DIDECTOR'S NOTES FOR CABARET

If you're a sucker for an old fashioned, sentimental love story (who isn't?), Cabaret will tempt you to sigh and reach for your hankie. (If you have forgotten your hankie, an usher will provide you with enough kleenex to get you through the second act.) Yes, Cabaret is filled to the teary-eved brim with pure schmaltz, Sentiment, however, is not the key to this play's areatness, and it is, indeed, one of the masterworks of the American musical theatre. Rather, it is the unusual interplay of styles and ideas that has intriqued audiences of both the stage and film versions. Juxtaposed against the love element we are treated to hilarious political satire and penetrating alimpses of the growing horror of Hitlerism in pre-war Germany, Cabaret is about anti-Semitism, the decadence of modern urban society, desperation, and the destruction of humanitarian values by the disease of Nazi dictatorship. Weaving schmaltz and social commentary together are a dozen of the finest songs ever written for the stage. These are tunes filled with humor and meaning, the kind of catchy, memorable numbers you can hum on the way home from the theatre. Which brings us to that final element which has endeared this play to audiences for more than twenty years—its good natured sexuality, Cabaret is, glas, raunchy. So if you do not enjoy good-looking men and women, scantily clad and strutting their stuff through terrific songs and dances, you should maybe close your eves every time the wickedly stylized Emcee appears in the spotlight.

One final note. It would be a mistake to compare this stage version with the film adaptation starring Liza Minelli and Joel Grey. There is only vague similarity between the stories, and even the characterizations, especially of Sally Bowles, bear little resemblance to those in the film. Those of you who are fans of the movie (as I am), please sit back and enjoy the different approaches taken by the stage play. In many aspects the stage version is markedly superior to the better-known film. It is richer, warmer, more human, and rings truer.

ROBERT JENKINS (DIRECTOR) has acted and directed with such aroups as the Performina Arts Foundation of New York, the Gallivanting Inspiration Group, the California Actors Theatre, Children's Theatre Workshop, and The San Jose Stage Company. His recent directing projects include Equus, The Mound Builders, and Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? As an actor Jenkins has performed major Shakespearean roles of Oberon (Midsummer Night's Dream), Richard III, and Mercutio (Romeo and Julief) as well as numerous roles ranging from Sophoclean Tragedy to Pinter Absurdism. He received his Ph.D. from Florida State University and has been on the faculty at SJSU since 1975. Jenkins now holds the position of Director of Theatre.

He has performed extensively in musicals, concerts, clubs, recordings, and network television. Mike is a specialist in jazz, popular and avant garde vocal techniques. Prior to joining the jazz studies faculty at SJSU in 1979, Mike was Assistant Director of Vocal Music Activities at the University of California at Berkeley, where he founded the Cal Jazz Choir. The San Jose State Jazz Singers, under Mr. West's direction, has become one of the forerunners in collegiate vocal jazz circles. The group has been honored with an appearance at the Montreaux Jazz Festival in Switzerland this July. Mike's musical direction credits at SJSU include Aesop's Fables, Fiddler on the Roof, and Man of La Mancha, as well as this year's production of Cabaret.

ANNETTE MACDONALD (Choreographer) recieved her BA and MA degrees from University of California, Berkeley, with an emphasis in Dance Ethnology; her specialty is historical and contemporary jazz, tap, and Afro-Caribbean Dance forms. She has also studied dance at the Mary Wigman School of Dance in Berlin, Germany, and the Laban Art Movement Studio, Surrey, England. She is a member of Screen Actors Guild and has appeared in numerous television episodes. Annette conducted an original research on the Caribbean island of Carriacou. She has produced/directed award winning dance films including films of dance troups in West Africa. At San Jose State University Annette has participated in all aspects of the dance program as a professor, choreographer, dancer, actress and lecturer in both the Theatre Arts and Anthropology departments. She has choreographed Grease and Wild West Women, directed the Afro-Caribbean Dance Troupe, and recently choreographed and performed "Body Music" by Keith Terry.

Associate Professor teaching both Costume and Makeup Designer) is an Associate Professor teaching both Costume and Makeup Design. While at SJSU Betty has designed such shows as Dracula, Fidaller on the Roof, The Good Woman of Setzuan, The Cherry Orchard, Country Wife, and Man of La Mancha. This season her work has been seen in The Male Animal, Antigone, and Peck's Bad Girls. Betty has also designed for the Alley Theatre in Houston, the Ohio Valley Summer Theatre, the University of Santa Clara, and the San Jose Repertory Company. She recently designed costumes for San Jose Civic Light Opera's production of They're Playing Our Song.

JON ERAHENBUHL (Lighting Designer) is a senior in the Theatre Arts Department. He has previously desinged lights for SJSU's productions of *Loose Ends, Xt. Deb,* and this season's *Terra Nova.* Jon has worked as a theatre technician, including a position as Assistant Lighting Designer at Opera San Jose. He has also worked as an electrician at the Colorado Shakespeare Festival, the Summer Repertory Theatre in Santa Rosa, and The Old Globe Theatre in San Diego. Jon has recently assumed the SJSU position of Master Electrician.

PAUL MANCHESTER (Scenic Designer) is a senior in the Theatre Arts Department. He has previously designed sets for San Jose Children's Musical Theatre, Gilroy Community Theatre, and SJSU's production of *Ondine*. Paul has also designed costumes, worked as a Graphic Artist, assisted Professional Scenic Designer Ken Holamon, worked as a Scenic Artist, illustrated a children's book, *Eggbert, the Magical Egg,* appeared in over nine musicals, and played the part of Michael Barnes in this season's *The Male Animal*. Paul was chosen as the 1984-85 Outstanding Student/Researcher/Artist in Drama at SJSU. This summer he will be a Scenic Designer for the Summer Shakespeare festival at the Paul Masson Mountain Winery.
