Top Educators To Speak

Ceremonies To Begin at 10 a.m.

Two top educators, former associates of Dr. Robert D. Clark at the University of Oregon, will be the major speakers at his inauguration as the 18th president of SJS today.

Dr. O. Meredith Wilson, president of the University of Minnesota, and Dr. Gordon Wright, head of the History Department at Stanford, both served with the new president during 20 years of faculty and administrative work at

his former post.
At the 10 a.m. inauguration ceremonies in the Civic Auditorium, Dr. Wilson will present the principal address entitled "The Bishop Would Be Pleased," a reference to Dr. Clark and his biography of Methodist Bishop Matthew Simpson during the Civil War.

MINNESOTA
Before he went to Minnesota in 1960, Dr. Wilson was president of the University of Oregon and secretary-treasurer of the Fund for

the Advancement of Education. He has also served as dean and instructor at Brigham Young University, University of Utah, and the University of Chicago.

A recipient of honorary degrees from nine colleges, Dr. Wilson studied abroad at the University of London and the University of Heidelberg.

Other positions the Phi Beta Kappa scholar has held include chairman of the American Council on Education and Council on Higher Education in the American Republics, chairman of the board of the Carnegie Foundation for Advancement of Teaching, and commissioner of White House Fellows.

DIGNITARIES
Visiting dignitaries, College Advisory Board members, and delegates of colleges, universities, and learned societies will hear Dr. Wright at the 12:30 invitational luncheon at the Ste. Claire Hotel.

Having served for 18 years as member and chairman of the History Department at the University of Oregon before accepting his post at Stanford, Dr. Wright will discuss "What is a University?"

The modern European history specialist joined the Stanford University faculty in 1957 and was appointed department chairman in 1959.

Dr. Wright, who was a U.S. Embassy secretary in Paris, has written and co-authored three books on France and books on European political systems and world civilization.

Local bars and liquor stores were besieged with coeds who scraped off all the Olympia labels in sight.

Winners of the label event were the 68 members of Alpha Omicron Phi under the direction of Jackie Hessler. They collected 2400 labels in 24 hours to get five bonus points towards the overall trophy. Second place went to Delta Zeta with 2200 labels.

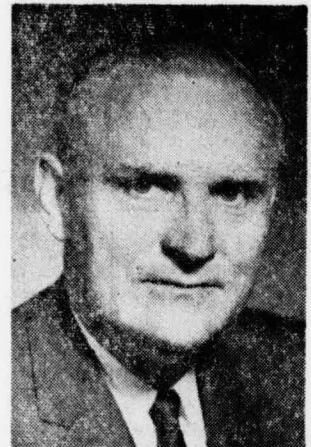
Saturday's activities began with an automobile parade of some 40 cars along Greek Row. Balloons

SJS Coed Screams; Scares Off Assailant

An SJS coed was knocked to the ground and slightly injured early Friday morning in front of her apartment on South Seventh Street.

The girl told police she had gone outside to try to catch her boy friend, who had left moments earlier.

She said she saw a man approaching and thought at first he was a police officer. He was wearing a suit or sport coat with a white shirt, was clean-shaven and good looking, she said. The man asked what she was doing.

The coed told him she was looking for her boy friend, expecting him to produce a badge or to tell her to go back to her apartment. Instead, he grabbed her.

Holding one hand over her mouth, the man threw her to the ground, she said. She managed to knock the man's hand away, and screamed. Her assailant fled.

The girl was bruised and her mouth was slightly cut, but she was otherwise unharmed.

She described her attacker as about 25 years old, 6-foot-2, and about 195 pounds, with dark, crew-cut hair.

San Jose police detectives are

investigating the case. Sgt. Lawrence Tambellini notes that such attacks are not frequent, but have occurred in the past.

Tambellini says the best way for coeds to protect themselves is to stay off the streets at night. When it is necessary to go out, women should not walk alone.

And, if a coed is accosted, says Tambellini, a scream is probably the most effective weapon.

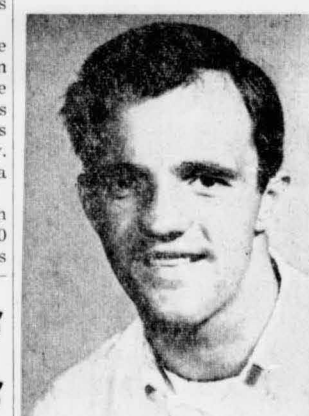
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Senior Wins Sports Picks With Seven

An informal coffee and dessert for any coeds interested in entering the Miss San Jose State Pageant will be held tonight in H1 from 6:15-7 p.m.

