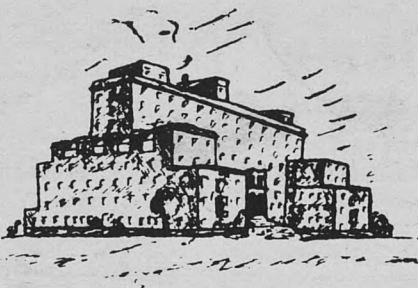


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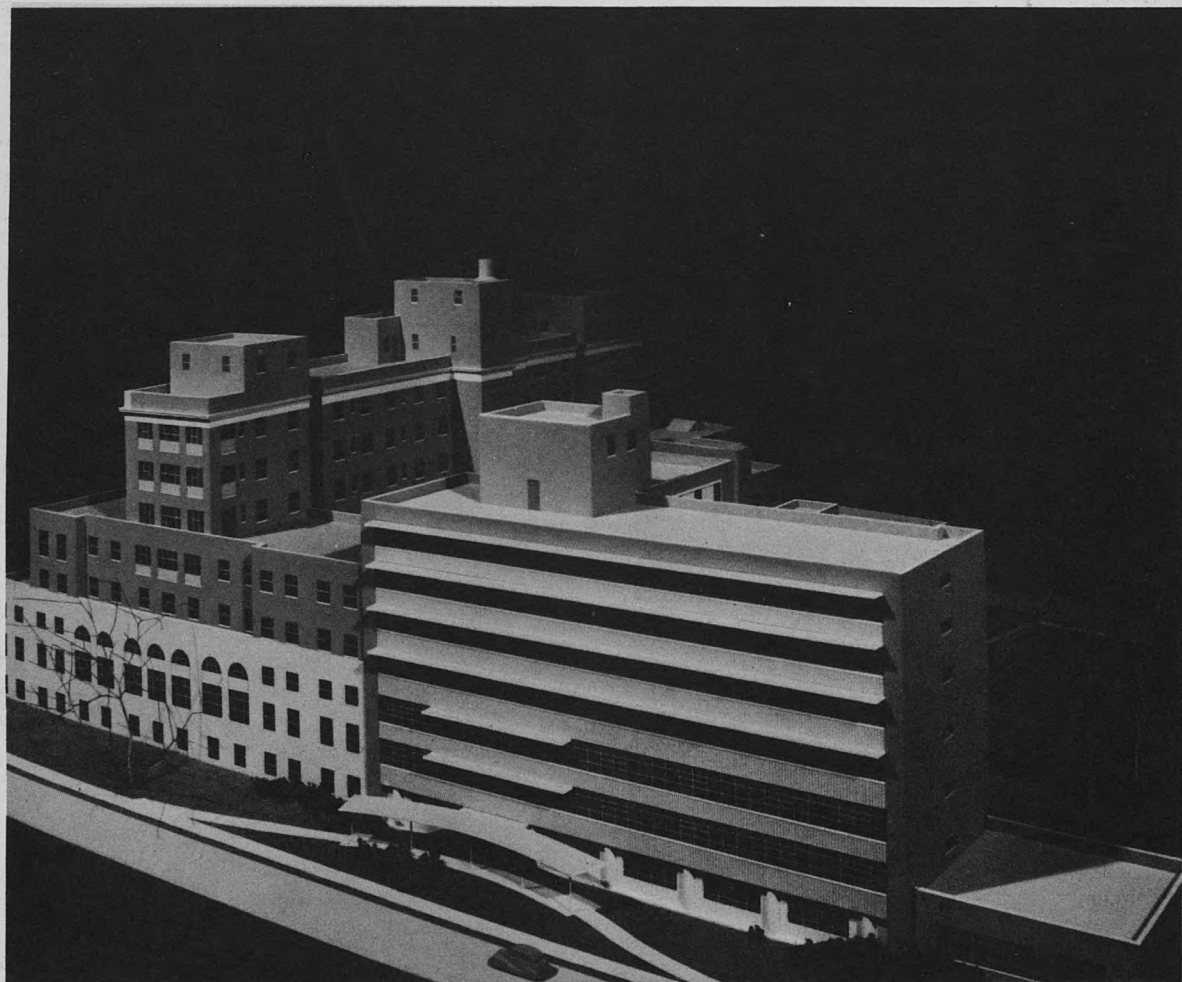

Executive Director's Column

From time to time, persons in charge of various activities at the Hospital will be asked to report on their departments to the readers of "216". David A. Gee, Assistant Director and Editor of "216" is here given an opportunity to comment on the first 12 issues of "216".

