ON COMING GRID BATTLE

"There's nothing like a woman to fire up a football team," stated Mrs. Sarah McClatchey, Oskaloosa's rocking chair philosopher and football commentator, when she arrived in town yesterday for the San Jose State-Santa Clara game on Saturday.

"Why when I was the football queen at Oskaloosa State, the team was so hot that the turf turned brown," she related, puffing on her corn cob pipe.

EYES AND EARS all over the nation will be anxiously awaiting the result of Saturday's grid classic between San Jose State and Santa Clara University. A victory for the Broncos will put them one step nearer a Sugar Bowl nomination, while a win for the Spartans will be a distinct crash into big-time football.

PERHAPS YOU THINK it odd that people all over the country are interested in this affair. But many people have heard about San Jose's high-scoring outfit, and just as many are wondering if it all has been just a "flash in the pan". Can "little" San Jose State stop the Sugar-Bowl bound Broncos? That is what they are wondering.

ONE PERHAPS COULD use much of Coach Dud DeGroot's inspiring talk to the seniors yesterday to show why students should not gloat if we win, and not be cynical if we lose. With thanks to Coach DeGroot, here are some of the reasons: Santa Clara has the larger team. The Broncos have been playing in a top-notch class for many years, while only a few years ago, it would have been foolish to think of San Jose and Santa Clara on the same field together. They have not given a thought to their traditional clash with St. Mary's the week following. It will be no disgrace to lose to the Santa Clara Broncos.

ON THE OTHER HAND—San Jose has a bunch of gridders, all working for each other. They are playing for the love of the game, and the resulting spirit is one that goes a long way to make a winning outfit. San Jose has everything to win. A triumph will push the Spartans right into the national picture. And so, win or lose, San Jose has a wonderful team, the best in history, but—Santa Clara may have a better one.

Your writer has made a lot of mistakes, and occasionally he has guessed correctly. The best have been wrong. With every game in mind for both teams this season, with knowledge of the potentialities of each, and with an understanding that the Spartans are the under-dogs, I do hereby now stick out my neck the full limit and predict that Coach Dud DeGroot's outstanding grid eleven will come home the winner by an even dozen points.

### Yearlings Are Heavy Favorites To Win

Going into the last two games of the schedule with some of the early season strength back on the roster, the freshmen gridders are pointing for victory over the Santa Rosa Junior collegers tonight and for what will undoubtedly be a hard drag 'em out battle with the St. Mary's frosh on Armistice Day.

Returns who definitely improve the Spartan chances for this weekend are Leo O'Grady, halfback, who will very likely be called on to handle a good part of the punting duties; Braden Lutz, halfback, who has been sorely missed ever since his knee injury several weeks ago, and Lawrence Edwards at full, who also got in some early season action.

Another of last night's returns was Clayton Hager, though, under doctor's orders will not see action until next week's St. Mary's game.

Opening the game tonight will probably be the regular first string. This lines the backfield up as James Pastor, Jim Edgman, or Dick Vanderlie at full, Neil Van Proyen and Warren Miller at halves, and Joe Rishwain at the quarter spot.

The line will probably be centered by Morris Buckingham, with Alfred Lindner and Joe Rodrigues as reserves.
