CLASSES DISMISSED AS STUDENTS, FACULTY PAY CONTROLLER TRIBUTE

Band Plays; Council Sponsors Special Assembly As Sendoff

Today is Neil Thomas day by official proclamation of President T. W. MacQuarrie.

At 10:50 all classes will be dismissed and students and faculty will gather in the main Quad with the band to pay tribute to our popular controller in appreciation for his many services, special help and interest in student affairs.

The council, for which Mr. Thomas is faculty adviser, is sponsoring the special assembly which will feature the presentation of a farewell gift from the student body.

Noon Deadline Set For USF Trip Tickets

Deadline for the sale of the \$5 remaining excursion bus tickets for the San Jose State-USF football game will be today noon, announces Don True, rally committee head.

Tickets are on sale in the Controller's office for \$1. Fare includes the ride directly to Seals stadium. Buses leave from San Fernando street in front of the Student Union at 6 p.m., arriving in San Francisco at 7:30. The kickoff is at 8 p.m. Buses leave 20 minutes after the close of the game.

HYMN AFTER GAME

Spartans who expect to sit in the rooting section are asked to wear rooters' caps. No male student will be admitted in that section without them, said Tommy Taylor, head yell leader.

The head yell leader also pointed out that students are forgetting an old tradition of the college—to remain after the game, win or lose, to sing the college hymn. "Let's not forget that tonight," he said.

HOTELS OPEN HOUSE

Word has been received that open house will be held at two of San Francisco's leading hotels—the Sir Francis Drake and the Cliff Hotel.

Admission to the game will be free to student body card holders. A charge of \$1.10 will be made for general admission.

Debate Teams Name Chairman

William Booth and Tom Griffin have been chosen as chairmen of the upper and lower class debate teams, which will hold their first practice debate Monday at 4 p.m. in room 155.

The topic to be debated upon is: "Resolved, that the Western Hemisphere should form a permanent alliance or union for defense against foreign aggression."

The debate will take the form of a symposium discussion with the freshman-sophomore team upholding the negative argument and the junior-senior team, the affirmative. Ronald Maas will act as moderator - chairman for the teams.

Fees Payable

Students have only one more week in which to pay their course fees without being assessed a late fee, according to Harry Brakebill of the Business office. After October 25 a late fee of \$1 will be charged in addition to the course fee.

Students who delay payment until November 1 will find their registration canceled and they will be reinstated only upon payment of a \$3 reinstatement fee.

ARMY LEASES HALF OF LOCAL FLYING FIELD

One-half of the San Jose airport has been leased to the United States Army for use as an auxiliary field by Moffett field flyers, it was learned from Controller Neil O. Thomas yesterday.

Approximately 60 acres are in the plot which the army has leased from J. C. Azevedo, owner. No army planes will be kept at the field and no buildings will be erected, Mr. Thomas said, but the area is being used from seven to eight hours a day for landing practice. The army is negotiating for several other auxiliary fields in this region, it is understood.

Army and CAA authorities are working out a plan so that two training programs do not interfere with each other, the controller said.

USF Picked

San Jose Again Rates Short End Of Betting Odds

Rated 10-6 underdogs by the Bay Region grid experts, San Jose's Spartans go into Seals stadium tonight attempting to knock over the twice-beaten University of San Francisco Dons.

The down-under spot is nothing new to the Spartans. Last year they went into the Don game on the short end of even bigger odds and came out with a 16 to 6 victory that left the Bay Area "experts" hanging on the ropes.

Both teams enter tonight's game in top shape, and promise to afford those grid fans in attendance a tasty dish of football.

Last night the Dons went through their final workout on the Seals stadium sod to get the lay of the land and accustom themselves to the glare of the lights.

NEW PLAYS

Out at Spartan field, Coaches Winkelman and Warner brushed up their boys on a series of new plays which "Pop" has been throwing at them all week. A defense was also thrown up against USF plays, while a "Don" team tried its luck against the Spartan barrier.

Reports filtering in from San Francisco state that Don Coach Malley plans to have his squad fill the air with passes in an attempt to open up on their scoring.

In two games to date, the Dons have scored only once, while the Spartans have been on the other side of enemy lines pretty often in five games.

TACKLE DUEL

Tonight's game also promises to afford quite a tackle duel. USF's Keith and Mohr carry a heavy task in attempting to stop the reverse runs of Bud Nygren and San Jose's trio of left halves.

