Bill Hubbard's Spartans came right back with a drive that ended when Max Culver drove over from the one yard line to tie the score. Bill Perry kicked the extra point and the crowd went wild with the Golden Raiders out in front 7-6.

Almost as fast as you could write it, the big Gold and white team was back with two scores before the first period ended. Quarterback, Jim Jackson passed 37 yards to Babe Nomura who We hope all the freshmen will went over standing up for the second San Jose TD seconds later, Bob Pifferini intercepted Yonamines's pass on the All-Star 27 and with Culver and Hardisty carrying the Spartans had their third touchdown. Culver hit pay dirt over his own right tackle for the counter. Perry failed to convert either the second or third score, but the crowd settled back to quietly watch a runaway.

Then, almost as suddently as it had started, the Spartan scoring was done for the evening and it was the All-Stars who had the crowd yelling for blood. From their own 10, the Hawaiians moved the length of the field on a pass interception and two completions by Joe Tom, 150 pound half-back. Tom to Judo Takahashi for ten did the trick as the half ended. San Jose 19, All-Stars 12, and the crowd wondered.
