ASB Card Sales 2100 In First Three Days: Nearly 100 Per

Over 2100 Associated Student Body cards have been sold during the first three days of college, with sales continuing for the rest of the quarter in the Business Office, Mary Hooton, ASB treasurer, announced yesterday. "We are so close to reaching the 100 per cent mark, that I want once again to urge all students to buy their cards right away," Miss Hooton said. Veterans may get their ASB cards free,

if they come under the G. I. Bill

of Rights.

There will be more need now than last year for a card. Miss Hooton stressed, because of the possible football games this fall. A card also entitles its owner to belong to campus organizations, receive medical care, and attend all games and dances.

For those students who do not plan to stay in school all year, a refund on their cards will be made at the time of their departure. It is therefore possible to obtain the card for only one or two quarters and gain all the benefits for that time without losing money.