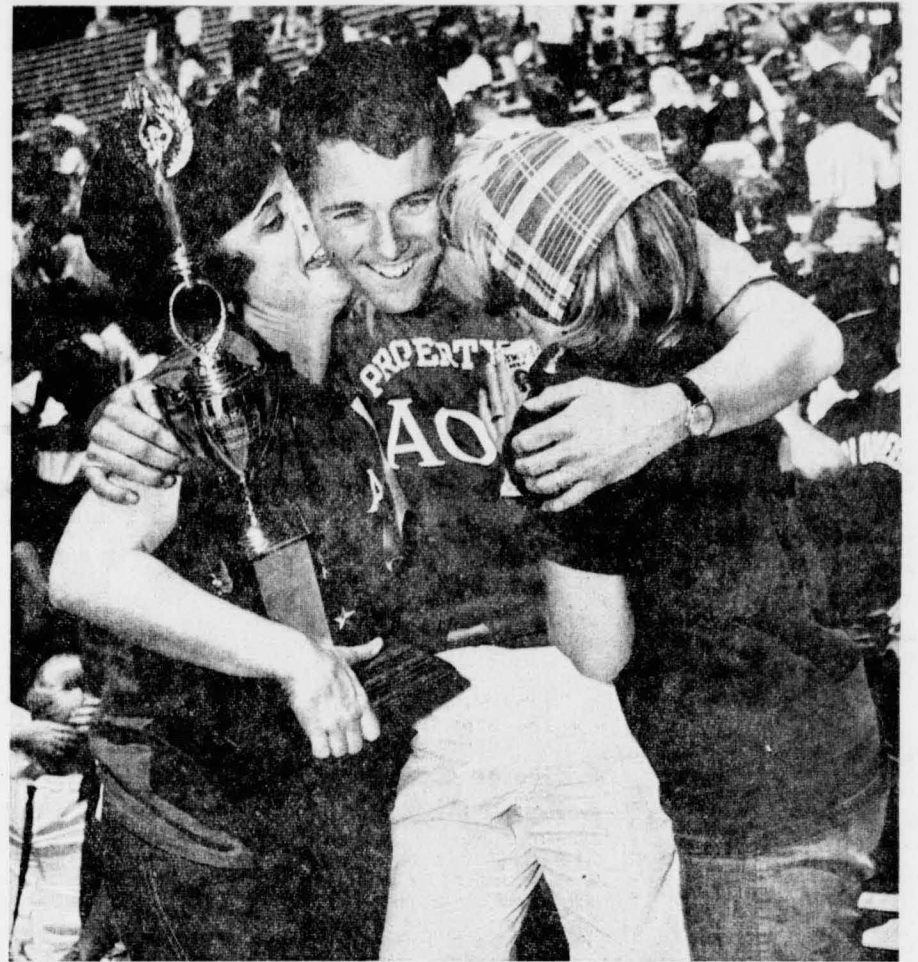
Past Miss California Beauty Pageant contestants will be on hand to offer personal tips concerning what entrants may expect when they enter the contest.

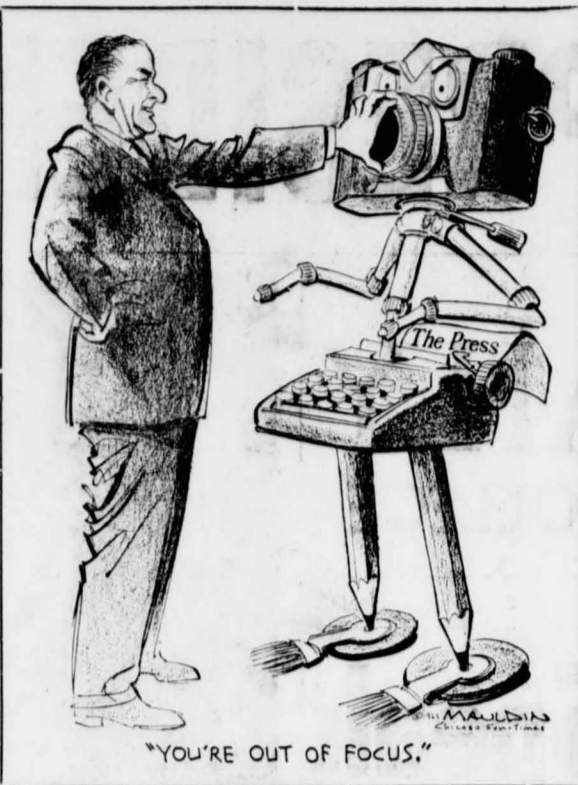

ALLIES BACK U.S. POLICIES IN VIET NAM

LONDON (UPI) — The United States today received overwhelming support for its Viet Nam policies from its allies in the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization SEATO. Only France sounded a discordant note.

EUROPEAN PRESS CRITICIZES JOHNSON

LONDON (UPI) — President Johnson's administration drew strong criticism from European newspapers today for sending U.S. Marines into the Dominican Republic.

The West German Sueddeutsche Zeitung of Munich said, "President Johnson has endangered his reputation in his own hemisphere . . ." It said responsible politicians in many Latin American republics "suspect the United States wants to help a governing military junta, which is closely cooperating with New York banking houses, against a democratic president who was illegally driven from his country."

There was no official French comment. But the French newspaper, Combat, said, "Those who heaved a sigh of relief last Nov. 3 are admitting today they rejoiced too soon. Barry Goldwater, if he had been elected, could not have practiced a more drastic foreign policy, nor used the 'big stick' with less circumspection."

