



Glenn "Tiny" Hartranst, in announcing the appointment last Friday, explained that Hubbard would not do any outside coaching other than the regularly scheduled P. E.

DeGroot became head of the P. E. department and football coach, while Hubbard became has and later head basketball ball

While here, Hubbard developed many outstanding basketball stars, among them being Lloyd Thomas, Johnny Allen, Guss Kotta, Stu Carter, Hal Carruth and others. In 1938 his team won the Northern California Intercollegiate Basketball championship. The conference was made up of Santa Clara uni-versity, St. Mary's college, U. S.
