The Oxford Desk Dictionary

The mass-market dictionary field is a crowded one; there are many paperbacks on bookstore shelves containing 60,000 to 100,000 entries. Of these, perhaps the most distinguished is the Merriam-Webster one, now (1994) in its fifth edition, often cited as a word-source in Word Ways articles. Under the editorship of Laurence Urdang of Verbatim, Oxford University Press has issued (1995) a hardcover dictionary to compete in this field. Oxford is quite similar in coverage to Merriam-Webster. For example, in a sample of 25 words from bisect to bizarre, only Merriam-Webster had biweekly and bizarre, and only Oxford had bitching, bit part, bitumen and biz. Apparently reflecting Urdang's preference (see the Random House Unabridged Dictionary which he also edited), geographical and personal names, foreign phrases and abbreviations are intercalated with dictionary words. Unlike most other dictionaries of its size. it contains about 200 illustrations; it also includes the occasional etymology or usage note. Definitions are simple and straightforward (moonshine 1 foolish talk or ideas 2 illicitly distilled or smuggled alcohol 3 moonlight). The dictionary is a bit weak on new entries, including dweeb but not gonzo, cash cow but not diss, Jaws of Life but not chunnel, infotainment but not fractal. At \$12.95 this 691-page volume is a bargain.
