



SJSU Microgravity Team will travel to Houston for NASA's Reduced Gravity Education Flight Program

A team of Mechanical Engineering and Electrical Engineering students and a faculty advisor at SJSU were selected to participate in NASA's Reduced Gravity Education Flight Program from July 11-19 at Johnson Space Center's Ellington Field in Houston, Texas. The team will conduct several experiments under

National Academies to host an "Idea to Innovation" workshop on Service Science at the National Academies in Washington DC. This activity will be part of the "Workshop to Develop a Research Agenda for Service Innovation" funded by the National Science Foundation. The participants of the workshop will be representatives from academies, industries, NSF and other funding agencies, and advisers to the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy. The Co-Principal Investigators with Steve are Paul Maglio of UC Merced and Jim Spohrer of IBM.

The CoB has several new certificates in various stages of review and approval: graduate certificate in Global Leadership; graduate certificate in Accounting Fundamentals; and graduate certificate in Accounting Professionalism. These later two certificates are tailored to meet the new CPA licensing requirement of 150 units of higher education, including 30 units in Accounting, 38 in Business and 10 in Ethics.

Global activities include the following:

- 54 students have participated in the Thompson Global Internship Program since it was launched in 2010. Students have been assigned to 7 cities in 3 continents.
- As in the last 3 years, we expect to grant about 50 Study

microgravity (Zero-G) environment aboard NASA's reduced gravity aircraft. Recent seniors - Ish Sanchez, Scott Gulkin, Kevin Adinata, Eduardo Alvarez, and a faculty advisor, Professor Winney Du, comprise the team's "flyers," which will participate in the weightless experience and conduct experiments. Students Richardo Delgado and Julia Bowen will also travel to Houston as the alternate "flyer" and "ground crew," respectively. Another student, Phillip Swanson, and two faculty advisors, Profs. Periklis Papadopoulos and David Parent are part of the team will not go to Houston in July. The microgravity aircraft is a modified Boeing 727, equipped with all power supplies that the research needs. It will produce periods of weightlessness lasting about 21 seconds at a time by flying a series of approximately 30 parabolas – a steep climb followed by a free fall – over the Gulf of Mexico.

- passing the WST (Writing Skills Test), and
- enrolling in the 100W, Area Z requirement for the major, during the first semester, HUM 177A.



Dennis Jaehne: The Mechanic of Undergraduate Studies


