Post Office Branch Opens On Campus For Student Use

Complete postal facilities on campus are now available to students and faculty.

A fully authorized branch of the San Jose Post office in the Controller's office was installed July 1st, registered as Station No. 9. The office will accept for mailing packages, letters, and registered mail, and will issue stamps and money orders, embracing in a modified way the services offered by the main office.

Mail sent to students, faculty, and organizations will not be handled through the post office exclusively, but will be received and distributed as in the past; through the boxes in the Cooperative store.

An official notice from Washington, D.C., announced that beginning October 1st, the office will be known as State College Station, rather than as Station No. 9.

Daily Begins Regular Schedule Next Week

Publication of the Spartan Daily will go on a regular schedule next week, it was announced by Daily Editor Fred Merrick Saturday.

With the staff working under difficulties due to registration and the opening of school, the next issue of the Daily will be Thursday. Next Monday will find the paper publishing on a regular daily basis, however, Merrick stated.

Cafeteria Open At Noon Tomorrow

The college cafeteria will open for luncheon tomorrow, September 19, according to Sarah M. Dowdle, of the Home Economics department.

A special 22-cent luncheon as well as a la carte service will be available for students and faculty on that day.

A special rate of \$3.30 per week for three meals a day, or \$2.55 per week for two meals a day for a five-day week is offered to members of the Cafeteria Student Meal club. Wholesome, carefully planned and well-prepared food is a feature of both the cafeteria and the Student club.

Serving periods are: Breakfast, 7:30-8:15; Luncheon, 11:30-12:45; and Dinner, 5:30-6:15. Anyone interested in the services offered is asked to see the cafeteria cashier at these hours.

Grimes, Hightower Chief Hog Threats

With the turf of Spartan Stadium scarcely cooled off after San Jose's scorching 35-0 win over Montana State last Friday night, the local gridiron juggernaut goes back into action against the Texas A. & I. Javelinas here tonight at 8:00.

Coaches "Pop" Warner and Dué DeGroot went into a huddle following last Friday night's win, and according to their plans then, San Jose will open against the Texans with the same lineup that started the rout of Montana Friday.

This means that the Spartans will use their classy running and blocking backfield of Dave Titchenal at quarter, Howie Costello and Morris Manogian at halves, and Leroy Zimmerman at fullback.

The San Jose forward wall will look something like the French Maginot line, averaging 197 pounds from end to end. Captain Bobby Titchenal, weighing 195 will operate at center. He will be flanked by 220-lb. Don Presley and 185-lb. Ken Cook.

Bob Bronzan, weighing 205, and Duke Tornell, 212, will form a couple of defensive bulwarks at the tackles. Chuck Johnson and

Booklets may not be secured before the time specified for the students' name group, but they may be called for at a later time. No booklets will be given out after 4:00 p.m. this afternoon and 11:00 a.m. tomorrow.

Students whose booklets are not available today because of fines outstanding or late application for admission automatically go into the "Last Group" which registers tomorrow at 9 o'clock.

Two newly acquired fraternity houses will offer living quarters to members of Sigma Gamma Omega and Gamma Phi Sigma, campus social fraternities this year it was announced Thursday by Norman Thorpe and Bill Edwards, presidents of the respective fraternities.

Sigma Gamma Omega's new house is located at Twelfth and San Salvador and will accommodate 14 men, while the Gamma Phi Sigma house is at Fifth and Reed streets and will furnish quarters for approximately 18 members.

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Student Football Fans Enter East Gate At Stadium Tonight

Students attending tonight's football contest between San Jose State and Texas A. & I. at Spartan Stadium must enter through the east gate, Graduate Manager Walt McPherson warned Friday.

With six night home games scheduled for the season, record crowds are expected. Addition of two new bleacher sections on the east side assures plenty of room for the local student body, McPherson stated.

West side of the stadium will be reserved for general admission customers and holders of season tickets, and students will not be admitted. Parking areas for students are also available on the east side of the stadium.

Special Train To Be Carded For USF Grid Game

Plans for San Jose State's first football excursion, a special train to the University of San Francisco game Saturday, were well on the road to completion today, announced Happy LaBee, rally chairman, last week.

With the price for the round trip to San Francisco set at \$1.05, LaBee stated that transportation to Kezar Stadium would be included. The fact that students might want to roam after the game was the reason a return ticket from the stadium was not added.

