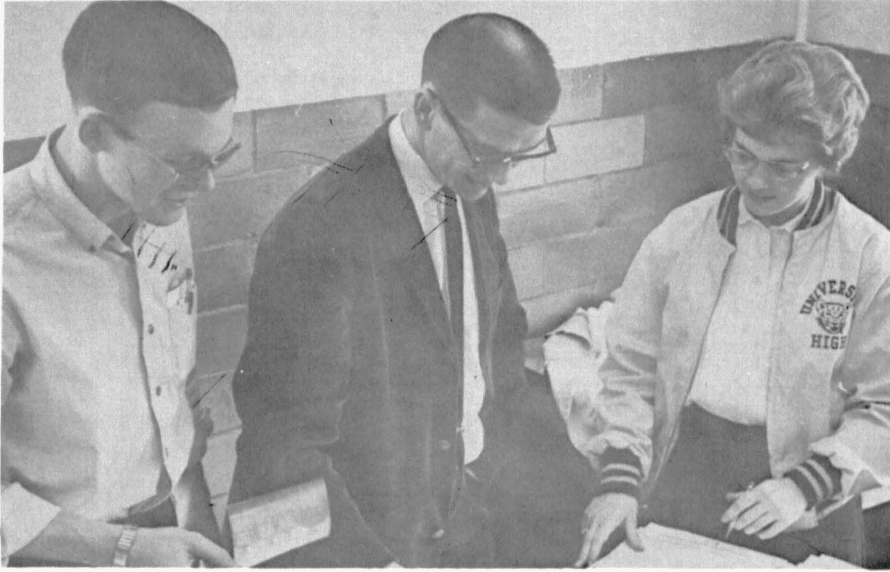

Dwight Keller, Joe Reed, Bill Harris, and Richard Wiley were editors of activities, classes, clubs, copy, and sports, respectively.



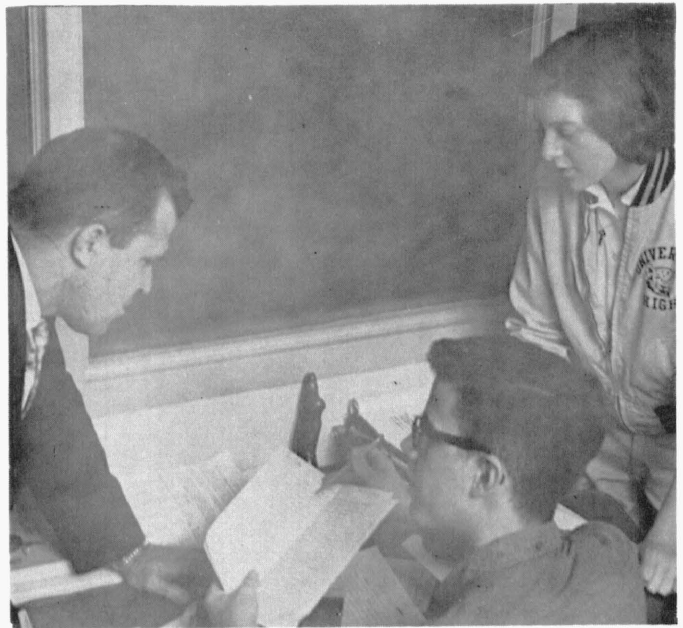

Classic Reading Club Develops Interests

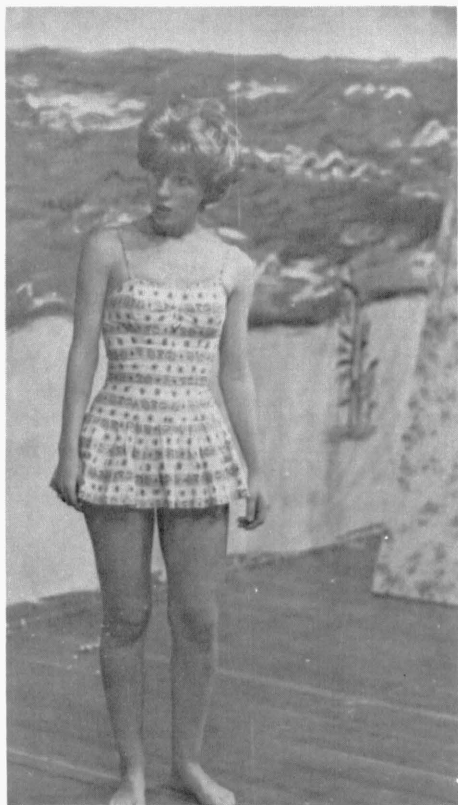

Freshmen Show Enthusiasm In School Activities



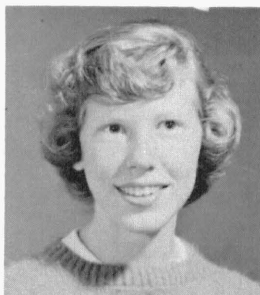

The year's most successful dance, the Pink Flamingo Night Club, was the highlight of the freshmen's creativity and was a spark to future success.

Junior, Bill Bretz was elected Student Body President, where he carried out his ideas in a very able and well liked manner. Edited by Barbara Anthony and Paul DuNard, the Juniors' class project, the Tiger Tales, published news and topics of interest to the students at U-High.

