1.0 Introduction

The following report details the activity of Digital Commons @ Butler University.

Section 1 offers historical context by examining the top downloads in Digital Commons @ Butler University (hereafter Digital Commons) since its inception in 2008. These items are drawn from a wide variety of collections, particularly those to do with student scholarship and have been consistently high performers since their deposit. 2014-2015 benchmarks for total downloads, total deposits, and new faculty recruitment numbers are also included.

Section 2 provides detailed analytics for Digital Commons performance in the 12-month period from November 2014 to October 2015. Particular emphasis is placed on the analysis of download activity and referral activity. Download activity allows us to understand download activity as a whole, by type of content, or discipline. Referral activity allows us to determine how the user found repository content and their geographic location.

Section 3 analyzes historical trends of repository activity from October 2008 through October 2015.

Section 4 presents a SWOT analysis based on data from Sections 1-3.

Section 5 discusses the implications of these data.

Section 6 is an appendix of figures.

1.1 Top Downloads of All Time

Table 1 indicates the top nine Digital Commons downloads since 2008. These rankings were calculated by deriving the average number of daily downloads since deposit. Daily download rates are not reported, but these papers represent a diverse and impactful sampling of our holdings.

The most downloaded item in Digital Commons is a 2011 Honors Thesis from the College of Communication, accruing 7,000 downloads since deposit. Three of the top nine items are Undergraduate

Honors Theses. The others are derived from the Office of the Provost, the College of Business, the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and the Graduate Theses collection.

1.2 Repository Benchmarks (2014 - 2015)

The benchmarks reported here reflect the current health of the repository in terms of download counts, the amount of content available, and the faculty participation rate.

One Million Downloads. Digital Commons reached 1 million downloads in late 2014. As of December 17, 2015, Digital Commons has received over 1.3 million downloads.

Added Content, Added Awareness. Total content topped 10,000 full-text items in August 2015, a 30% increase from October 2014. Improved journal intake workflows have enabled staff to deposit almost 2,000 additional items; as of December 17, 2015, Digital Commons contains 11,991 total items.

New Faculty, New Departments. With the completion of a backlog of faculty deposit, new initiatives and word of mouth have enabled Digital Commons staff to create SelectedWorks pages for 26 faculty members in the last year. (See Table 2) A number of these new additions have helped improve representation from the College of Pharmacy and Health Services (7 new faculty) and the College of Education (4 new faculty, including Dean Ena Shelley).

2.0 Digital Commons Activity, 2014 - 2015

The following is a detailed report of site activity and downloads for the 12 month period between November 2014 and October 2015. This time frame was chosen to provide an accurate account of repository activity under the management of current scholarly communication staff. This section outlines the download statistics for the repository, including an analysis of monthly trends, a statistical breakdown by collection, and an analysis of referral data.

2.1 Most Popular Papers of 2014 - 2015

The most downloaded paper across the repository was an article from *Word Ways* with 5514 downloads. *Word Ways* accounted for 10 of the 25 top downloaded papers. (See Table 3) The Undergraduate Thesis collection had the second highest representation on the list with 5. While a large portion (40%) of the top papers came from a single publication, it is encouraging that 10 unique collections were represented in this list.

2.2 Download Activity (2014 - 2015)

Total Downloads. There were 254,249 total full-text downloads between November 2014 and October 2015. This number does not reflect page hits or links redirecting to articles not stored in the repository (see below). This measure was chosen as rather than hits because it is considered by our platform provider to be the most accurate reflection of end-user behavior. Bepress' report engine eliminates downloads from web crawlers and content scrapers, unlike page hits, reflecting downloads by actual users. (Bepress, N.D [http://www.bepress.com/download_counts.html]).

Total Number of Items. At the time of data collection, there were 13,825 total items in the repository. This number includes full-text items, as well as records that link out to content hosted elsewhere or are otherwise non-interactive due to copyright issues. We are unable to differentiate between full-text and non-fulltext items with the available data, but measures are otherwise consistent.

Downloads per Item. The mean download rate across all collections is 18 downloads/item. This would likely be higher if calculated against only full text items, however this is a favorable number.

Out of the 17 series included in the report, ten performed better than average. The series with the highest impact is the Undergraduate Thesis Collection with 96 downloads/record. The series with the lowest impact is Manuscripts/MSS with approximately 2 downloads/record.

Percent of Records with No Downloads. Approximately 42% of items across all collections have not been downloaded. Like the total number of records, this number represents full-text records that could possibly be downloaded and non-full-text records that are non-interactive. As before, we are unable to separate these.

This indicates that 58% of items in the repository have been downloaded at least once, which is an excellent circulation rate (particularly when compared to print holdings). However, this does present an

opportunity to increase search engine optimization (SEO) and visibility of our collections through improved keywords and abstracting.

Only 3 series had less downloaded papers than average: Librarian Papers (61%), College of Communication (55%), and Manuscripts (46%). It should be noted that the low downloads for these papers are seemingly subsidized by high-impact papers in these series based on their aforementioned impact.

Download Distribution. A 2010 report from University of Nebraska - Lincoln reported that the bulk of their traffic was driven not by a few high impact articles, but those downloaded 13 times or fewer. (<u>Royster, 2010</u>) While 50% of overall downloads came from these low-traffic articles, they account for roughly 67% of all items in the collection. At Digital Commons @ Butler, we discovered a reverse trend of this finding.

Contrary to Royster's findings, the majority of downloads in the Butler repository can be attributed to a small number of overall items; less than 13% of the total items account for 78% of all downloads.

