D. WEBSTER HEADS COURT; C. ENGLE SOCIAL AFFAIRS AS COUNCIL OPENS YEAR

At the first meeting of the year of the Student Council Monday night, Dave Webster, senior art major, was appointed chief justice of the Student Court. Webster was elected justice last year, and his appointment as chief justice will leave a vacancy on the court.

Other appointments made at the meeting were for the Social Affairs committee. Claire Engle is chairman, and assisting her as vice chairman will be Stephen Voorhees. At a meeting of the Veterans organization to be held October 11 at 11 a. m., it was decided that the Social Affairs committee serve refreshments to that group.

Plans were also made at the meeting for a dance for all new students, to be sponsored by the Social Affairs committee. Also considered were changes for registration day which will make registering easier for incoming students and relieve congestion in the halls.

Party For Frosh Tomorrow Night In Women's Gym

The annual party given by the Social Affairs Committee for all freshmen and new students will take place in the Women's gym tomorrow night, October 5, from 8:30 to 12.

"Purpose of the party is to provide an opportunity for all the new students to get acquainted," says Claire Engle, Social Affairs chairman, who is in charge of arrangements.

Beside dancing and entertainment, refreshments will be served. Admission will be by ASB card for stags and 40 cents for escorts without cards. Only freshmen, new students and their escorts will be admitted.

VETERANS TO HOLD MOONLIGHT DANCE FRIDAY, OCT. 12

"By the Light of the Silvery Moon" next Friday, October 12, students will gather to dance in the Quad from 7:30 to 11:00 p.m. under the auspices of Mu Delta Pi, campus veterans' organization. The dance is being planned especially for the new veterans at San Jose State, as a welcome and get-acquainted affair.

All wearers of discharge buttons will be admitted free, while the charge for other students will be 25 cents a couple or 15 cents stag.

The veterans report that they held a very successful dance in the Quad during Summer Session, and they hope to have a satisfying turnout next week, the first time in recent years an evening Quad dance has been tried. Decorations will take care of themselves with the co-operation of the weather and colored lights to heighten the effect of palms, arched corridors and ivy-covered tower.

Refreshments are promised, including popcorn for all, and cokes for the popcorn, under the management of Earl Motta. Jack Daniels is over all chairman for the dance, with Don Cassidy handling detail arrangements.

Lt. Brisbin Added To Gold Star Honor Roll

The addition of Lt. (s.g.) Robert E. Brisbin to the Gold Star honor roll brings the total number of Spartans who have given their lives in service to 130.

Lt. Brisbin, a member of the Navy air force, was killed August 24 in the Pacific. He was executive officer of his ship. His mother lives at 180 Devine Street, San Jose, and his wife is a resident of San Francisco. Lt. Brisbin was buried on the island of Maui.

Fall Play Tryouts Scheduled In Little Theater October 8

Tryouts will be held in the Little Theatre Monday, October 8, from 4 until 6 o'clock for "Ladies In Retirement," the first play on the dramatic schedule for this college year.

"Ladies in Retirement" was especially chosen to open the season," says Dr. Hugh Gillis, Speech department head, "because of its wide student appeal. This will be the first year since Pearl Harbor that we have attempted a full season of six productions."

Parts for six women and one man will be cast during the tryouts. Leading part in the production is that of Ellen, a housekeeper upon whom the action of the play focuses as she struggles vainly against circumstances to care for her two demented sisters. Her struggles lead her as far as murdering her mistress, a retired actress. Her sly nephew discovers the secret with the help of Lucy, the maid, and proceeds to blackmail her.

Mr. James Butler, new member of the Speech department will direct the play, and Mr. J. W. Johnson, technical director, with Al Johnson as assistant, will arrange the settings.

"Ladies in Retirement" was written by Edward Percy and Reginald Denham and was produced on Broadway in 1940 with Flora Robson in the lead. It was later made into a movie with Ida Lupino starring.

Copies of the play are on reserve in the library for those students who wish to read it before the tryouts.

Students who are cast in the production must be members of the Associated Student Body and no student will be cast if he is on second probation, according to Dr. Gillis.

O.T. DIRECTORS TO MEET HERE TOMORROW

Directors of occupational therapy from nearly a dozen northern California military and civilian hospitals will be on campus tomorrow when officers and members of the Northern California Occupational Therapy association convene here to meet San Jose State college O. T. students and to inspect the college Occupational Therapy training facilities.

