U.S.F. Smarting From Upset By St. Mary's Of Texas Last Sunday

San Jose's ambitious Spartan grid warriors will seek their third straight victory in eight days when they bump up against the University of San Francisco Dons in Kezar Stadium at 2:30 p.m. next Saturday.

Having followed up a 35-0 shellacking given Montana last Friday night with a 9-0 win over the Texas A. & I. Javelinas Monday, the Warner-DeGroot coached team meets a maddened Don eleven.

Students Vote Today For Yell Leaders

Election of a head yell leader and two assistants will be held in front of the Morris Dailey auditorium today, with polls open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Students will vote for three of five contestants. Jim Fahn, top yell leader last year, will be up for re-election along with Bob Swanson, who was an assistant last season. Three new aspirants, Albert Yim, Tom Taylor, and Gus Cavello, are also on the ballots.

The potential yell kings demonstrated their ability at the State-Texas A. & I. football game Monday night. Anyone voting must present his student body card at the polls. Spartan Spears will handle the voting boxes.

The ballots will be counted by a student body election committee.

REGISTRATION TOTAL NEAR 4000 MARK

Showing an increase of 400 students over the number registered for the fall quarter last year, latest reports from the Registrar's office give a total registration of 3850 students, highest registration in the history of the school.

Of this number, approximately 1100 are entering freshmen and 400 are transfers from other colleges and universities.

Registration figures, on the steady increase since 1928 with the single exception of a drop in 1935, show a difference of 1250 students in the 1934-35 fall session.

In addition of 1950 students to the registration roll in ten year's time is shown by comparison with figures for the fall quarter, 1929-30.

NEW INSTRUCTOR IN POLICE SCHOOL

Replacing Sergeant Clarence Berryessa as instructor in military drill, Edwin A. Simpson, a former local student and a second lieutenant in the National Guard, has joined the faculty of the San Jose State college Police School.

William A. Wiltberger, head of the Police School, will replace Sergeant Howard Hornbuckle as instructor in traffic problems. According to Wiltberger, new drill instructor Simpson will be here for at least three quarters.

Former drill instructors have been Sergeant William C. Brown, of the San Jose Police department, who taught the course in the fall and winter quarters last year, and Sergeant Clarence Berryessa, instructor in the spring quarter and a member of the National Guard

Walkermen Gun For Third Aqua Title In Row

With the entire first team returning that last year captured the Bay City Water Polo league championship for the second consecutive time, Coach Charlie Walker looks forward to one of the greatest seasons in the aqua sport history.

Heading the list of 1938 veterans is Captain Frank Savage, high scorer for the past three years, who will again lead his septet from his center forward spot. Martin Wempe, varsity captain last season, will team with Jim Curran, another veteran, at the two forward posts. Claude Horan and Leon Sparrow, members of last year's aggregation, will again perform in the guard positions.

John Hatch, 1938 freshman captain, is scheduled to alternate in the center back spot with Dean Foster, letter winner from last season. Dick Savage will pay goalie.

In addition to the first team members who return for another season, three potential first stringers, who last year formed the nucleus of the reserve squad, are back in harness. They are Verne Hall, Kent Freil and Harry Baehr.

According to word from Coach Walker, this year's league schedule will be the hardest in Bay City history. Athens Athletic Club of Oakland has entered its number one team in league competition for the first time and the San Francisco Olympic Club, with the addition of new talent appears stronger than ever.

Cook Sparks Local Victory

Field Goal Turns Tide In 9-0 Win Over Texas A.&I.

Guard Kenny Cook turned traitor to his home state last Monday night and supplied the spark that gave the San Jose State Spartans a 9-0 victory over the Texas A. & I. Javelinas in a bruising football game here.

The handsome little Spartan lineman, who astonished the citizens of White Plain (Texas) by kicking the slats out of his cradle some 21 years ago, made as equally a famous kick Monday, booting a neat 34-yard field goal and the Javelinas out of the ball game midway in the fourth quarter.