The 1961 graduating class entered its last year, seemingly unused to their magic title--Seniors. Joe Reed was elected class president, and assisting him were Roger Luebbers, Vice-President; Nancy Case, Secretary; and Pat Ralston, Treasurer. The class then chose Dwight Keller and Darryl Muhrer to represent it in the Student Council and then braced itself for the work ahead. The class project was the yearbook, which was edited under the leadership of Barbara Anthony and Roger Luebbers. Extra money for the printing was raised through a work day, an amateur show, and an unparalleled Christmas formal. The dance itself, was reigned over by Snow King and Queen, Darryl Muhrer and Pat Ralston. Senior classmates Barbara Anthony and Richard Wiley were chosen most versatile of the senior high, while Patty Cherches and Jim Barnett were chosen most popular. The sports highlight of the year came when the basketball team ended its season with a highly commendable record of over 70 per cent. Five seniors made up the starting team and all can be proud of their work. The year ended on an academic note when twenty-two of the thirty-nine seniors qualified for the Curators Award.

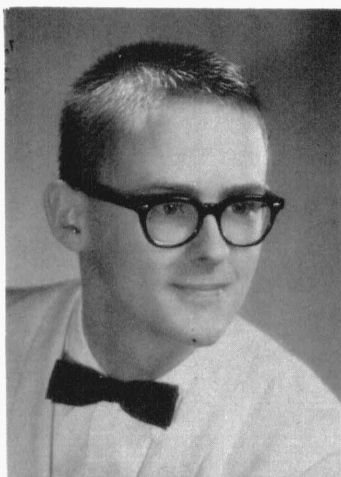

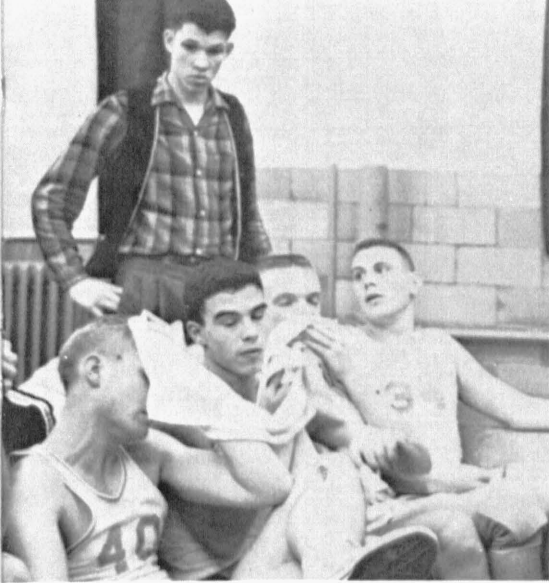
At the end of the year, the group, under the sponsorship of Mrs. Pipes, had its annual picnic.

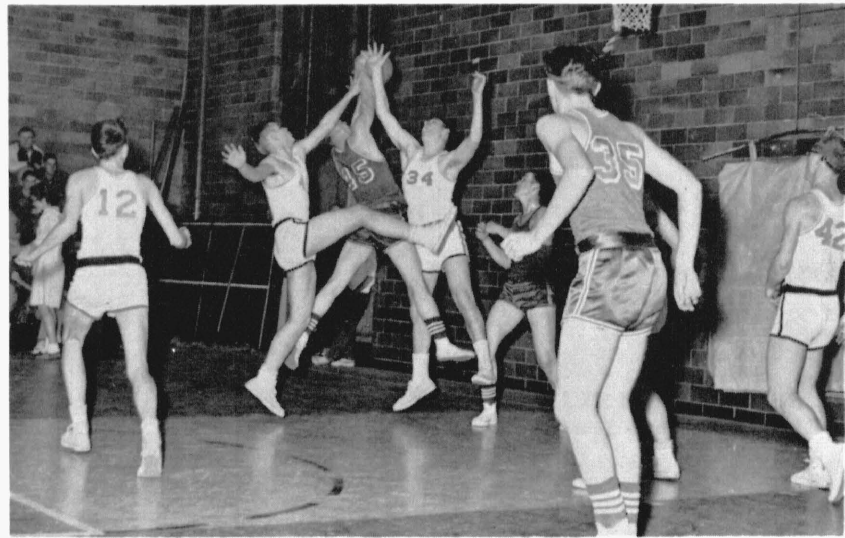
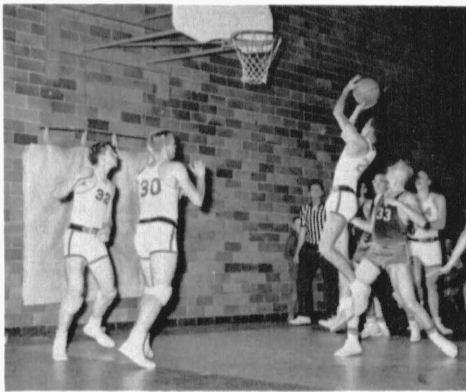

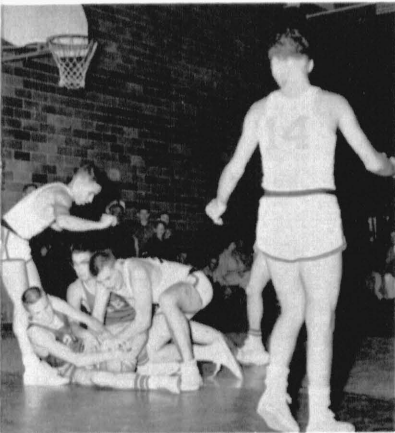