Just one year ago this month, Volume 1, Number 1 of "216" appeared and was distributed to 1,736 employees, patients, members of the medical staff, Board of Directors, Auxiliary, Student Nurses, Nursing and Intern Alumnae and friends in the community. Since that time distribution has rapidly climbed and the May, 1953 issue reached 3,952 copies sent to readers both locally and in 46 states and two foreign countries.

A year ago, "216" introduced the brand new Jewish Hospital Medical Center Auxiliary and gave brief mention to the musical epic "Twenty Years Ago, I Worked Harder than Youse Guys" by Drs. Sidney Goldenberg and Marcy Goldstein. Since these first wanderings in prose, we have seen Miriam Hospital secure a Public Service Company bus for use in its Aid to Daily Living Program, introduced the Personnel Advisory Committee, announced the opening of Gift Gallery, shown how much linen is used by a nursing division in 48 hours, seen the development of a Physical Medicine Department and caught Chef George Quick in the act of attacking a 20 pound turkey. We have paid tribute to the many people who have so generously given their time and money to the Jewish Hospital and reported on the progress of the many activities that are being revitalized.

"216" has been a cooperative venture in which many people have participated: Associate Editor I. J. Shyne, has written a score of articles and news items in these 12 issues; Assistant Editor Edna Korf, was largely responsible for "216's" largest issue in which five pages were devoted to the School of Nursing; and many important contributions have

been made by Assistant Editor Marjorie Boulton. The other members of the editorial staff, especially those in the other branches of the hospital, have had the tremendous job of making their news meaningful to both their own divisions as well as to the hospital as a whole. Miriam's Louise Golman, the Sanatorium's Beulah Sanders, and Mary Davis and, more recently, Dorothy McKinly from the Social Service Division have done much in drawing together the medical center. The task of documenting the first year of the Auxiliary's growth has fallen to Anne Cohn who has so ably handled this assignment.

Dr. David Littauer's "Executive Director's Column" has outlined the progress of the hospital over the year, has announced special activities such as the Home Care Program, and has given information about current national and local hospital problems.

The reporters, representing each of the departments in the hospital, have responded excellently in giving news about their fellow employees.

Other writers not on the "216" staff, notably Dr. Herman T. Blumenthal, Dr. Hyman R. Senturia, and Catherine Blomes, R.N., have been of great assistance in the preparation of "216".

Publishing a house organ requires other talents besides writing ability: Lucille Wildman has been responsible for typing copy into finished form; Mary Wright, Grace Campbell, and Jackie Allred addressograph and prepare for mailing, 3,000 copies each month; last but not least, Hepple Robinson sees that "216" is safely delivered to the post office.

During the year ahead, "216" will run head on into a huge building program and the multitude of problems inherent in it. In addition, it will see new organizational development, and the creation of new services for patient, employee, and community. Through all this, "216" will record the pulse beat of a Medical Center serving the Middle West.

MARK C. STEINBERG MEMORIAL HOSPITAL ANNOUNCED

It was announced on May 31 by Major B. Einstein, President of the Hospital, that the Jewish Hospital of Saint Louis will receive a contribution of \$1,000,000 from the estate of Mark C. Steinberg.

The gift was made by Richard K. Weil and Elliot H. Stein, trustees under the will of the late Mark C. Steinberg, and the contribution and its purposes were approved by Mrs. Etta E. Steinberg, widow of Mr. Steinberg.

The gift calls for a hospital building which will be known as the Mark C. Steinberg Memorial Hospital, to be part of the new \$6,500,000 Jewish Hospital building program. It will consist of seven stories and an auditorium and will be devoted to the care of chronically ill patients and research into their illnesses as

well as for rehabilitation and convalescence.

Mr. Einstein said in a statement announcing the gift: "This is the greatest single contribution ever made to the Jewish Hospital and is one of the largest in the community for a similar purpose. It is not only a fitting tribute to a great philanthropist but also will serve the cause of humanity. This gift will make possible an outstanding center for rehabilitation and convalescence as well as provide modern care for those patients afflicted with chronic ailments and diseases.

"We hope through this magnificent gift that the research and medical care and developments which will follow will open new avenues in medical treatment for all mankind."

NEW SCHOLARSHIP FOR NURSES MADE AVAILABLE BY FRIEDMAN FOUNDATION

A scholarship fund for girls who desire to study nursing as a career has been made available by the Friedman Foundation. In announcing this gift, Mr. Harry Friedman, trustee, stated that two three-year scholarships, each amounting to \$600.00, and intended to cover tuition and other expenses, have been awarded to the Jewish Hospital.

Eligibility for the scholarships will be determined by the Director of the School of Nursing, assisted by members of the Nursing Committee of the Board of Directors.

