Maynard Named To Spartan Daily Editor's Position

COUNCIL POSTS FILLED BY RODRICK, CARMODY; STALEY REMAINS

Bart Maynard, senior journalism major, was appointed editor of the Spartan Daily and Bill Rodrick and Doan Carmody were appointed temporary councilmen to fill the vacancies in the council during the fall quarter in last night's council meeting.

C.A.A. BEGINS AIR TRAINING

With two of the instructors officially re-checked, twenty members of the Civil Aeronautics Authority were assigned to begin actual flight instruction yesterday, according to the Aviation department.

Since government requirements demand one instructor for each ten students, thirty members of the civilian flying program will be on the ground until the other three instructors can be re-checked.

One of the original thirteen colleges throughout the United States selected as a training ground for the C.A.A., San Jose State college now ranks among the nation's first in facilities and personnel.

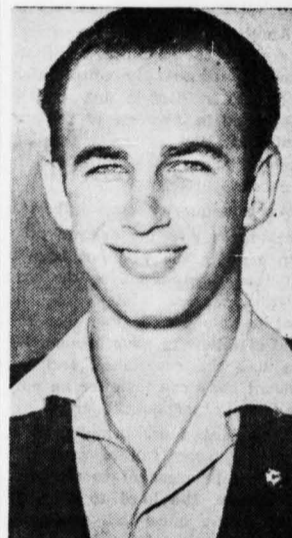
The Rodrick and Carmody appointments will fill vacancies left by Councilmen Bob Bronzan, who will student-teach next quarter, and George Place, who leaves for the east following the end of this quarter. President Hugh Staley, previously granted a leave of absence to student-teach, announced that he would remain in college for the winter session.

Maynard acquires the editorship of the Daily after holding the associate editorship for two quarters and holding previously positions of copy and day editor on the paper. Rodrick is at present associate editor of the Daily while Carmody has been active in student affairs and a star member of San Jose State's champion football team.

Upon the recommendation of present Social Affairs Chairman Selma Kann, Dave Atkinson was appointed to fill the office for the winter quarter.

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Phelan Estate Establishes Two Fellowships

Two fellowships, each carrying a stipend of \$900 for 1940-41 are now being offered to San Jose State college students by the late Senator James D. Phelan's estate. This was the announcement made today by trustees of the estate.

According to the trustees, the fellowships "are made available annually under the terms of a bequest to bring about a further development of native talent in California in the fields of literature and art".

Both men and women may apply for the fellowships, but must be native born citizens of the state. Age limitation is between 20 and 35 years. Application forms may be obtained from the James D. Phelan Award, 658 Phelan building, San Francisco.

This year, painting will be covered in the competition. Literature consideration is limited to fiction, biography, historical narrative, and verse. Short story writers will not be eligible.

The competition closes February 15, 1940.

New Philosophy Course Announced

Philosophy 7A, originally scheduled for the fall quarter, will be given during the coming term, according to Philosophy Professor Elmo A. Robinson.

The three-unit freshman course is a history and general survey of various fields of philosophy. Also to be given is a three-unit upper division course in logic for which there is no prerequisite.

In the three-unit history of philosophy course for sophomores and upper division students, a student may enter the winter quarter without having attended the previous term, according to Dean of Men Paul Pitman.

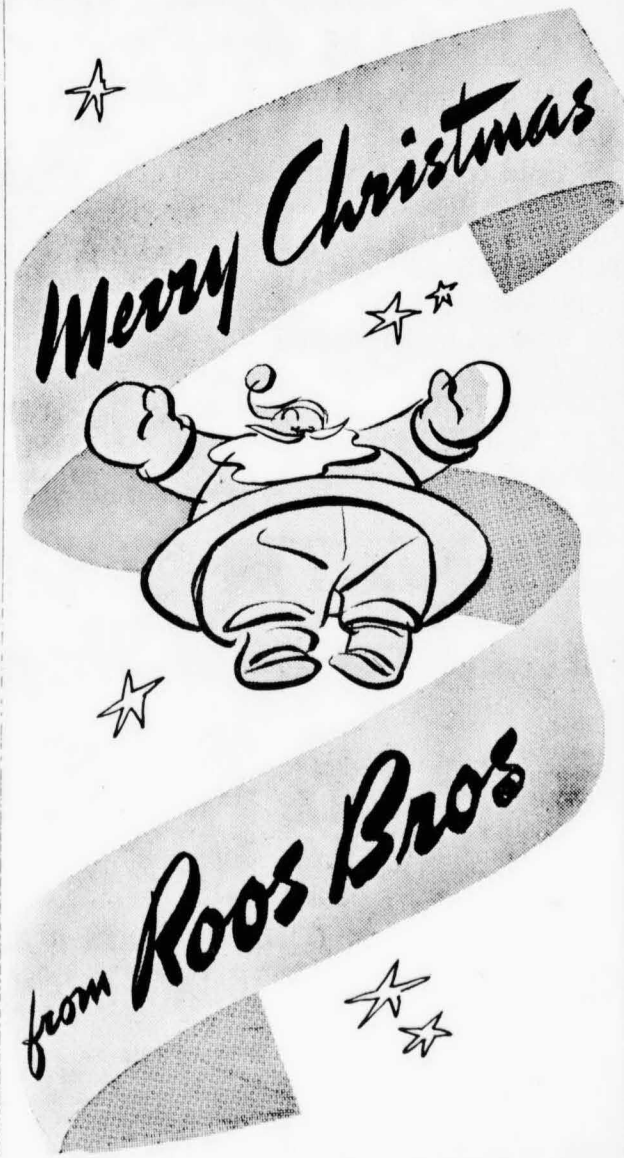

Zimmerman Will Play In Shrine East-West Game

Leroy Zimmerman will play in the annual East-West Shrine game in San Francisco on January 1!

The Spartan fullback will climax his collegiate football career, which is perhaps the greatest in San Jose State grid history, by playing with the outstanding stars of the West against the best from the East. It is the first time this honor has been given a Spartan athlete and comes as a fitting finish to three years of hard work and outstanding performances in the local grid picture.

The invitation to join the West team on December 20 in San Francisco was received by Zimmerman in a telegram yesterday. The wire was from Percy Locey, director of the Shrine Game, and needless to say, "Zimmy" lost little time in accepting the bid.

This latest honor proves that San Jose State is now considered as a power in coast football and adds another feather to Zimmerman's hat which now contains such royal plumages as first string Little All-American (AP), second string All-Coast (UP), first string (All-Coast (Colliers), and honorable mention, Central Press Players' All-American.

College Casaba Tourney Here

San Jose State college will play host to the six California state college basketball squads December 27, 28, and 29 when the second annual casaba tourney will be held.

Quintets from San Diego, Chico, Fresno, Santa Barbara, San Francisco, and Humboldt will vie for honors in the initial tournament of the 1939-40 basketball season.

Although there will be no champion crowned, titles will be conferred on the highest scoring team, the outstanding defensive and offensive men, the best sportsman, and the greatest defensive five.

San Diego's outstanding casaba contingent will be the likely winners of several titles as last year's entire first team has returned. The Aztecs already hold a victory over the strong UCLA Bruins, who meet the local cagers in the opener on December 18 and 19.

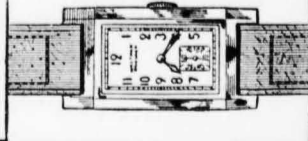