Among those attending, according to Miss Mary Booth, head of the Occupational Therapy department, will be Lt. (j.g.) Lucy Gore, president of the Association and director of Occupational Therapy at Mare Island; Miss Bonnie Malcott, vice-president, director of O. T. at the Veterans' Administration, Palo Alto; and Ensign Virginia Lanning, secretary, assistant in O. T. at Mare Island; who will attend a special meeting at 10 o'clock in the morning to discuss the problems of clinical training of occupational therapy students.

ASB Card Sales 2100 In First Three Days; Nearly 100 Per Cent

Over 2100 Associated Student Body cards have been sold during the first three days of college, with sales continuing for the rest of the quarter in the Business Office, Mary Hooten, ASB treasurer, announced yesterday. "We are so close to reaching the 100 per cent mark, that I want once again to urge all students to buy their cards right away," Miss Hooten said. Veterans may get their ASB cards free, if they come under the G. I. Bill of Rights.

CALIFORNIA STATE GUARD BAND TO BE FORMED HERE

Dr. Earl Atkinson, Commerce department head, has been appointed commanding officer of the first battalion band of the State Guard. Dr. Atkinson will be responsible for organizing the 28-piece group.

Members of the band will be chosen from college students or any other musician who is 17 years or older. Uniforms, music, and transportation will be furnished by the State Guard. The band will be able to play for events other than those concerned with the guard as long as the uniforms are worn. Official performances will include reviews, parades, and patriotic observances. Members will also be offered the use of the rifle and machine-gun ranges, armory lockers, and lounge. Only two hours a week are required for practice.

Any young man who is interested in joining the band should see Dr. Earl Atkinson, Vernon Parrish, or stop at the Armory, 240 N. Second St., San Jose, any Monday night between 7:30 and 10 o'clock.

Capt. Louie A. Rossi and Lt. Larry Gott will be present at the next meeting of the Veterans to discuss the band with them.

FAMED MUSICIAN TO COACH STUDENTS IN GERMAN LIEDER

Advanced vocal students of Miss Maurine Thompson will be instructed by Coenraad V. Bos, eminent coach-accompanist, in the German Lieder Saturday at 1:30 p.m.

Mr. Bos has played throughout the world for such outstanding artists as Schumann-Heink, Ponselle, Thomas and Spaulding. The first public performance of the "Four Scripture Songs" by Brahm was played by Bos with Brahm in the audience.

At present Bos is in the west accompanying Helen Traubel in her concert series. For the past few years he has been coaching her, and played a large part in persuading her to sing the Wagnerian roles at the Metropolitan.

Miss Thompson, vocal instructor who has studied under Bos, extended the invitation to the eminent coach to appear at the college.

Sign-up Deadline

STATE FACULTY CONTRIBUTES TO SCIENCE BOOK

Dr. Carl D. Duncan, professor of entomology and botany, is responsible for the rewriting and supplying of transitional material for a book, "Science in the Elementary School."

Material for this volume was contributed by scientists and teachers of California, and of these, San Jose State has the greatest representation. They are Dr. Oscar Brauer, Dr. Carl D. Duncan, Dr. Karl Hazeltine, Mrs. Wanda McCormack, Miss Elizabeth McFadden, Mr. Wilber Moreland, Dr. Gayle Pickwell, and Dr. Gertrude Witherspoon.

The book was first printed in mimeographed form and then revised by Dr. Duncan. It is written for the teaching of science in the primary and junior high school grades. The edition contains an annotated bibliography of scientific books for children in these grades.

George E. Stone, assistant professor of photography, photographed the frontpiece and several other pictures throughout the book.

Ivan Waterman, chief of the division of textbooks and publications for the State Department of Education, said in a letter to Dr. Duncan: "I feel that the excellence of this book is due in a large measure to your careful and painstaking work on it."

The volume was published this summer and is to be placed in the hands of all teachers in the elementary schools of California.

A display of the book's elution is on view in the showcases of the first floor corridor in the Science building.

Science Program To Include Movie On Birds

Under the auspices of the Santa Clara Valley Audubon Society, a colored movie of the life history of the California birds of prey will be shown in the Science building, Monday, October 8, at 7:45 p. m. in room S 210.

The movie was taken by Dr. Howard Hill, Dr. Telford Work, and Mr. Albert Wood. These men spent some time in the deserts of Southern California photographing the birds from real life.

This is a first in a series of lectures and movies to be presented during the college year.
