under educated
worker have contributed to growing worker alienation in the total excupational soriety."

The growing nead for the presence of women in the workforce has not been reflected adequately in high school or college.

Insufficient attention has been given to learning opportunitics whichexist outside the structure of formal cducation.

The general public, including patints, business and labor ha not been given an adequate role in the forming of cducational pelicy at all levels.

American chucation does not meet the needs of minotity or coonomically divadvantaged students.

Fducation after high school has not given enough emphasia fooccupational programs being "in harmony with academic
programs."

The Carnegic Corporation, private cducational foundation which gave over 513 milliog in krants last year. also came to the conclusion that higher cducation has not fulfilled is , blikations and is headed bor serious trouble. But, contrary to the govertiment's stress on more carcer-oriented education the Carnegie report found that there has been too muct cmphasis on conomic and career goals.

The Carnegic study was capped by an essay by its president. Alan Piler, entitled Higher Edacation la the Na . tion's Consclousness. Pifer warned that unless great chang. es are made, the nation's colleges could end up as an 'array of stagnant institutions. plagued by low norale, unable o meet the demands of socicty."

To counteract this trend, said Pifer, universities "must stop rying to sell higher education to potenfial students on the grounds primarily of its economic benefits." The emphssis. rather, should be on developing "intellectual abilitics, humanistic understandings and acsthetic sensiblillics."

The Carnegic findings also concluded that liberal arts, "which are the very heart of higher education," must not be neglected. "We dare not turn out narrowly trained graduates who lack the breath and flexibility of mind that will be required for intelligent decisionmaking in a supldly changing world."

## Womens/mens center discussed

The Senate last Tuesday passed a bill that would give each registering full time student the option to carmark 50 cents of their $\$ 17$ ASBSU fee to go towards a womens/mens center. Sue McKenna, a member of the womens group. said that the original purpose of the center was to be a self-help clinic. The functions would include gynecology information. auto mechanics schooling, consciousness raising. library and other improvement aspects.
Members of the Senate setting up the fund if there was no previously designated group to reccive and disperse the monies. Dave Wynkoop noted that "For all they know, the Senate (next years) may allocate it to Jack the Ripper." A menber of the Women's Alliance in speak ing to the point noted that the Senate has the power 'to allocate moncy to Jack the Ripper anyway. Students have the intelligence to look at that (the group) and see if it is vague." Lenny Hertling added that next years students will be as "analytical." financially as was this years
The bill passed with only one member of the Senate. Doug Gochnour, voting no.
