## Spartans, Tigers Rated Even For Big Game

### Noise Parade To Leave Men's Gym At 5:30 Led By Queen Henrietta

Dr. Newby, Mrs. Rae Wurtz, And Elbert Garcia Judges

Noise, noise, and more noise will be the order of the day when the third annual noise parade gets under way at 5:30 o'clock today at the Men's gymnasium, under the chairmanship of Bill Moore, former student body president.

With societies competing against each other and classes battling for supremacy, the calibre of floats is expected to be par excellence. Led by the band and coffin bearers, the procession will parade through town for one hour.

#### CLASS FLOATS FIRST

The judges' car which will drop out at First and Santa Clara, is to be followed by the queen's car, which will not be in the competition. The order of floats, as listed by Moore, places the classes first, with the societies, organizations, and fraternities following in the order named.

Line-up will start at 5 o'clock by the Men's Gymnasium at Fourth street and will proceed down to Seventh street.

Dr. L. C. Newby, Mrs. Rae O. Wurtz, and Elbert Garcia have been chosen by the rally committee to judge the floats in originality, noise, and percentage of students competing. Special score sheets have been compiled to facilitate the selection of the winner.

Upon disbanding at the starting point, the perpetual trophy, donated three years ago by E. L. Bothwell, will be presented to the winning entry.

#### WEAR ROOTER'S CAPS

In addition to the float prize a trophy cup will be given to the organization wearing the greatest number of rooter's caps, in proportion to the number of students on the float, at the dance Saturday evening in the Men's Gymnasium. Caps will be on sale all day today in the Quad.

"We want every organization, regardless of size, to enter a float in the parade. Even if it's just a private car, it can make noise and that is what we want," said Moore yesterday.

The kickoff of the tilt, which is a decidedly even battle, is slated for 2:30.

Injuries have taken two or three men that Coach Dudley DeGroot had planned to start in tomorrow's classic and

**Was Instructor With National Guards, S.J. Force**

"Combining both his army and Police experience in gunnery, Sergeant William C. Brown has become a valuable addition to the State Police school," stated Mr. William A. Wiltberger, head of State Police school.

Sergeant Brown has seen twelve years service in the San Jose Police Department where he also instructs gunnery. He also instructed gunnery in the Army of Occupation in Germany and in the National Guard.

**THREE QUARTERS**

"Gunnery instruction for the first two quarters is merely fundamental drills and the third quarter is to polish what has been learned," averred Mr. Brown.

The complete course will include instruction in the types of guns, how they are made, firing positions, sighting the object, actual practice in the school range. Advantages of different guns, effects of certain types when shot, and instruction in the use of tear gas and machine guns.

**FOR COPS ONLY**

The gunnery course is open to only students registered in the State Police School, according to Mr. Wiltberger.

At the end of the year each student taking the course must pass a test qualifying them as marksmen.

Registered in the advanced gunnery class are six Santa Cruz policemen, Alfred W. Crouse, Ben W. Krupp, Thomas H. Leonard, Donald F. Lynn, James K. Mann and Herman V. Nanna, who commented upon the course.

"The course has a great deal of value to us because it is extremely practical and many things learned fit into our everyday routine."

## C. O. P. Yearlings Reported Strong; Lineup Changed

### DeGroot Put At End In Effort To Aid Defensive Line
