HOWARD BURMAN Director

Teacher, director, producer – Howard Burman divides his time between San Jose, San Francisco, New York and wherever else his busy schedule takes him.

An Associate Professor of Theatre Arts, Dr. Burman directs and teaches Dramatic Literature and Playwriting at SJSU, and was the coordinator for the Harold C. Crain National Award for Playwriting from 1976 to 1983 and is now the coordinator for the Theatre Arts Master of Fine Arts Program.

Dr. Burman has produced summer stock, educational and professional theatre. His latest New York production was the highly acclaimed "Behind the Broken Words" with Anthony Zerbe and Roscoe Lee Browne which opened at the American Place Theater in December 1981. He has also produced several popular touring shows with Anthony Zerbe and Roscoe Lee Browne, David Ogden Stiers, Michael Learned and Valerie Harper.

Dr. Burman studied playwriting with Jerome Lawrence (''Mame,'' ''Inherit the Wind'') and Robert Anderson (''Tea and Sympathy,'' ''Sand Pebbles''). He worked as a script evaluator for the American Playwrights Theatre and the New Dramatist's committee. Among his own works are ''Five February Minutes,'' ''The Jump,'' Tapestries'' and others, including ''An American Fairytale,'' which was produced by ACT's Plays in Progress series.

Dr. Burman directed the highly acclaimed National Crain Winner "Xt. Deb" last spring.

He is also an avid runner who annually runs the Greek Marathon in Athens.
