RETURN OF FOOTBALL TEAM STILL UNSETTLED, COACH BEN WINKLEMAN SAYS IN TELEPHONE CONVERSATION

First overseas telephone conversation between Coach Ben Winkleman and Dr. T. W. MacQuarrie yesterday morning at 2:30 o'clock verified the safety of the football team in the Hawaiian Islands.

Like all telephonic communications, the talk was censored. Coach Winkleman said that he did not know when the team would leave the Islands for the United States.

He told the college president that the expenses of the team were being taken care of by the Honolulu police department. The Spartan team was originally scheduled to play a benefit game with the University of Hawaii sponsored by the police department.

The team has been working with the Honolulu police patrolling the downtown area of that city.

Bring ASB Cards For Registration

For purposes of quick identification and to save delay in registration, each returning student is requested to bring his student body card or library privilege card on registration day, according to the Business office officials.

Registration for the winter quarter, January 5, will be held in the Reserve Book room (in the old library) if the army is stationed in the men's gym at that time.

Technical students will not be affected by any changes and will register as previously scheduled.

The following courses have definitely been arranged as a supplement to the schedule of classes: First Aid, drafting, welding, auto mechanics, sheet metal, map printing, shorthand (French), home nursing, Japanese interpreting, canteen service, quantity cookery, care of children in emergency situations, and war time clothing problems.

Classes in first aid will be given by the Health department next quarter as a contribution to the defense program, announced Miss Margaret Twombly yesterday.

"College credit will be given and those finishing these classes successfully will receive Standard Certificates in first aid," she said. The classes will probably be distributed throughout the day so as to give all students interested an opportunity to attend.

Campus Air Raid Shelters Decided

A committee of four members of the college faculty, headed by Dr. P. Victor Peterson, head of the Science department, is working with two San Jose architects to determine what part the campus buildings will play in emergencies. Details will be released in the first issue of the Spartan Daily next quarter as to what buildings will be best as air-raid shelters and which will be taken over as emergency hospitals.