2.2.1 Monthly Trends

Download rates spiked in late February and late September from the low 20,000s to almost 30,000 downloads per month. While we could venture a few guesses as to why this occurred, we have no evidence this is anything other than the natural ebb and flow of web traffic.

2.2.2 Breakdowns by Item Type

Journals. Digital Commons' open access journals have been driving the growth of the repository, representing the largest proportion of content available and number of downloads. On average, each journal item was downloaded 16.8 times. The journal *Word Ways* is a leader in this area, with 4423 full-text items and 96,250 downloads.

Journals focused on student work are of particular interest to the library and the university. In 2014 - 2015, scholarly communication staff assisted in launching the *Butler Journal of Undergraduate Research* (BJUR), which has had an excellent reception, as well as digitizing back issues of the student literary magazine *Manuscripts*. This was an enormous undertaking and we look forward to seeing its numbers improve now that it is complete.

Colleges. Faculty deposits from all six colleges accounted for the second largest proportion of content and downloads. The 1427 items deposited by faculty members were downloaded 58,387 times, an average of 40.9 times per item.

Jordan College of the Arts

Due to the limited number of items deposited by faculty, we are unable to offer a top five list. There is concern on the part of staff that between copyright issues and lack of multimedia streaming support, Digital Commons is not properly equipped to take in a majority of JCA content. These discussions will continue into 2015 - 2016.

Theses. Undergraduate, graduate, and manuscript (handwritten) theses accounted for the third largest proportion of content and downloads. The 537 items deposited by students were downloaded 35,632 times, an average of 66.4 times per item. Student theses have the largest download count per item of any item type in Digital Commons.

2.3 Referral Activity for Digital Commons @ Butler University

2.3.1 Referrals by Domain

Domain referrals indicate the domains (unique URLs) that have directed end-users to repository content. Content was accessed from a total of 1622 unique domains. The overwhelming majority of repository content was accessed from Google, Google Scholar, and international variations of these domains. Users are over 11 times more likely to reach content from a Google domain than by accessing it directly from the repository.

2.3.2 Referrals by Country

Referrals by Country indicates visitors' top level country domain, enabling us to measure the global reach of the repository. From 11/2014 - 10/2015, Digital Commons had users and downloads from 159 nations on six continents. The largest international traffic hub was India with over 5,400 hundred distinct hits.

Notable countries include:

- Afghanistan (4 hits)
- Greenland (13 Hits)
- Iceland (5 hits)
- Iraq (36 hits)

- Mauritius (16 hits)
- Seychelles (2 hits)
- Vietnam (30 hits)

3.0 Historical Trends and Analysis

Digital Commons experienced an increased number of downloads in each of its first four years of existence, but this growth appears to have leveled off in the twelve month period between 2013 - 2014 and 2014 - 2015. This decrease of 18,000 downloads does not necessarily indicate an overall negative trend in the health of the repository, but we believe it indicates the growing diversity of content.

Since its inception, the majority of the activity in the repository can be attributed to one source: *Word Ways*. In the last year, *Word Ways* dropped 30,000 downloads or 10% year over year. The entire repository dropped 18,000 downloads, so increased downloads elsewhere in the repository are compensating for this drop. The diversification of content has made Digital Commons less reliant on the traffic brought in by *Word Ways*.

5.0 Conclusions

Discussion

Measuring the impact of a digital repository is no small task. We can get a sense of our impact through various measurements representing the health of a repository: number of items/records, download counts, geographic and disciplinary diversity of downloads. These numbers that we've gathered in this report offer important information on how Digital Commons is used across the world. The real story of impact, although well supported by our presented data, goes beyond metrics.

As the cost of research material becomes ever more unsustainable, researchers are beginning to look outside traditional scholarly structures and academic libraries are positioning themselves to providing alternative models to disseminate research like our own Digital Commons. The scholarly and creative output of Butler University faculty, staff, and students is finding an extensive, international audience impossible without such a platform. The incredible popularity of otherwise-inaccessible and unpublished student work on the cutting edge of the disciplines demonstrates the pivotal role Butler University Libraries play in the continued scholarly success of our community.


Three important truths about scholarly publishing are evident in 2015: turnaround is too slow to sustain the rapid pace of innovation; costs are too high for equitable access to be even remotely close to possible; and that for many researchers, accessibility is more important than prestige (i.e. journal title, author, publisher). Through Digital Commons and our scholarly communication efforts, Butler University Libraries are prepared to respond to these challenges today and going forward.

Concluding Remarks

This year has been one of many milestones and growth in a number of important areas, including content and geographic diversity. This growth has been accompanied by some growing pains, as the importance of previously dominant collections has waned. We are looking forward to an upcoming refresh of the SelectedWorks faculty profile platform and are excited to improve disciplinary representation with a renewed outreach program. We also hope to address some of the download disparities from 2014 - 2015 through improved keywords and abstracting. Finally, we hope that the move to online thesis submission in Spring 2016 will increase the number of students depositing their thesis into Digital Commons by streamlining the process.

Figure 1. Percentage of total downloads broken down by how many times an item has been downloaded.






Figure 2. Number of items arranged by how many times they've been downloaded.




Figure 3. Monthly download trends for Digital Commons November, 2014 through October, 2015.




Figure 4. Total records by item type.





Figure 5. Total downloads by item type.

The following figure indicates notable domain referrals to repository content including search engines and content aggregators, social networking sites, and personal websites.




Figure 7. Notable referral data.





Figure 9. Bubble plot of countries outside of U.S. driving Digital Commons traffic.
