BILL SMITH AND FRANK MININI DOUBLE WINNERS FOR STATE; SANTA BARBARA HERE SATURDAY

Bill Smith and Frank Minini were double winners for San Jose as the Spartan track team humbled the Stanford Indians for the first time in history, 85 to 46, in a dual meet on Angell field yesterday afternoon.

The next appearance of Coach Bud Winter's squad will be

in a dual meet against Santa Barbara State Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock on Spartan field.

Bill Smith came through with victories in the 100 yard dash and broad jump, and added a tie for second in the high jump to take high scoring honors with 12 points. Frank Minini won his two favorite events, the shot put and discus, without any trouble.

San Jose's victory was clean cut as they swept two events, the two mile in which Dick Knox and Irving Smith trailed Eustace Rojas to the tape in 10:34.6, and the discus which Minini won at 134 feet 1 inch followed by Lawrence O'Connor and Lawton Hay. In five other events, the 440 yard dash, 100 yard dash, 880 yard run, the shot put, and broad jump, the Spartans placed one two.

Conditions for the meet were poor as a cold wind blew directly into the faces of the sprinters and hurdlers and undoubtedly slowed the times down considerably.

Probably the best marks for Winter's men were Vern Cooley's 13 feet 6 inches in the pole vault and Minini's 48 feet 10 3/4 inches heave of the 16-pound iron ball. Cooley cleared 13 feet 6 inches easily and then attempted 14 feet. At this height he got over the bar but brushed it off with his chest on the way down.

Students To Ballot On Class Officers, Constitution Wednesday; Petitions Due On Monday At 3

Members of the student body will go to the polls Wednesday to vote in their new class officers and signify their approval or disapproval of constitutional amendments.

This was the "go-signal" given by the Student Council when they met for the first time this quarter Tuesday night. The council has been working on the student body constitution for the past two quarters.

Members will put their revisions to a ballot on the same ballot that votes for the new class officers.

NAMES CHAIRMAN
At the same meeting the Student Council named Ken Stephens, advertising major, social affairs committee chairman for the quarter. This action was taken on the recommendation of Jerry Byrnes, last quarter's chairman.

Preferential ballots will be used in this coming election. If this system of casting votes proves successful, the preferential method will be used for all future elections.

ELECTION JUDGE

Election Judge Gene Long requires that all students expecting to vote in the election for class officers have their nomination petitions in the Associated Student President's office by 3 o'clock today.

Nomination petitions must be signed by fellow students in their own names who are student body card holders. Other requirements for candidates are that the nominee must not be on probation, carry more than the required units, and must have an ASB card.

Two Social Science Courses Still Open

Until Friday night, students may enroll in Economics 60 and Social Science 180B, two new social science courses being given this quarter, announces Dr. William Poytress, head of the Social Science department.

Economics 60, dealing with the types of co-operatives now prevalent in the United States, is being given upon the request of the students. There are 31 enrolled in the course. Background material for the quarter's work will be supplied by Dr. Poytress, and each student will be required to give a report on the various co-operative movements in one of the states.

Social Science 180B, a seminar course given by Dr. Poytress on financing the war, is primarily for the purpose of keeping students abreast of the present economic trends relating to the emergency.

State Grapplers Face California Tomorrow Night

Spartan wrestlers will battle California university tomorrow night in the local pavilion at 7:30 o'clock.

The Bears will be favored this year over the Spartans as they are leading the Pacific coast conference with an impressive win over UCLA, whom the Spartans just barely nosed out. The Bear matmen also took the Far Western tourney last quarter.

For the State team it will be Captain Dave Hines, 165; Ivan Olsen, 136; Leroy Charlesworth, 145; John Castleman, 155; Hans Wiedenhofer, 175; Gray McConnell, heavyweight, and Bobby Sakamoto, 121.

IRIL CROWE, FORMER S. J. STATE STUDENT, KILLED IN ARMY PLANE

Iril Crowe, 22, a flying cadet at Minter Field, Bakersfield, and a former aeronautics student at San Jose State college, was killed late yesterday when the trainer plane in which he was flying crashed near Delano.

Crowe, a former president of the San Jose State Flying club, left the campus the first of December to enter the United States Army Air corps. Before enrolling at San Jose State college he attended Santa Clara High school from which he graduated.

He is survived by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Iril Crowe of Santa Clara.

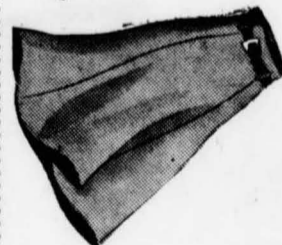

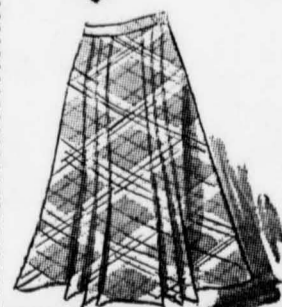