San Jose State college students who board the special train Saturday will be offered all accommodations possible, LaBee stated. Railway officials have offered to allow holders of these tickets to return from San Francisco within four days. A special dancing car will be included in the special train.

Tickets will be on sale outside the Men's gym today and may be obtained at the Student Union until Thursday afternoon at 4 p.m. LaBee urges students to purchase tickets as early as possible so that arrangements may be made with railway officials. The rally chairman also said new students selected for the grid set to the central room be limited to students now on sale at 10-cent reduction from last year's price.

Potential Yell Kings Will Have Try-outs At Tonight's Game

Seeking to give candidates for the positions of yell leaders a more natural setting for their try-outs, last year's student council passed a provision that the campus yell kings should be selected at an early season football game.

Instead of the customary pep rally assembly, prospective yell leaders will go on trial under game conditions tonight when the Spartans face Texas A. & I. Working in groups of three, the candidates will wear numbers in order that selections may be facilitated.

There will be a meeting of potential yell leaders at 4:00 o'clock this afternoon in Room 24. Jim Fahn, yell king last year, states all candidates must be at the meeting to receive instructions.

Potential yell leaders will have their chance to select and lead yells tonight, using the public address system, according to Jim Fahn, gymnastic 1938 yell king. White shirts will be the only standard part of a uniform required tonight, Fahn stated.

Selection of the trio of leaders for the Spartan rooting section this year will be made by a ballot election sometime this week, most likely Wednesday.

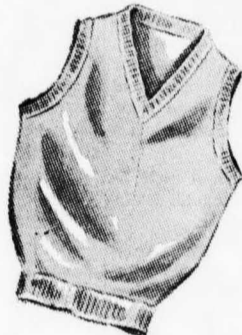
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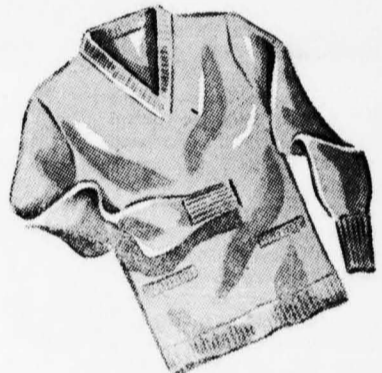
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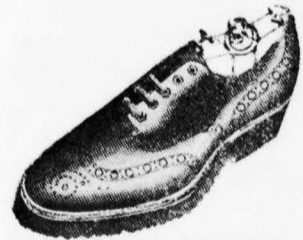
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Eight Faculty Members Join College Staff

Pitman Replaces Goddard As Dean Of Men At State

Eight additional instructors and assistants, and eleven replacements to the college faculty will greet students when they return to classes tomorrow afternoon.

Seven departments, those of speech, mathematics, home economics, art, sociology, commerce, and health, will receive additional faculty strength from the eight new positions.

George B. McCullough, aeronautical engineer, who holds a 1928 M.E. from Stanford will join the mathematics department as an instructor.

An addition to the Sociology department will be Milton B. Rendahl, a graduate of the University of California, as instructor.

Joining the Commerce department as an instructor will be Milburn Wright, while S. D. Phillips, a graduate of the Minneapolis school of art and teacher at Iowa State college for ten years, will become an art instructor.

Miss Marie Carr and Miss Wilda Merritt, both 1939 graduates of San Jose State will join the Speech department as assistants, and Miss Maude L. Ashe, who holds an A.B. from the University of California will be an assistant in the Home Economics department.

Paul M. Pitman, new dean of men, began his duties last week, replacing Charles B. Goddard, who retired during the summer. Wesley R. Goddard, the retiring dean's son, will carry on the family name at San Jose, becoming an assistant in the English department, replacing Miss Helen M. Sprague.

Dr. Esther Shephard, distinguished as both an author and teacher, will become instructor in English, replacing Miss Elsie Swanson. Dr. Shephard, a Ph.D. from the University of Washington, is the author of the Whitman bibliography and book of Paul Bunyan stories.

Two replacements in the library department place Miss Celeste Slauson as instructor and Miss Lodessa Coleman as junior librarian.

In the Physical Education department, Walter McPherson, former football star and captain of last year's eleven, becomes graduate manager and assistant in physical education for men, succeeding Gil Bishop.

Miss Dorothy Manchester succeeds Miss Mary Heitsch in the Home Economics department. Miss Manchester is a graduate of the University of Washington and a former teacher at Kansas State college, Manhattan, Kansas.

