"There will be a special charter train," Melzer announced, "and special lunches at a reduced price will be sold." Among the entertainers for the day will be many of the stars of the Spartan Revelries.

The date for the picnic will be announced in a few days, and Melzer expects that it will come off shortly after the Jubilee celebration is completed.

### Program Set For Little Theater; Robinson Directs

In recognition of the National Music Week festivities, 40 of the advanced students of the San Jose State college music department will present their second annual concert of chamber music tomorrow at 8:15 in the Little Theater under Miss Frances Robinson's direction.

The one and one-half hour program will feature chamber music presented in the inverse chronological order. Opening with some of the modern works, the program will close with the playing of Vivaldi's Concerto in D Minor for four violins, of the early 18th century chamber music, according to Miss Robinson.

The program includes Debussy's string quartet, the Brahms Piano Quartet, Mozart's Clarinet Quintet, Haydn's Quartet No. 29, and closes with Vivaldi's composition, which will be played by 25 violins

# College Track Men Meet Olympic Club

**WALTER MARTY AND BOB CLARK TO TAKE PART IN BOTH HIGH AND BROAD JUMP HERE SATURDAY**

Preparing for their biggest if not most important meet of the year, the Spartan trackmen will attempt to be at peak form for the bit of competition the Olympic club tracksters will bring to the State stadium oval Saturday at 2 o'clock.

The club will bring its full force that includes some of the greatest of the sport in America. As a unit, the club team has not been approached in dual meets anywhere and was far in the lead as to total points scored at the West Coast relays in Fresno last year.

**TRIANGULAR MEET**

Spartan varsity and frosh will both be competing and the meet's points will be kept as a triangular affair. Standing out for the freshmen will be Vin Ruble in the two mile in which he will be competing against the nationally famous Norman Bright, winner and record holder of the event in the Santa Barbara open meet a week ago.

The frosh will not have a chance of coping the grind but will be standing up well in the eight laps and can be considered a good runner if he is not lapped by the clubman who usually runs it right around nine minutes.

**MARTY TO JUMP**

In the high jump the frosh have a better bet than the varsity in Barbano, Grant, and Vasconcellos who have all been hitting around six feet but will be up against Walter Marty who has held the world's record. However, Marty has not been anywhere near his form when he was hitting the bar only at 6' 8".

"Slinger" Dunn will be tossing out the platter well beyond the Spartans' best in the event, but Dunn was only one of the standout weightmen on the Olympic team. Hal Fosberg is the best for the locals and is due to hit around his college mark of 146 feet.

**BROAD JUMP**

Another Olympic games star, Bob Clark, will bring a bit of competition for Bendeich and Parr of the varsity and "Tickey" Vasconcellos of the frosh in the broad jump event. Clark consistently hits the pit at around 24 feet and is always a threat to hit a foot further but has little need to call on his threat reserve for the Spartans' best is around 23' 8", which by the way is in any ordinary competition top flight.

In the sprints, Ray Dean, ex-Stanford dash man, will be the power house for the club.

## Frosh Baseball Men Play San Francisco J.C. Today

**Either Bill Freitas Or Leroy Zimmerman Will Pitch**

San Jose State's yearling baseball team gets a taste of real competition this afternoon when it tangles with the highly touted San Francisco junior college nine which is predicted to be one of their fastest games of the season. The game will be played on the Spartan diamond and will start at 3:30.

San Francisco junior college brings to San Jose this afternoon a club rated as one of the best ever to be produced at the northern city. Coach Lee Eisan plans to start all his regulars against the Spartan outfit, and continue his streak of wins that his club has turned in so far this season.

**ZIMMERMAN**

Coach Franny Pura has drilled his club in a little over time work this week in preparation for this afternoon's tilt. The former San Jose star athlete plans on starting either Leroy Zimmerman or Bill Freitas on the mound with Bill Luckenbill at the catching post. Zimmerman has turned in the most victories up to date for the frosh, and will probably get the call over young Freitas. Luckenbill has some signal calling this season, and appears for a cinch position on the varsity next year.

In the infield, Pura will start Edworth at first, Sanchez at second, Adams at third, and Rhodes at short.

**KEYSTONE COMBINATION**

In "Rabbit" Sanchez and Harvey Rhodes, Pura claims one of the best keystone combinations ever produced here at San Jose. Sanchez handles himself like a veteran at this position and Rhodes appears in a cinch for a varsity position next year.

In the outfield, Frank Martella is a sure starter for the center's field post, and will be accompanied by Walsh, Peavy, Teresi or Thompson. Martella is the leading slugger on Pura's outfit at the present with an average of over the .300 mark. Saturday the yearling baseball outfit will meet the Agnew State hospital nine at Agnew.

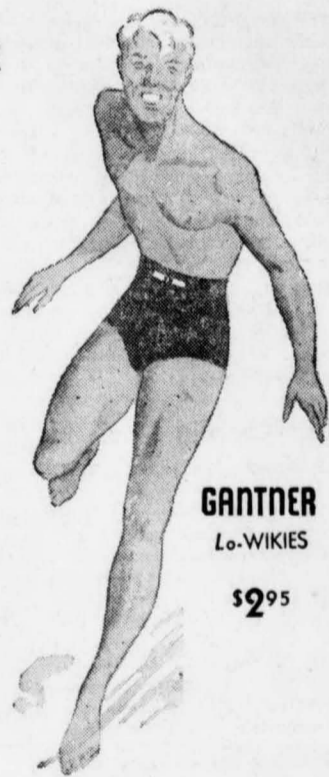
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# Woodwind Choir Scores In Annual Concert
