ORGANIZATION CONTRIBUTIONS ARE TABULATED BY MEASUREMENT WHEN RECEIVED

The Community Chest organization thermometer, registering the donation of quotas from the various campus groups will be posted some time today, according to Bob Work, college Chest head.

This thermometer will be put up in front of the Morris Dailey auditorium where day by day tabulations will be made as the Chest contributions are received, stated Chest officials. The names of every organization will be entered on the "quota graph"; after each will be a blank space.

FIVE CENTS

Each blank space, according to Work, will be filled in as the donations are received. Over the top, at five cents per student means an entirely black thermometer, and another successful Community Chest campaign as far as San Jose State college is concerned.

Chest officials are hopeful of an all-time record in the amount gathered in the college campaign. The possibility that a record amount can be collected is, according to Chest heads, better than an even chance, but in order to attain this record each organization must turn its quota in promptly so that the tabulation can be completed by next Friday.

Tryout Date For 'Moor Born' Is October 26

Third Play Of Season Deals With Life Of Brontes

Tryouts for the third play of the San Jose Players' 1938-39 season, Dan Tothoroth's "Moor Born", will be held Wednesday, October 26, in the Little Theater, according to Mr. Hugh Gillis, head of the Speech department, who will direct the production.

FIRST PRODUCTION

Concerning the Bronte sisters, Charlotte, Ann, and Emily, the play is a nineteenth century drama which will receive its first production on the west coast with its presentation here in the Morris Dailey auditorium December 1st and 2nd.

Primarily a woman's play, the drama contains six parts of major importance, the sisters, the Reverend Bronte, the housekeeper, the drunken brother, and one minor part, that of the neighbor.

BIOGRAPHICAL

Though not absolutely historical, the play is biographical in many aspects of the life of the famed sister novelists, according to Mr. Gillis. Copies are now on reserve in the library for prospective student-actors.

New college actor talent is especially welcome to try out, says Mr. Gillis.

General ticket sales for the forthcoming play, "Elizabeth the Queen", which begins a two-day run in the Little Theater October 27 and 28, will start October 24, Mr. Gillis announced.

MOVIES FOR JOINT SUPPER

Moving pictures taken at the Asilomar Movement last year will be a feature of the program for the joint college YWCA-YMCA Association supper to be given October 25 in the YWCA gym.

The film will be given for the purpose of showing the progress of U. S. Christian movements.

Theme for the supper is "international", with a delegate from each of the ten countries represented giving a short discussion on the progress of the Christian movement in their country. The Swedish delegate will lead the group in a Swedish dance, and the Swiss delegate will sing folk songs.

Behind The News

"I predict that in five years we will fight Hitler in South America."

So declared Dr. William Poytress, head of the Social Science department, in his address yesterday to the Behind the News class on the effects of the Four Power Treaty.

AUTONOMY

Referring to the Nazi uprising in South America and the spread of nationalistic propaganda there, Dr. Poytress pointed out the Nazi belief that no matter where a German is he still has to hold absolute allegiance to his mother country, and that, combined with the self determination of races, would bring about a demand for political autonomy for the German people on the southern continent.

NO LOVE LOST

"There's no love lost between dictators of Germany and Italy," stated Dr. Poytress. "I predict that in a short while Italy will move toward alliance with England and France because of Mussolini's lack of trust in Hitler and the conflict of their ideas."

Dr. Poytress, explaining England's reason for permitting Hitler to seize the Sudetan territory, stated that if this sacrifice of the only democratic country in central Europe were not made a war would result, disastrous to Hitler, and producing a revolutionary, communistic government in both Italy and Germany.

As the fall rushing season goes into its pledging period, Delta Theta Omega, social fraternity, will serve an all-Italian dinner to all brothers of the fraternity and rushes tonight at the home of past grand master Francis Cauhape.
