

DeGroot Put At End In Effort To Aid **Defensive Line**

Coach DeWitt Portal's first-year gridders anxiously await the gong tomorrow noon that will them against the College of Pacific freshmen. The contest will be played as a preliminary to the varsity clash between the two schools on the turf of Spartan stadium starting at noon.
