A collection of dry brush draw- ning, president. cluded, or six jars of preserved ings by Stow Wengenroth, eminent American lithographer, is currently on display in the Art wing corridor.

Employing an unusual technique, these pictures are exceptional, believes Dr. Marques E. Reitzel, Art department head. They are made with ink by the use of the spreading hairs of a watercolor brush, regulation of the pressure producing lighter or darker lines, the whole effect being that of a pencil drawing.

Used as illustrations in various magazines throughout the country, the brush drawings are intended to be preliminary to rendering in stone - lithographing. According to Dr. Reitzel, Wengenroth is the foremost American lithographer since Pennell.

Wengenroth dry brush paintings will be exhibited by the Art department all the rest of the month. Also on display are two oil paintings by members of Dr. Reitzel's
