Explaining the now famous Wagner Act, recently declared constitutional in the momentous 5-4 decision of the Supreme Court on April 12, Dr. William Poytress addressed his Behind the News class in their weekly meeting at 11 o'clock yesterday.
"It is an attempt to carry over the labor provisions of the NIRA," Dr. Poytress said.

LABOR UPHELD
He explained that those provisions gave labor the legal right to bargain and organize collectively without any interference from employers.

The burden of proof is on the employer and he will hesitate to refuse to carry out the act," Dr. Poytress said in reference to future labor disputes which may arise, after inferring that before the passage of the act the burden of proof was carried by the unions.

SIT-DOWN STRIKES
In closing his talk the economist said he believed that the cause for sit-down strikes was gone, and that the country could look forward to a definite diminishing of this means of procuring bargaining rights.