The London Daily Express supported the United States. "President Johnson is completely justified in preventing a Castro takeover of the Dominican Republic," it said. "And his Marines will, of course, get the situation in hand."

Govt. Denies Reason for Speakers

WASHINGTON (CPS) — The State Department denies that its stepped-up Viet Nam speakers program is a response to recent student and faculty protests against U.S. policy, though it admits that they were a factor in the decision.

Asked about the increase in speakers to explain the Administration's stand in Viet Nam last week, a State Department briefing officer said the program was not aimed at campus dissent,

but he added that he could not deny that demonstrations and teach-ins were a factor.

A State Department spokesman described the program this week as an attempt to augment the number of speakers on Viet Nam in order to meet the growing public demand, a large percentage of which is from colleges and universities. It is hoped that the additional speakers can be drawn from military, AID, and State Department officials who have had recent field experience in the country.

Officials responsible for Viet

Nam policy, it is pointed out, work long hours and usually on weekends. They are therefore less likely to be able to get away for speaking engagements on campus. As a result many college requests have had to be turned down in the past.

Whether an Administration representative would be allowed to participate in a debate or teach-in would depend on the circumstances, the spokesman said.

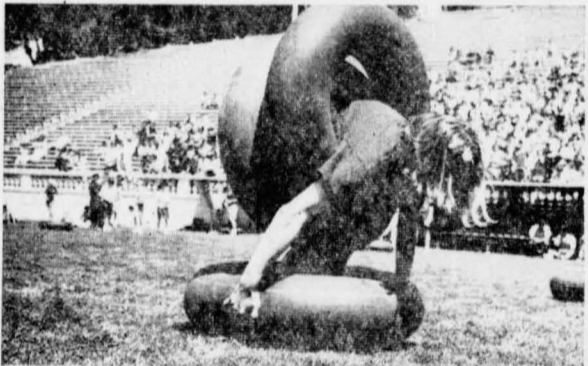

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Field Studies Trip Signup

Students interested in taking an instructional vacation before starting a summer job, and getting college credit for it may do so by signing up for the Mammoth Lakes field studies trip tomorrow according to Mrs. Dorothy Ellis, secretary of field studies in natural sciences.

Registration begins at 8 a.m. in the lobby the Science Building and will continue until 12 noon.

The Mammoth Lakes trip, similar to the Death Valley field study trip, will begin on June 13 and end on June 19.

"It's an excellent chance for students to get in a short instructional vacation before starting a summer job," Mrs. Ellis said.

Five instructors including program director Dr. H. Tom Harvey, SJS professor of biology, will take groups of students out on trail hikes and give instruction on the various forms of plant, wildlife and geological phenomenon in the Mammoth Lakes area. Illustrated lectures, informal social or folk dancing and other activities are scheduled for evening instruction and entertainment.

Dr. Wayne W. Kartchner will head geology instruction; Dr. G. A. McCallum will lead biology studies; Dr. Richard Hartesveldt will handle plant instruction; Dr. Carl Duncan will conduct studies on insects and Dr. Harvey will be in charge of vertebrate studies.

There will be a \$21 tuition fee to be paid at the time of registration and students will be required to pay a \$16 fee for food costs at a meeting scheduled later in May.

The course is listed in the official bulletin as Science Education x156A, Field Nature Study. Students taking the course will receive one semester unit of credit in Natural Science.

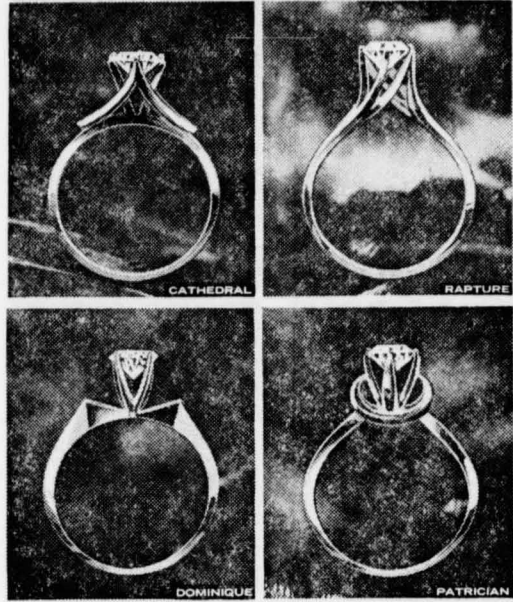

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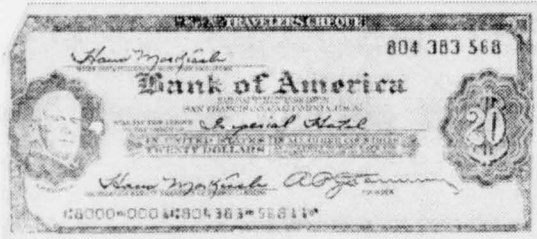
