When Prince Mikail hands M. Arbeiziat a glass of something to take for his cold, you can tell by the face Arbeiziat makes that it isn't pleasant. And you can understand why he almost immediately sees butterflies whizzing around.

Bill Perron, who plays Arbezait, is a member of the French society, Iota Delta Phi. A banker downtown, he is a regular member and has appeared just as regularly in French productions for the past few years. He's utterly lovable in the part of the French businessman, although it would blight his fondest dreams to hear

According to a Broadway columnist (and he should know) Jaques Deval, author of the comedy, is going to have another hit appear on the "Great White Way" soon. It's called "Oh Brother!" and Arleen Whelan and a couple of other girls are going to wander through it wearing bathing suits. Which will be nicely decorative. In "Tovaritch," Claudine Wiesmann will appear in a satin robe and a royal red velvet cloak, and that will be nicely decorative too, if you've ever seen Claudine.

Deval is the playwright who, like all other playwrights, once promised the part of a maid in one of his plays to three different and beautiful girls. He ended up by rewriting it and putting in three maids, one for each girl.

John Coray, a first year French student, is playing a key role in the play. He sort of wraps the story up and brings it out happy in the end. He's been working very hard and his portrayal of Gorochenko, the communist Russian, is well done, we're told.

SPARTANS IN THE SERVICE

>>>>>>>>>>>>>>>>> Three former San Jose State college men - all now with equal military rank — enjoyed a recent get-together at the Jacksonville Army Air Field in Florida. They were Capt. D. S. True, USMC, prominent in the student body here and member of the Student Council; Capt. Weaver Meadows, USNR, formerly associate professor in business administration; and Capt. K. W. Cook, USAAF, one-time pilot of the San Jose football team during its successful 1939 campaign.

I recently received a rather informative letter from former Spartan P. E. major Walter Meyer, now a corporal stationed with the Army Medical Corps in England. He writes:

"The San Francisco Conference seems fraught with possibilities and no doubt you are right in your glory there. Seeing all the delegates from the various parts of the world would be very interesting in itself. If never before, San Francisco can certainly be regarded as a melting pot of be as eagerly awaited as the high hopes before it were. The behindthe-scenes struggle between the U. S., England, and Russia is hardly comforting to the men expecting peace in the future but by clashing now they may get something done or ironed out at least. They had better. Frankly, though, from observations here, one can hardly expect much in the way of progressive, liberal government from the English.

"Happened to be in London the morning of V-E Day and must say it was quite a feeling. We mingled with the crowds in Piccadilly Circus, danced and sang with the celebrants in the streets, marched in a couple of impromptu parades and procured a snapshot of Churchill. Old "Winnie" was leaving Westminister Abbey after the services following his speech. He was as happy as a lark and plainly showed it - a far cry from the Dunkirk miracle, the blitz of '40 and '41, and the Rommell advance into Egypt.

"The hot weather of last week - amazing thing - has changed for the customary cool."

Robert Geremia, gunner's mate, second class, a two-year all-city footballer at Sacramento, and winner of a scholarship to San Jose State before enlisting in the Navy in March, 1943, now is in charge of the gun crew aboard a patrol craft which has returned for a brief rest from the hot spots of the Central Pacific.

Geremia says there's nothing he'd rather do after the war than go back to college - preferably the University of Southern California - and play football.

Aboard this vessel since it was commissioned in October, 1943, he has had 17 months duty outside the continental limits of the United States, and wears a star in his Asiatic-Pacific theater ribbon for his participation in the probable sinking of a Japanese sub.

Former Stater Sgt. John Chaney, now in the Coast Artillery, is home on a 30-day furlough from St. Davids island off the coast of the British Indies.

Sgt. Chaney has been in the Army for three years. While at State he majored in general elementary teaching. He left college when he was in his senior year.

announced the results of the poll recently conducted among students living in boarding houses around campus.

The purpose of the questionnaire was to take the pulse of students on the "minority problem" in an attempt to gain as accurate a picture as possible of campus opinion.

Following are some of the questions and the percentage results: "Do you believe that racial equality can ever be practically worked out?" 43.3 yes, 27.3 no, and 29.4 uncertain answers were given.

"If you had interests in common, would you be willing to ask no, 18.6; uncertain, 13.9.

Student Christian Association has your room-mate?" Yes, 42 per cent; no, 40.3; uncertain, 17.7.

"Would you object to working with a person of another race for the same wages and on an equal basis?" Yes, 16.1; no, 76.1; uncertain, 7.8.

"Do you believe that Negro soldiers and Japanese-American coldiers should be segregated in separate Army camps?" Yes, 41.6; no, 44.1; uncertain, 13.9.

"Given equal cultural and educational opportunities, do you think that any race is inherently inferior to another?" Yes, 45.9; no, 73.7; uncertain, 5.

"Would you object to dancing with a colored person?" Yes, 67.5;