Svend Hansen and Bob Hamill face an equally important assignment to clear the way for San

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Brain Battle Looms In Frosh, Marin JC Grid Game Tonight

When the Spartan freshman football team faces Marin junior college tonight in Marin, two former gridiron stars, both outstanding in their respective class, will be trying to outsmart each other in hopes of winning a ball game.

Coach Fred Hamlow, considered the smartest guard in Spartan football history, will be matching strategy with Vic Bottari, former Golden Bear halfback and field general.

Taking the initiative, Coach Hamlow indicated yesterday that he would start a second string combination against the strong jaycee eleven tonight. The Spartan mentor will use his second stringers as long as possible and hold the regulars out until needed.

Opening at the kick-off for the Spartans will be: Howard Brose and Jack McKune at ends; John Kemper, just out for the team, and Charles Uhrhammer at tackles; Louis Bowers and Elwin Hunt at guards; Sag Saghatelian at center; Ernest Luke at left half; Buzz Perego or Knute Pedersen at quarterback; and Jay Parker, a Marin boy, will start at fullback.

REGULARS READY

If this starting unit fails to stop the passing and running attack taught by Bottari and company, Hamlow will rush his fresh regulars into the fray.

Cliff Francome, number one quarterback for the freshman, will suit up according to Hamlow, but will be kept out of action. Francome in playing nearly 60 minutes of ball against Modesto last week hurt an early season injury in practice this week.

DESALARNOS MOVED

John Desalarnos, the frosh defensive power, has been moved to center to replace injured Charlie Marshall. Desalarnos is considered one of the best line backers on the team by Hamlow and will be used for that purpose tonight.

Before the night is far along, Hamlow will probably give his regulars a chance to show their stuff. George Morasci and Al Hardesty at fullback are both in fine shape. Vic Robinson and Don Thompson at ends will see plenty of action, as Hamlow indicated yesterday the frosh will do more passing tonight.

SAN JOSE STATE COLLEGE SOCCER TEAM PLAYS CALIFORNIA TOMORROW

CONTEST STARTS AT 10 A. M. NEAR SPARTAN STADIUM

San Jose State college soccer team not only will be out to retain its Northern California Intercollegiate conference title when it faces the University of California tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock on the soccer field near the Spartan stadium, but it will seek to avenge the defeat the Bears handed it last year.

The two teams fought to a 1-1 tie in one 1939 contest, but in a return engagement the Bears bettered the Macmen, 2 to 1.

TWO WEEKS' REST

Two weeks' rest has proved beneficial to the Spartans, but Capt. Freddie Albright claims the team is not in as good shape as it was when it beat San Francisco State 3 to 1, in the season's opener. TWO-HOUR FINALS

STUDENTS WILL TAKE ALL EXAMINATIONS ON LAST FOUR DAYS OF QUARTER

State students will take all their final examinations this quarter during the last four days in special two-hour periods as a trial scheme, which, if it proves satisfactory, will be adopted for permanent use.

THE PERIODS STAGGERED

"In arranging the schedule, the periods have been staggered in such a way that examinations won't follow the same sequence as in classes, thus eliminating, in most cases, the possibility of a student having too many finals in one day," explains Harrison Heath, chairman of the final examinations committee.

Mr. Heath also emphasized the important point that in no case will the final grade in the course depend entirely upon the grade in this final examination.

The system of having no regular class meetings during the last part of the quarter, devoting the entire time to study and examination, is the system used in the majority of colleges, and was practiced here until 1932.

SUGGESTS CHANGE

The move for a more efficient examination system began last spring when a faculty member wrote a letter to Registrar Joe West suggesting some change. This letter was referred to Dr. MacQuarrie, who turned the problem into the Personnel committee for discussion.

They in turn appointed a committee to canvass faculty opinion and work out the details. The committee, under the chairmanship of Mr. Heath, is composed of Dr. Irene Palmer, Dr. William Poytress, Dr. H. A. Sotzin, Dr. Victor P. Peterson, Dr. Dorothy Kaucher, and Mr. West.

After this group made their report, the plan was formally put into effect on October 10, at a meeting of the department heads.

RECORD KEPT

A record of the success of the plan, including both student and faculty reactions, will be kept by the committee, and its adoption or rejection will then be decided.
