## Local

### Ohio removes 155,000 inactive voter registrations

On Friday, August 2, Ohio removed 155,000 inactive and out-of-date voter registrations from the voter rolls, according to the [Associated Press](#).

“Every Ohioan, regardless of their political views, should care about accurate voter rolls,” Ohio Republican Secretary of State Frank LaRose said in a statement Friday. “Diligent list maintenance helps prevent voter fraud and ensures the voice of the voters is heard on Election Day.”

### Ohio historical society takes control of ancient ceremonial site

On Thursday, August 1, Ohio’s historical society announced a deal that will allow it to take control of an ancient ceremonial and burial earthworks site located on the site of a golf course, according to the [Associated Press](#).

The deal avoids a jury trial to determine the site’s fair market value that had been repeatedly postponed over the years. The Octagon Earthworks are among eight ancient areas in the Hopewell Earthworks system that were named a UNESCO World

Heritage Site last year. The historical society, a nonprofit state history organization, takes control of them on Jan. 1 and plans to open them to visitors.

## National

### Justice Department sues TikTok

On Friday, August 2, the Justice Department sued TikTok, accusing the company of violating children's online privacy law and running afoul of a settlement it had reached with another federal agency, according to the Associated Press.

The complaint was filed together with the Federal Trade Commission in a California federal court. TikTok allegedly violated federal law that requires kid-orientated apps and websites to get parental consent before collecting personal information of children under 13. It also says the company failed to honor requests from parents who wanted their children's accounts deleted.

## Global

### Russian prisoners exchange

On Thursday, August 1, the U.S. and Russia completed their biggest prisoner swap in post-cold war history, according to the Associated Press. Russia released journalists Evan Gershkovich and Alsu Kurmasheva and fellow American Paul Whelan, in a multinational deal that set two dozen people free.

In exchange, the U.S. and its allies released Russians charged or convicted of serious crimes, including Vadim Krasikov, who was convicted in Germany in 2021, two alleged sleeper agents jailed in Slovenia and Roman Seleznev, a convicted computer hacker who was charged by federal authorities in the U.S.

### Wright State women's soccer team falls to Illinois in season opener

On Thursday, Aug. 15, the Wright State women's soccer team fell to Illinois 6-0 in their season opener. Illinois had an early lead scoring two goals in the first half. Wright State ended the night with three shots on goal.

The raiders will continue on to play Akron University on Sunday, Aug. 25.

## National

### Five people charged in Matthew Perry's death

On Thursday, Aug. 15, five people were charged in connection with Matthew Perry's death from a ketamine overdose last year, according to the Associated Press. Among those five people are Perry's assistant and two doctors.

"These defendants took advantage of Mr. Perry's addiction issues to enrich themselves. They knew what they were doing was wrong," U.S. Attorney Martin Estrada said Thursday while announcing the charges.

## Aid groups in Gaza aim to avert a polio outbreak

On Friday, Aug. 16, Palestinian health officials reported the first case of polio in an unvaccinated 10 month-old child in the Gaza city of Deir al-Balah, according to the Associated Press.

The threat of polio is rising fast in the Gaza Strip. Aid groups call for an urgent pause in the war so they can ramp up vaccinations and stop a full outbreak. The virus was detected in wastewater in six different locations in July.

## **Governor DeWine announces innovation hubs in Dayton**

On Monday, Aug. 19, Ohio Governor Mike DeWine announced the launch of new innovations hubs in Dayton. Funded by state, local and private funds, the project aims to make Dayton a global leader in the development of digital transformation technologies and will support the U.S. Air Force to revolutionize how it designs and manufactures weapons, software, airplanes and more.

The project will be headquartered in the soon to be constructed on Main Innovation Hub's Digital Transformation Center (DTC) on the former Montgomery County fairgrounds.

“This new collaboration will be transformative for this region, leading to more investments, more jobs, and more of the world’s most innovative thinkers calling Dayton home,” Governor DeWine said in the announcement.

## **National**

### **RFK Jr. suspends his campaign and backs Donald Trump**

On Friday, Aug. 23, Robert F. Kennedy Jr. suspended his independent campaign for President and endorsed Donald Trump, according to the Associated Press. Later on Friday, Kennedy joined Trump onstage at a Rally in Arizona.

Kennedy said internal polls had shown that his campaign would hurt Trump, though recent polls don't provide clear indication that this is the case. Kennedy cited free speech, the war in Ukraine and “a war on our children” as some of the reasons why he would try to remove his name from the ballot in battleground states.

