

Spartan Frosh Clash With Gator Hoopsters

Coach Danny Glines' frosh cage team will be seeking its second straight win tonight at 6:15 when it entertains the San Francisco State freshmen in the Spartan gym.

It stacks up as an interesting spectator game, as the two teams use contrasting styles on offense. The Spartababes are a deliberate ball-control team, while the Gators resort to a fast and high-scoring brand of ball.

San Jose won its opener last weekend at Oakland City College, 50-48, in its only decision of the early season, while SFS has compiled a 1-2 log.

Coach Glines' club is still being hampered by injuries, as regulars Bill Clegg, Mike Smith and Frank Tarrantis will see limited action against the Gators. Only Clegg will start.

One bright spot, however, is Bob

Griggs' return to the starting five. Griggs sat out the Oakland fray with an ankle injury and will be making his college debut tonight.

Glines emphasized that Griggs' return will bolster the squad considerably, asserting, "Bob is an outstanding shooter and a fine team leader."

Joining Griggs in the backcourt is Pete Newell Jr., while S. T. Safold and Clegg will start at forwards. Jeff Goodere at center rounds out the starting five, while Craig Fergus, Jack Miller, Doug Paul, Ben Bower, Smith and Tarrantis are expected to see action.

Coach Bob Rodrigo's squad is big and fast, and much better than its 1-2 record might indicate. In its lone win against Lincoln High of San Francisco and two losses to USF and Santa Clara freshmen teams, the Gator frosh has displayed ample scoring punch. Defense has been its weak point.

According to Glines, both USF and Santa Clara have "excellent teams." Neither one walked off with an easy victory over the Gators.

Against Santa Clara Tuesday, the Gator yearlings led most of the way before finally succumbing, 84-65. Mike Ryan, 6-6, and Allan Cox, 6-4, sparked SFS.

Four Games In Intramural Basketball

Four games are on tap for tonight's only intramural league action at 3:45 and 4:45 p.m. in the Men's Gym. No other games have been scheduled since the varsity basketball team is playing tonight.

In Tuesday night's action, the Phi Sigs barely edged Lambda Chi, 45-41. Phi Sigs used free throw shots to win the game, and the mistake of Lambda Chi's stall also contributed to the winners' cause. Don Shoemaker hit for 12 points for Phi Sigs.

Sigma Chi upset Delta Upsilon, 42-33, as Jack Rainey scored 13 tallies and Ed Marcos dropped in 12 points for Sigma Chi.

Theta Chi continued its winning ways by routing Delta Sigma Phi, 48-33. Steve DeCoite was TC's high point man for the night, hitting on 11 field goals and four free throws for 25 points.

The Shieks and Washburn battled to a 42-42 tie in the regular contest, but the Shieks eventually eked out a 50-46 win in double overtime. Gus Anderson contributed 24 points, but it was the clutch shooting of Hanford Kwan, who scored four points in the final overtime, that gave the Shieks the victory.

In other contests, SAE rolled over Sigma Pi, 49-22. ATO trounced Theta Xi, 34-17. PiKA slipped past the Sig Eps, 39-31. The Rejects clobbered the Nomens, 49-18.

The 4-nicators maintained their perfect bowling record and play second-placed Sig Eps today at 3:45.

Cagers Meet Gators Tonight

The Spartan cagers open their home season tonight at 8:15 in the Spartan Gym against the San Francisco Gators. The two schools' freshman squads will tangle in a preliminary game at 6:15.

Tomorrow the Spartans will return to action in the Spartan Gym at 8:15 against a tough Santa Barbara five. Santa Barbara opened against Loyola and almost beat them before bowing 60-54.

The Santa Barbara cagers missed numerous opportunities that could have changed the outcome in its favor according to coach Stu Inman.

Tuesday night the Gators were humiliated by the Santa Clara Broncos 86-58. The standout for SFS was guard Mike Carson who scored 14 points. Mahlon Harmon, a 6-4 forward, also was impressive for the losers.

The probable starting lineup

for the Gators will find 6-7 Tom Cleary at the post. Cleary is returning for his last year at SFS. He was a starter on last year's team. He will be one of the scoring threats for San Francisco. A good hook and lay up are the best shots he has.

Brad Duggan, 6-4, and Jim Cunningham, 6-2, will open at the forwards. Duggan, a transfer from City College of San Francisco, was the leader of the CCSF state championship team in 1961-62. He is a good ball handler and excellent shooter from any position on the court.

Cunningham is a three year veteran at SFS. He has been called the team's best handler and "inspirational leader" by coach Paul Rundell.

Mike Carson, 5-9, and Bill Nocetti, 5-11, are slated to open at the guard positions. Carson is a speedy man who can shoot from the inside and outside. He is the man the Gators claim makes their fast break game go.

Nocetti is another member of the CCSF championship team that transferred to SFS. He is fast and smart on the court, a team player and leader.

Inman's Spartans will probably open with big Harry Edwards starting at post. Edwards didn't start either game against Portland last weekend, but he had a fine second half Saturday night and scored 14 points to tie Dennis Bates for high point honors for the SJS squad.

Bill Robertson and Bates will probably get the nod at the forwards. Robertson is the leading

scorer after two games with 22 points. Bates is right behind him with 20 markers.