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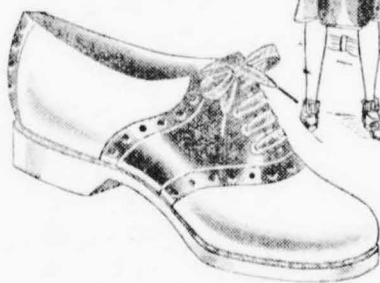

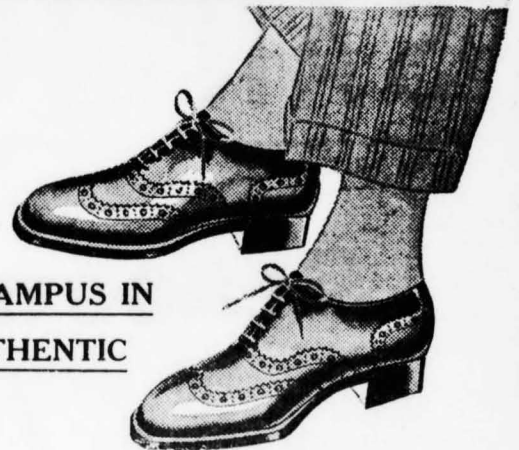

Melodrama and mystery are furnished in the March drama of "Kind Lady" by Chodorov. This thriller presents the story of a woman sealed in her own home by a befriended crook who desires to rob her of her possessions. Her few relatives and friends, taking the young man at his word, believe her to be hopelessly insane and entrust her to his care. On this almost unbelievable thread, an exciting story is based, making a play which in recent years has played to huge audiences the world over.

DRAMA OF INSANITY

Pirandello's absorbing drama, "Henry IV", has been chosen for the fifth production on April 25 and 26. In this play the author presents the case of a man who, through a fall from a horse, becomes insane and believes himself to be Henry IV. He surrounds himself with a court and carries on a life thoroughly believing himself to be that character. Through an incident his sanity returns, but with it extreme unhappiness and his choice is to go back into the make-believe world he had built for himself. Pirandello's question in this play is "What Is Reality?"

For the last production of the regular season there will be presented a modern comedy, as yet unselected.

In addition to these six regular productions, plans are being formulated for several special and experimental productions, the dates

Newman clubs exist in the 250 larger non-sectarian colleges of the country to bring Catholic men and women together for religious, educational, and social purposes.

The San Jose State college Newman club calls to the new Catholic students and offers them the companionship of older students and the use of the club house.

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State Claws Montana Cats 35-0

Spartans' Ground Attack Bowls Over Bozeman Team

Employing Glenn Scobey "Pop" Warner's football wizardry for the first time, the San Jose State Spartans completely mystified the visiting Montana State Bobcats, 35-0, here last Friday night in the opening game of the current Pacific Coast grid season.

The Spartans, using but one formation—Warner's famous double wing—riddled the forward wall of the team from Bozeman with reverses, spinners, and straight drives, and rode the impetus of their ground attack to a lopsided 27-0 half-time lead.

San Jose's running attack began clicking with the first play, and in seven plays the Spartans honey-combed the Bobcat line for 66 yards and a touchdown, immediately following the kickoff. Morrie Manoogian, right halfback, culminated a series of long jaunts on reverses through his own left tackle with a pay-dirt thrust from the one yard line for the first touchdown. Cook's placement was good.

While the San Jose line punched out holes in the Bobcat forward wall, the interference, led by quarterback Davie Titchenal and handsome Ken Cook, running guard, mowed down the secondary defense to pave the way for this drive.

Leroy Zimmerman set San Jose up for its second touchdown when he took the ball on his own 47 and circled right end to gallop 36 yards to Montana's 17. Thrusts by Manoogian, Zimmerman, and Costello moved the ball to the 6-yard line. From this point the latter carried the ball on a reverse around right end for State's second touchdown in the first quarter. Zimmerman's try for point was good.

Headman DeGroot let his red-hot first string cool off during the second quarter, while the Spartan reserves blasted away at the Montanans.

The local "shock troops" earned themselves a scoring opportunity when big Svend Hansen ploughed through from his tackle position to block Bobcat Nick Yovetich's punt and personally make the recovery on Montana's 5-yard line. Carlton Peregoy hit right tackle for four yards and added six more points to the Spartan total on a center smash from the 1-yard line. John Allen converted.

