HOW TO BUY TICKETS

Tickets-by-Telephone — Call (408) 277-2777 during box office hours and charge your tickets to Visa or MasterCard.

Window Sales: Visit the University Theatre's box office at 5th & San Fernando on any work day from noon to 2 p.m. and 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. beginning two

weeks before each opening. On performance Saturdays, the Theatre box office is open from 5 p.m. through the first 15 minutes of the performance.

Mail Orders: Write the University Theatre Box Office, San Jose State University, San Jose, CA 95192 or sign up on our mailing list in the lobby and receive advance notice of special events as well.

NOTE: If tickets are held at the box office for you, please pick them up at least one-half hour prior to the performance.


SUBSCRIBER TICKET EXCHANGE PRIVILEGE

has acted and directed for regional professional theatres such as the Pittsburgh Playhouse, the Seattle Repertory, the San Francisco Actor's Workshop and the American Conservatory Theatre: for Shakespeare festivals at San Diego, Ashland, Oregon, and Colorado; at Universal and M.G.M. Studios; and at Carnegie Tech and Northwestern Universities. He is a member of the Screen Actors Guild, the Directors Guild and the Screenwriters Guild. He has been an SJSU faculty member since 1964 and was Department Chair between 1964 and 1982. Dr. Todd has a flair for theatre classics. His recent SJSU productions include Shakespeare's King Lear, Chekhov's The Cherry Orchard and Wycherly's The Country Wife. But he also enjoys directing such theatrical hokum as last season's Dracula and modern comedies like The Male Animal. He has been offered a Fulbright Fellowship for 1985.

From the Director . . .

"Every time is a time for humor." said the noted humorist James Thurber (1894-1961). He may be remembered more for his short stories (such as "The Secret Life of Walter Mitty"). witty essays and droopy dog cartoons in The New Yorker, but he was always intrigued by the theatre. He even appeared on Broadway briefly in Thurber Carnival, a review based on his sketches. In 1940 he was persuaded to co-author The Male Animal, which proved to be one of the best and truest of American comedies. Later, Thurber himself was portrayed in a television series (My World and Welcome To It) as an artist whose animated fantasies spring to life.

Thurber's collaborator in crafting The Male Animal was an experienced stage actor named Elliot Nugent, who knew a good idea when he saw it and helped shape Tommy Turner into the most successful role of his stage career. The role fit Henry Fonda like a glove in a film version (Olivia DeHavilland and Jack Carson played Ellen and Joe).

The battle between the sexes fascinated Thurber and a romantic triangle is at the heart of *The Male Animal*. But it is a serious comedy and academic freedom is at issue. This issue seems as relevant today as it was in 1940 or the McCarthy era.

About the cast

David O. Apple (Joe Ferguson) was last seen at S.J.S.U. in *The Country Wife* as the foppish Mr. Sparkish. but his versatility has landed him such varied roles as the title role in *Dracula* and Stanley Kowalski in *A Streetcar Named Desire*. A drama major, David will be graduating this year.

Sandy Efseaff Benster (Ellen Turner) holds a B.A. in Human Biology from Stanford University, a Masters Degree in Physical Therapy from Baylor University, and is currently at SJSU working on a second B.A. in Theatre Arts. She has appeared professionally in the San Francisco Children's Opera and leading roles in Once Upon a Mattress and Anything Goes. A singer as well as an actress, Sandy also attained the rank of Captain in the U.S. Army.

Kevin Brady (Wally Myers) is a Theatre Arts major and an accomplished athlete. he has competed for the SJSU track team in shot put, and is one of the top athletes for the Scottish-Highland Games held annually in Santa Rosa. Kevin was last seen on the University stage as the ill-fated knight Hans in *Ondine* and as Bogie in *Play it Again, Sam* in 1981.