Inman said that junior college transfer Eddie Sims will also see a lot of action. Sims scored 16 points in the two games against Portland. Mel Simpson will be another forward who Inman will take a good look at in both games.

Bill Yonge and Ron Labetich will be starters in the backcourt. Yonge was a big scorer for the Spartans as he dunked 18 points up north. Labetich wasn't far behind as he got 15 for the Spartans.


Alan Jancsi will see a lot of ac-

tion at the guard spot, according to Inman. He gives the Spartans needed speed. Craig Carpenter will also see a lot of time in the games.

The Spartans had a 40 per cent field-goal average against Portland. Although Inman said there is room for improvement, he was pleased with the Spartans outing last week.

The committee consists of eight faculty and nine student members, including the present and past Freshman Camp directors.

There are seven student committee positions open, and some qualifications include having a 2.0 overall and a 2.0 last semester, possessing a general knowledge of Freshman Camp objectives, and a general knowledge of the organization of the camp.

A committee member must also have the ability to establish rapport with the group, the ability to communicate effectively, and the sense of responsibility necessary for the position.

The time element is an important factor as committee work usually requires about four or five hours outside work per week, plus at least one committee meeting a week.

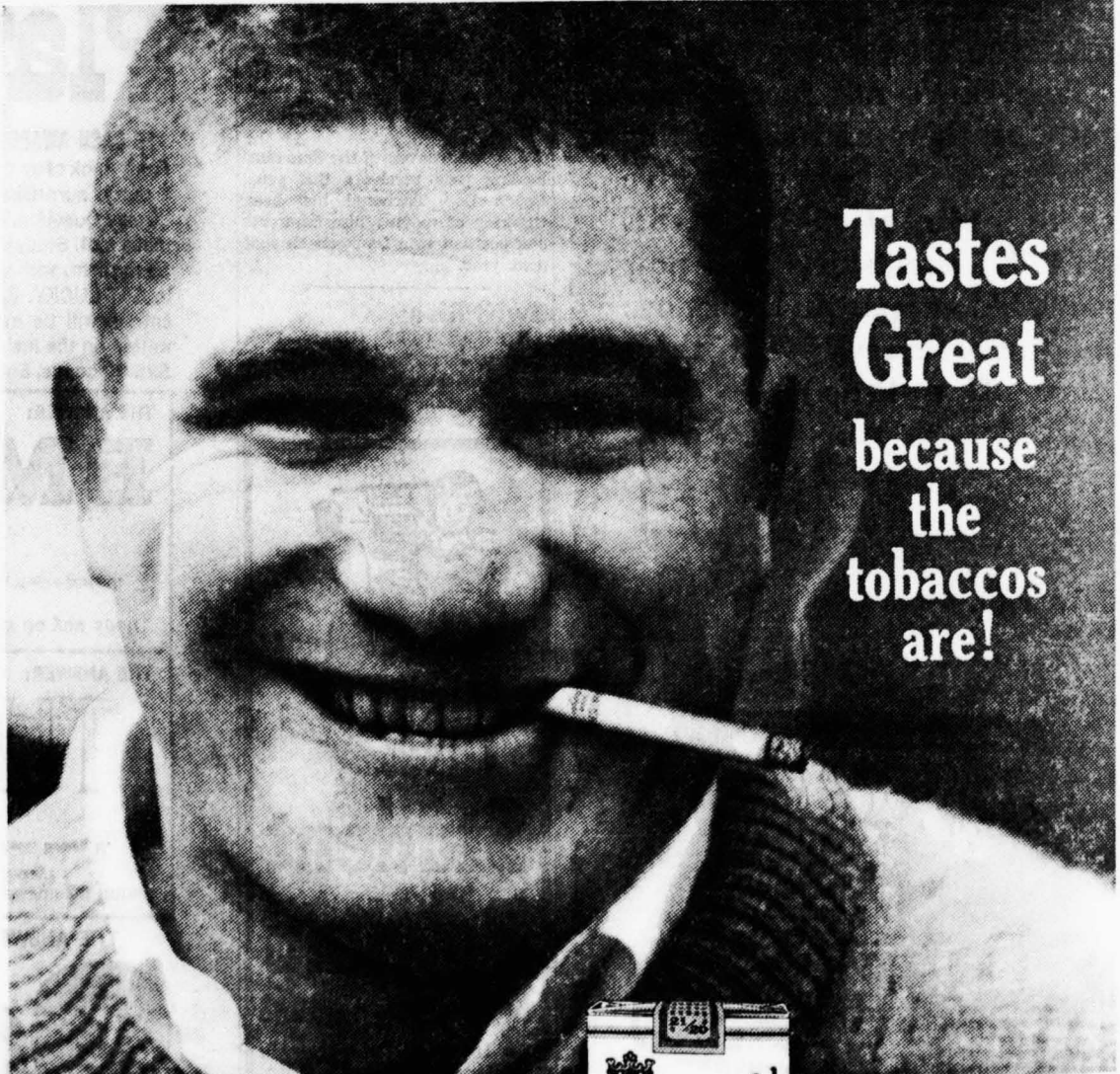
Psi Chi Group To Hear Profs