Cook's timely placement exploded the morale of the fighting Hogs who had turned back threat after threat to hold the Spartans scoreless up until that time. Following "Kenny-bo's" display of toemanship, San Jose found the disheartened Javelinas easy prey, and rammed over a touchdown 4 minutes before the game ended.



Peregoy

San Jose's only touchdown came as a result of a 24-yard drive that was abetted by two penalties inflicted against the Hogs. Mattingly's short kick gave the Spartans a scoring opportunity they finally cashed in.

Peregoy, whose 14-yard gallop to the 5-yard line was instrumental in paving the way for the touchdown, scored from the one-inch line on a power play through center that carried him into the end zone and literally half way up the embankment at the south end of Spartan Stadium.

The Warner-DeGroot men were far the superior, according to the 264 yardage total rolled up by their running and passing attack, but a fighting Texas line repelled three Spartan drives that went to the 15-yard line and two others that penetrated to the 20.

San Jose showed little hesitation in getting down to work, and taking possession of the ball for the first time, the locals' running attack steam-rolled up to the Texas 15 where Helms intercepted Zimmerman's pass behind his own goal line for an automatic safety.

Three more times during the first half the Spartan offensive

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attack worked the ball within striking distance of the Hog goal line, but a fumble by Costello, an interception of Peregoy's pass and just plain stubbornness by the Texans nullified San Jose's chances to score.

It was a costly ball game for San Jose, with backfield men Zimmerman, Peregoy, Hubbell, Manoogian, and Dave Titchenal suffering minor bruises, while End Joe Reginato went to the Health Cottage with a head injury.

Bronzan, Allen, Johnson, Tornell, Manoogian, and Peregoy were the Spartan standouts in addition to Cook. San Jose had plenty of post-game tribute to pay the Texans' Mr. Mattingly.

wearing of pins until after the first rush party.

Section 4. Rush dates for the following school year shall be chosen by the council the last week of each spring quarter. The societies shall have preference of dates according to the year in which they were founded, and such preference shall rotate each year.

Section 5. No special students shall be pledged.

Section 6. Rushing rules shall go into effect on Registration Day of each fall quarter.

Section 7. A statement of the amount of dues, pledge fee, and initiation fee of each society shall be put in the hands of the Dean of Women each rush season, to be shown to any rushee upon request.

Section 8. Parties. (a) There shall be a maximum of four (4) parties, one of which shall be Preference Night.

(b) There shall be no man at any rush party except as professional entertainer, nor shall men escorts to and from said party be allowed except as chauffeurs; and such permission shall be granted by the Dean of Women.

(c) Invitations for parties may be sent out at any time, but there shall be no oral invitations to Preference Night.

(d) There shall be only scheduled rush parties held during rushing season.

(e) A society is responsible for any party other than a scheduled one which is given by any inactive member, alumna, or faculty member during rushing season, to which rushees of that society are invited.

(g) No society member may have any engagement off campus during rushing season with a girl her society is rushing. This includes double dating.

(h) There shall be no publication of rush parties during rushing season.

(i) A society may have only two (2) formal rush parties, providing one is formal tea.

(j) There shall be no dancing at Sunday parties.

Section 9. Bidding. (a) Preference Night bids shall be filed in sealed envelopes with the Dean of Women by eight o'clock on the morning of Silence Day.

(b) There shall be no communication between any member of a society and any girl being bid to that society until the bids shall have been answered.

(c) Immediately after the bids have been filed with the Dean of Women, the Dean of Women shall send to the Co-op a letter summoning each girl who has received a bid.

(d) In a confidential and individual interview each girl who has been thus summoned shall state her preference to the Dean of Women. If she has received a bid from this society, she shall be told and shall not be told of any further bids. If she has not been bid to her preference, she shall be given a second and third choice under the same regulations.

(e) All society groupings on Bidding Day shall be held outside of the main gate after five o'clock.

Section 10. Initiations. (a) There shall be no public initiations.

(b) A pledge shall be carrying a minimum of nine (9) units to

Section 11. The Council shall impose punishment for the breaking of rushing rules by either levying fines or denying as many rush dates as it sees fit.