Personality of the month



When Mrs. Mayme Woodley Bollinger entered the Jewish Hospital School of Nursing in 1921, she had the responsibility of rearing two children, a daughter of 8 and a son who was 3 years old at that time. Two months prior to her entrance it was necessary that she undergo surgery, and after an operation was performed, the chances of entering nursing that year looked pretty slim. However, she accepted her handicap as a challenge and entered the School and an exemplary career as a nurse.

Her professional life has been characterized by one quality which is not frequently found to such a degree; her loyalty to the School of Nursing and to her profession. This year marked the 31st consecutive year of her attendance and participation in the Commencement exercises of the School of Nursing. This is more than a record; it is an active

expression of her interest in the School and in the students throughout the years. We think it is an outstanding achievement, one which merits our praise and gratitude.

She spent 13 years in our pediatric department, and was Supervisor of that department. She has been engaged in private duty nursing for the past 16 years and is still doing this kind of work. Upon her own graduation she was awarded the Goldman Scholarship, which has since become the Hattie Waldheim Scholarship, for post-graduate work. She utilized the scholarship in furthering her education in Pediatrics and spent some time at Bellevue Hospital and Boston Children's Hospital.

In looking back over the years she has spent in nursing, she feels that they have been well-spent, happy years. Although Mrs. Bollinger is now a retired member of the School Alumnae, she served as an active member for many years. She has always been a member of the American Nurses' Association, and was a member of the League of Nursing Education for 10 years.

Mrs. Bollinger's career in nursing continues to be a source of great happiness and satisfaction to her, and it has certainly been one of great service to others. She possesses enthusiasm, interest and youthfulness of spirit. Her presence at our annual commencement exercises is an inspiration to all of us.

Auxiliary News

The Auxiliary's Annual Meeting held May 14, at the Nurses' Residence, was attended by several hundred enthusiastic members. A tea was served by the Hospitality Committee headed by Mrs. Roswell Messing Jr., and Mrs. Sydney Katz, and assisted by Mrs. Lawton Levy, Mrs. Katherine Jacobs and Mrs. Robert Orchard. Special hostesses included: Mrs. Major B. Einstein, Mrs. William Wallbrunn, Mrs. Courtney Gould, Mrs. L. Doishman, Mrs. Milton Gottliebson and Mrs. David Littauer.

Following the Invocation given by Mrs. Lester Munchweiler, outgoing president Mrs. Edward F. Schweich welcomed those present and presented the annual report, which stressed the following facts:

"In a scant six months, the Auxiliary has achieved 1520 members. Although this is an impressive number, many more members are needed in order to expand our working program.

"Six months ago, we were in debt to the Jewish Hospital who so generously advanced the funds necessary to organize an Auxiliary. To-day, that loan will be repaid, and, with a comfortable balance in the bank, the new administration can plan its work with an assurance that the first administration did not have.

"Gift Gallery, the Auxiliary's major money earning project, has had phenomenal success.

"The Auxiliary has undertaken the very happy task of selecting and purchasing the bouquets worn by the nurses at graduation.

"A Recreational Activities Committee has been organized to function primarily in the

wards of the hospital. It is headed by a professionally trained volunteer chairman.

"The newest project of the Auxiliary is a beauty service. A recognized company, using portable equipment, gives shampoos, sets, and permanents at standard beauty shop charges, and the Auxiliary gets a discount for arranging appointments. A plan, whereby indigent patients can obtain free beauty care, is being formed.

"The Auxiliary has established a Tribute Fund. Medical research will have first call on Tribute Fund money. Surgical appliances, special bandages, crutches etc., for indigent patients, and new books for the patients' library will also be paid for out of this fund.

"The Auxiliary is in the process of taking over the Jewish Hospital Library which the Council of Jewish Women has operated so well for over fifteen years.

"The Volunteer Program Committee, has made great strides. In the last five months, hundreds of hours have been given to the hospital by Volunteers.

"This Administration, in view of the forthcoming expanded hospital program, recommends that a Ways and Means Committee be formed in order to study future fund raising possibilities."

Mrs. Schweich thanked her officers, chairmen, and committees for the capable and efficient discharge of their respective duties, and expressed her gratitude on behalf of the

Auxiliary to Mr. Einstein, Dr. Littauer and Mr. Gee, for their wholehearted co-operation.

A fitting climax to the splendid accomplishments of the outgoing Administration was the presenting of checks in repayment of the loans made by the hospital by Mrs. Schweich and Mrs. Elmer Abramson, Gift Gallery Chairman, to Mr. Einstein, who accepted them for the hospital.

Guest speaker of the afternoon was Dr. Jerome I. Simon, whose topic was "The Six Questions Women Most Often Ask Me". Dr. Simon's talk was most informative, very interesting and well received.
