SECURITIES LAW—FRAUD—SEC RULE 10B-5. By Allan R. Bromberg. New York: McGraw-Hill Book Company. Loose-leaf. \$24.50.

This volume contains a comprehensive review of the body of law which has developed under SEC Rule 10b-5, as well as a wellreasoned analysis of the areas that rule will likely affect in the future.