Sparked by a 25-yard run on a reverse by Aubrey Minter, who later moved the ball to the 3-yard line on a 13-yard sprint, Sparta's third stringers scored near the end of the first half on Dick Hubbell's crashing drive off-tackle from this point. Hubbell's kick for extra point failed.

Karl Johannson, giant tackle, paved the way for San Jose's only touchdown in the third quarter when he recovered Phelan's fumble of Peregoy's kick on the

Montana 16. On the first play from this spot Peregoy flipped a neat strike to Howard Costello who romped over from the 12-yard line. Peregoy's kick for point was blocked. San Jose's other two points during the second half came by way of a Montana safety, when Hal Buffa and Chuck Johnson smeared Yovetich behind his own goal line in the third quarter.

San Jose's passing attack, usually the locals' main implement of grid warfare, was below par, with the Spartan Bombers pitching only two strikes in 11 attempts to net a meager 41 yards. However, the San Jose running attack made up the deficit, grinding out 292 yards. San Jose registered 15 first downs.

Montana's attack was unimpressive in all phases of the game, with the Bozeman team earning a net gain of 7 yards from scrimmage and 12 yards from passes for three first downs. The Bobcats did not enter San Jose territory until late in the final quarter.

Three Members Of '38 Squad On All-Time Team

Three members of last year's powerhouse football team were named to the Publicity Department's All-Time San Jose State college grid eleven.

Exclusive of the present squad, the all-time team appearing in the 1939 Spartan Football Brochure lists Lloyd Thomas, end; Mitch Ucovich, tackle; and Keith Birlem, quarterback who finished their careers last year.

Willie Heston, who played at the old San Jose Normal school and later transferred to Michigan where he won fame as an all-time All-American, was purposely omitted "lest San Jose State be accused of grabbing glory from Michigan," the brochure stated.

Zetterquist has been one of the main cogs in the backfield for the Spartans during the past two years and has teamed up with Leroy Zimmerman to form San Jose's famous "Z-men", dangerous pass-throwing duo.

Veteran Morris Manoogian will be given first crack at the right half post against Texas tonight. The Fresno gazelle has been hampered by a bruised leg, but should be ready for action. "Boogy-woogy Bob" Boucke, another senior, is being counted upon to fill in at the wing back position.

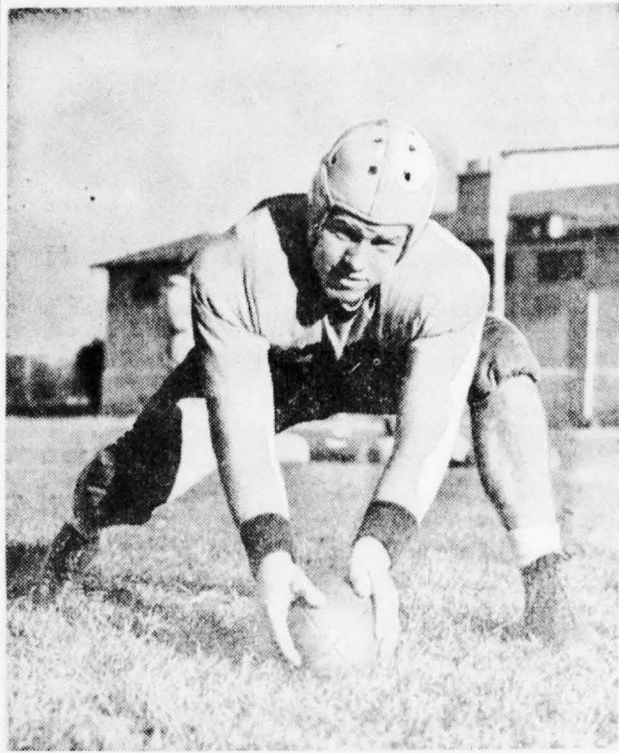

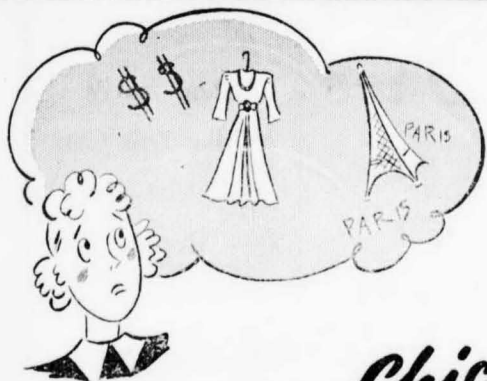
