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

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ABOUT FO

Dario Fo (1926-), a highly controversial Italian playwright, satirist and performer, has been entertaining European audiences for years. Due to his political views, he has been considered a risk and therefore has been denied a visa to the United States until very recently. In 1985, he was refused entrance to the United States, when he was scheduled to speak at a Free Trade in Ideas conference. Consequently, he was seen via satellite from Toronto. At the conference he was quoted as saying: "The fact the State Department denied...the visa is something which makes me very proud. I took a look at the list of people denied visas to the United States, and then I realized that I am in beautiful company."

ABOUT FACE


About Face, originally entitled Car Horns, Trumpets, and Raspberries, takes a satirical look at terrorism. Utilizing the classic "mistaken-identity farce," Fo chose the Italian millionaire, Gianni Agnelli as his target. In About Face, Agnelli is abducted by the Red Brigades, then severely injured in a car accident. Through a series of misunderstandings, his face is reconstructed to resemble the face of an Italian factory worker, Antonio Berardi. In the course of the play, Fo manages to satirize not only capitalism, but bureaucratic incompetency and police corruption as well.

This production, in keeping with Fo's style is filled with "lazzi" – or comic bits, reminiscent of the Marx Brothers, "asides" to the audience, which create a sense of intimacy or a shared secret, and a sense of improvisation through updated references and occasional ad libs.

In this production, Gianni Agnelli has been appropriately renamed "DonAldo Trumpo" to appeal to the American sensibility – magnifying the fact that lust for power and greed is universal. As the plot unravels, the audience is left with the sense that the power and influence of industrialists has been greatly underestimated and is truly a force to be reckoned with.

BRIDGET KOWALCZYK, DIRECTOR

Bridget received her M.F.A. in Theatre Arts with specialization in Performance from San Jose State University in May 1989. While pursuing her Master's degree, she also taught four semesters of Oral Expression. Also at San Jose State, Bridget directed several studio productions, including: Mrozek's Out at Sea, Handke's Kaspar, and Futurist Performance by various Futurist artists. Her last directing project, The Box, ran simultaneously with the world premiere of The Duck Sisters, written by the quest playwright-in-residence, Sheldon Rosen. Her interest in performance art led to the creation and performance of the production, The Bells, a piece highlighting the dual nature of man, based on the Edgar Allen Poe poem of the same name. Future projects include



the mounting of a production she wrote entitled "It's All Cellophane!" – a piece written in the style of the Futurists. In 1988, Bridget was awarded the title of Best Student Director at San Jose State. In addition to directing, Bridget has played a wide variety of roles in various productions. Her most thrilling experience as an actor was being directed by Edward Albee in the role of Grandma in *The Sandbox*. Currently, Bridget can be seen in the role of Carol in the musical comedy, *Angry Housewives* at San Jose Stage Company in Downtown San Jose.



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
