BOMB ANNOUNCES START OF ANNUAL FESTIVITIES

be a Cinderella contest for the coed with the tiniest foot; a big foot contest for the male student with the largest pedal extremities; contests for the best costumed male and female and faculty member; whiskerino contest and chariot race.

The chariot race will be held at 4 o'clock on the San Carlos turf. Any number of pushers and pullers can enter in the race but there must be one rider who will be required to stand up.

The freshman-sophomore tug-of-war will be held at 4:15. An historic Spartan Head shield will be awarded the victor. The plaque has been in the custody of the sophomore class but the outcome of today's fracas will determine who is to keep it until next year's Spardi Gras.

Five o'clock feed will be held in the rear quad. Tickets will be on sale at a special booth in the quad for 10 cents. The menu includes a hot dish, salad, drink and dessert.

The day's festivities will be climaxed by a double feature dance held in both the Men's and Women's gymnasiums. Jam and jive will be featured in the Women's gym and sweet-swing will be played in the Men's gym. Clyde Appleby and Jack Stewart's orchestras will supply the music.

Campus Tradition Puts The Destinies Of State In The Hands Of Their Majesties At High Noon



The Dilemma of the Dirty Hands; or Twelve Years of Revelry

"Dirty hands, dirty face, dirty clothes, regular old hoboes. That's what we're going to be. Yes sir, it will be 'Whoopee day' at San Jose State college next Friday." Thus Spardi Gras was introduced to the students for the first time in the history of the college. That was in 1929.

One year later: "Thank Fate and Jimmie Chesnutt for Hobo day." These were the words of acknowledgment on the lips of an entire student body when the festivities were so well accepted that they were continued the following year.

"Jimmie" was the editor of La Torre and, being an ingenious fellow, decided that he could fill the life section of the year book by taking Spardi Gras pictures. His idea was a good one and the annual he edited became known as the "1929 prize La Torre".

Mardi Gras may mean 'Fat Tuesday' in New Orleans, but in San Jose State, Spardi Gras means 'Big Friday'—the day when bums and mums are at large." The stu-

dents became so delighted with the idea that they planned a whole week of bumming in 1932. It became officially known as "La Torre, Spardi Gras Week".

The week was planned with four noon dances, two assemblies, a free "beanfest", a band concert, a picnic, a field day at the athletic field, and a student body dance in the gym. This custom was discontinued the following year after it was banned by the faculty as being too extensive.

In 1932, the Western Newsreel company took sound movies of the carnival and the whole group of merrymakers trooped down to the American and California theaters to see themselves in action. The pictures were shown at prominent theaters up and down the coast.

Concession booths were introduced for the first time at Spardi Gras in 1933. "The carnival is to include all kinds of concessions ranging from beer gardens to jitney dance, and from ice cream booths to a gambling den outfitted

Individual as well as team championships will be competed for with the major opposition for the Spartans coming from the Fresno squad. Edwards is expected to come through with the singles championship, states Blesh, and should encounter little difficulty along the line.

The Pacific Coast Intercollegiate tennis championships will not be played this year, according to Blesh, and the twelve top players in the state will be sent to the National tournament in New Jersey.
