### STUDENT BODY AND CLASS OFFICERS TO BE CHOSEN; POLLS OPEN FROM 9 TO 4

Elections will be held today for student body and class officers between 9 and 4 o'clock. Vying for the two positions open for juniors on the Student Court will be David Webster, art major from San

Francisco; Carmendale Fernandes, speech major from Turlock; Helen Stevenson, psychology major from San Jose; Ray Lua, biological science major from San Jose; and Marge Kluge, math major from San Jose.

Candidates for the two positions as freshman representative on the Student Council are Catherine Gorham, general elementary major from San Jose; Barbara Retchless, speech major from Burlingame; and Emerson Arends, pre-med major from San Jose.

Despite the fact that the candidates for court justice must have reached junior status and that representatives to the council must be freshmen, the entire student body will vote preferentially for these posts.

Marge Howell, ASB vice president, urges all students to exercise their privilege and responsibility in voting.

In the class presidential race, the seniors will decide between Jeanne Fischer and Bob Coombs; the three candidates put up by the juniors are Marianne Hayes, Ernestine DeFord, and Bill Glienberg, while George Milias, Bob Barton, Phyllis MacDonald, and Dadie McNeill will battle it out for the post of future leader of the sophomore class.

Ken McGill, Jack Marcipan, and John Peterson will run for prexy of the freshman class.

## DR. MABEL NEWCOMER SPEAKS AT BROTHERHOOD WEEK ASSEMBLY TODAY

A talk on the subject "Will the Struggle for World Markets Prevent World Peace?" by Dr. Mabel Newcomer will highlight today's Brotherhood Week assembly at 11 o'clock in the Morris Dailey auditorium. Classes will be dismissed so that all students and faculty mem-

will have an opportunity to attend the meeting. The ASB Chapel committee is sponsoring the assembly as part of the campus observance of World Brotherhood Week, beginning today and ending Friday, February 19.

Dr. Newcomer is chairman of the Department of Economics at Vassar college, and is a recognized expert on the subject of taxation. She is the author of such works as "Taxation and Fiscal Policy," and of several studies on local and national tax problems. Her pamphlet, "You Are A Taxpayer," has been used as study material by the League of Women Voters.

In addition to her address at the all-school assembly at 11 o'clock, Dr. Newcomer will speak to education majors and members of the faculties of local high schools and junior high schools on the topic "Responsibility of the Teacher in Citizenship Training." This meeting will be held in the college Little Theater at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

She will be introduced by Dr. William Poytress, head of the Social Science department at San Jose State college. The Reverend Charles P. Hardeman, pastor of Sacred Heart Church, San Jose, will deliver the invocation.

The college band will play before and after the address. An attempt is being made to obtain a vocalist for the occasion.

Recently, Dr. Newcomer served as a delegate to the United Nations Monetary Conference held at Bretton Woods. She has also worked as an advisor to Governor Thomas Dewey on New York state taxes, and has been a consultant to the Federal Treasury department.

### UPPERCLASS MIXER SET FOR THURSDAY NIGHT FROM 8 TO 11

### Spartan Cagers Snap Losing Streak

Led by lanky Don McCaslin, who set a new Spartan Pavilion individual scoring record, the San Jose State varsity basketball team trounced the San Francisco State five, 47 to 28, to gain revenge for the extra-period set-back the locals suffered from these same "Gaters" a week ago. McCaslin added 19 points in the last half to a first period total of 13, to ring up 32 digits, one more than the old mark set last year by Dale Sears, former USC star, then playing with the Armed Guard.

While McCaslin's sharp-shooting was a deciding factor in the Spartan's first victory in ten games, the defensive play of the entire State team was greatly improved.

San Jose will go through an informal scrimmage with a group of overseas veterans from Mare Island tonight and closes its season tomorrow with a quintet from Fort Ord.

## Faculty Committees Turn In SJS Self-Survey On School Properties And Students

With the ultimate goal of complete modernization after the war, committees made up of faculty members are now turning in their reports on the self-survey of San Jose State college.

According to Joe West, registrar and chairman of the self-survey program, some of the reports are being acted upon immediately, while other suggestions will have to wait until after the war to go into effect. The three chairmen for the survey are E. S. Thompson, Milburn D. Wright, and Mr. West.

The self-survey project was started a year ago, with every faculty member taking part on one of the 21 committees. Recommendations are made by these committees that affect the school properties and students. One of the projects now under way is the digging that is being done in the Quad to make the underground plumbing more accessible. The same research is being made of the acoustics and electricity in each building.

## State Fish And Game Official Will Lecture Tonight At 7:30

"California Birds of Prey," a color film and lecture by Donald D. McLean of the State Division of Fish and Game, will be presented at the Santa Clara Valley Audubon Society's monthly meeting tonight at 7:30 in room 210 of the Science building.

McLean, field biologist and author of many scientific papers, is an accomplished ornithologist, possessing one of the finest bird collections in the state, according to Dr. Ralph A. Smith of the Science department.

The movies will show close-ups of eagles and the various hawks and owls of the state, and will feature pictures of the California condor, a bird rapidly approaching extinction.