“These are the principal causes that persuaded me to leave the Democratic Party and run as an independent, and now to throw my support to President Trump,” Kennedy said at his event in Phoenix.

## Mike Lynch and five others killed in yacht wreck

On Monday, Aug. 19, a superyacht sank during a freak storm off of Sicily, according to the [Associated Press](#). The Bayesian, a 56-meter yacht, was believed to be struck by a tornado over the water, known as a waterspout. Investigators are looking into the wreck as a sailboat near the Bayesian remained largely unscathed.

British tech giant Mike Lynch and five other people were missing. Divers found the bodies of five passengers on Wednesday, Aug 21. Hannah Lynch, Lynch's 18 year-old daughter is reportedly unaccounted for.

## **Raider discounts**

There are several businesses around the Wright State University area that will give students discounts. These discounts can be as low as 5% to as high as 20%, and all that is required is the presentation of a student's Wright1 card.

Both students and alumni take advantage of these discounts, including alum Donny Mrowiec.

"When I was a student, I took advantage of the 20% off at the barber. I'm going to still go because I like my guy, but man, the 20% really helped me out," Mrowiec said.

## **National chains and retailers**

There are several national chains and retailers that students can go to get discounts if needed. From Waffle House to Amazon, there will always be a discount for a student to explore. Marketing major Hannah Layton provided a lesser-known discount.

"I know Target has a 20% off discount. With the Target being right there, it is good for freshmen to know. I go all the time and I love my little discount," Layton said.

Target is one of several major retailers that give college students discounts.

Web software companies also provide substantial discounts, such as Adobe. The company gives a whopping 60% off all of their products, which is useful for many students, such as Katelyn Abels, a graphic & multimedia design student.

"The Adobe discount helps a lot. I use something from Adobe in a lot of my classes everyday, so it's like getting a textbook for basically free," Abels said.

Students can find these discounts on sites like UniDays or Studentbeans. There are also several other lists, like one from HillCollege, that outlines several other options.

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# A Guide to Wright State Dining

As students are either returning to campus or moving in for the first time, it is important to know what dining options are offered on campus and what you can get to eat.

## Cafeterias

The main cafeteria on Wright State University's main campus is the Union Market, which is located on the second floor of the Student Union. They have an "all you can eat" policy; just one \$10 swipe of a Wright1 card will give you access to a buffet of different food options. The Wright State dining services' website has more details about the exact dining options.

"Enjoy unlimited quantities of grill favorites, wood-fired pizzas, made-to-order pastas, and international cuisine, including a taco bar and an extensive salad bar," the website reads.

Union Market is open for breakfast, lunch and dinner. Most of the food will transition through the day, but some of the food options are available all day.

Another WSU cafeteria is the Hangar. The Hangar is located in Allyn Hall. This cafeteria is more like a food court, having multiple different restaurants to choose from. This includes Burger Barn, Asada and drink places.

At the Hangar, you can also get a la carte options such as soup, salads and a variety of different drinks. There is a large seating area outside the food court where students can dine, or they have to-go bags so students can take their food with them.

There are also a few restaurants around campus, such as Sushi Boss and Rowdy's Subs. These are both located in the Student Union, near Union Market. As with all other on-campus restaurants, you can pay at both locations with the Wright1 card and have your pick of sushi rolls and bowls, and build your own sandwich.

## **Drink stands**

In addition to getting food around campus, Wright State also has several coffee shops. The most popular one is ReyRey Cafe, which is completely student-run.

The cafe is a great way for students to gain real-world job experience without having to leave campus. They serve Boston Stoker Coffee and pastries, and it is located in Rike Hall.

The other main coffee shop on campus is called Pour Cafe, and it is located upstairs in the Student Union, right next to the Union Market. Although it is a WSU store, they serve Starbucks coffee, so you can get Starbucks without having to leave campus. In addition to coffee, they also serve tea, milkshakes, energy drinks, and more.

If you are in a hurry and do not have time to stop at any of the shops or restaurants, there are also vending machines located all around campus. The vending machines offer a variety of things, including drinks, snacks and food. You can find these in any of the main buildings.

## **Student convenience**

One of the easiest places to grab something on the go on campus is Raider Mart. Although it is not located in one of the main buildings, it is still on campus. It is located in the lobby of the Honors Community Building.

Raider Mart is a convenience store where you can find anything you would need, from frozen meals to tissues. They are open every day and have a variety of food options, including microwavable meals, snacks, candy, ice cream, salads and more. There is also a Rowdy's Subs located inside where you can get sandwiches made.

The great thing about WSU dining is how many different options you have. Be sure to go to the WSU dining services' website to get details on what time these different locations are open.
