#### COLLEGE QUOTA RAISED; DRIVE MOTTO 'SHARE'

San Jose State's quota for the annual Community Chest Drive this year will be \$360, a five per cent increase over last year, announced Chairman Bill Van Vleck yesterday.

According to Van Vleck, although the set quota is \$360 the ultimate goal will be \$400. With the motto "share" being used instead of "give", all students on the campus will be asked to contribute 10 cents toward the Community Chest Drive.

All organizations on the campus are asked by Van Vleck to prepare their contributions as soon as possible in order to be ready by November 11.

With only one week remaining to get the entire chest drive program in working order, committees are now making final last minute arrangements. The boxing show under the direction of DeWitt Portal is nearly complete. The musical jamboree is still searching for campus talent and will start rehearsals Monday.

### Young Demos Reply To Name Charge

Dear Thrust and Parry:

Miss Elizabeth Moss, president of the so-called "Central Young Democrats", stated in an article published last week that the San Jose State college Young Democrats have, among other things, "withdrawn from the affiliation with the Democratic party."

What Miss Moss means is that the group withdrew from the state organization last June because it did not permit sub-organizations sufficient freedom of thought and activity in its political activities.

The group upon which she chooses to "sling mud" has applied for a charter with the California Democratic Youth Federation.

Miss Moss was a member of the Young Democrats last winter quarter when it was organized. She organized her club more than a month before this group refused to participate in the state convention. As the time element disproves her statement, we're sure the student body would be interested in her real reason for leaving. We let Miss Moss answer that question herself.

The Democratic Youth Federation is the only organization in the state which we feel is constructively working for the preservation of our democratic ideals and the maintenance of peace. We feel that we have more right to the name "Young Democrats" than the machine-ridden "Central Young Democrats."

tempted to make the patrol believe that he and his cohorts were off to our school to wreck terrible havoc.

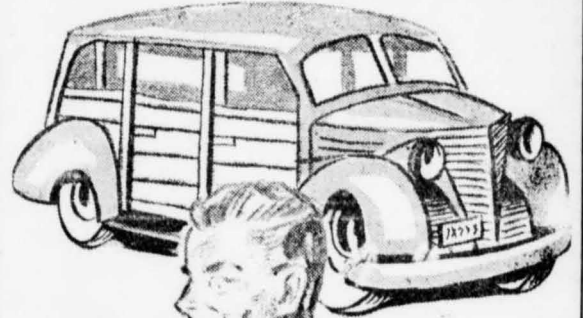

Despite their impressive record to date, the Spartans enter tonight's game with the right attitude. They figure a hefty battle from the Lions, and will be more than satisfied with the narrowest of wins.

All week long reports have been coming out of the south concerning the giant Loyola line. A tip-off on the actual facts is provided by a Southern Cal reporter writing of the Loyola-St. Mary's game:

"Loyola's printed weight averages must be padded considerably because when the rival teams trotted out on the field, the Lions looked like pygmies. In fact, it took the Lions an entire first half to overcome their awe and fear of their gigantic rivals."

Which may help in shedding some light regarding reports of a Loyola line which averages around 215 pounds to the man.

## SOCCER TEAM SEEKS FOURTH WIN SATURDAY

Although his team faces one of the weakest squads in the Northern California Intercollegiate conference—Menlo Junior college—Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at Menlo Park, Coach Hovey McDonald has been putting his soccerites through stiff workouts this week in preparation for the encounter.

The Spartans, who are tied with Stanford for the conference leadership with three victories and no losses each, may be handicapped by the narrow field on which the Menlans play. McDonald has narrowed the boundaries during scrimmages this week to acquaint the San Jose players with cramped conditions.

Reserves are expected to be used freely against the Oaks, provided no ace-in-the-hole is pulled. Menlo was thoroughly whitewashed by the California Aggies, 8 to 0, and the Aggies in turn were downed by San Mateo Junior college, 2 to 1. Stanford trounced the Menlans, 4 to 0.

San Jose, on the other hand, has had only one goal made against it, while tallying nine goals against its three opponents.

Dick and Frank Savage, former Spartan water polo stars, played for the Olympic club last night and gave the Spartans constant trouble.

Playing against the "B" team from the Olympic club, the freshman dropped their game, 7 to 6. Holding a commanding lead, 5 to 3 at half time, the frosh faded badly in the closing minutes of the game to allow the strong club team to overtake them.

Harry Caylor scored four goals for the freshman and kept the opponents busy all night with his fine play.
